Seed Processors, Dairy Workers Slate Meet

CORVALLIS — Statewide meetings for Oregon seed processors and dairy industry workers are scheduled next week at Oregon State College.

A new seed processors short course is scheduled Feb. 11 to 13 and the 46th annual Dairy Industries Conference will be Feb. 11 to 14.

Sponsored by the departments of agricultural engineering and farm crops, the seed processors course will include discussions of seed certification, handling, harvesting, cleaning and testing.

The conference will emphasize new trends in processing and marketing dairy products. Oregon's champion cheese, butter and ice cream makers for 1956 will be announced at the conference and milk and cream entries from Oregon dairy plants will be judged.

Bill Would Regulate Pay For Counselors

SALEM — A bill to regulate employment of counselors in camps was introduced in the Senate Wednesday by Sen. Lee Ohmart and Rep. Robert L. Elstrom, both Salem Republicans.

It provides that counselors must have 24 consecutive free hours a week, that they must have two hours off between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., and that counselors under 16 years of age can't work before 6 a. m. or after 10 p. m.

The Wage and Hours Commission would have authority to investigate working conditions of counselors, and to regulate employment of women and children who are counselors.

10 YEARS FOR ROBBERY

PORTLAND — Federal Judge William East Thursday sentenced Charles E. Simmons, 40, of Springfield, to 10 years in prison for last November's holdup of the West Eugene branch of the First National Bank.

Donald O. Howard, 25, Eugene, accused of driving the getaway car, was sentenced to two years.

Simmons had pleaded guilty to the robbery and Howard to being an accessory after the fact.

Two Walla Walla Prison Inmates Still On Loose

WALLA WALLA — Two state prison inmates still were at large Thursday after hiding themselves in boxes being hauled away by a contractor.

They were identified by Acting Warden Bobby Rhay as Carl Brehan, 31, serving time for a Kitsap County burglary, and Earl Walter Pretzer, 38, robber from Yakima County.

Rhay said the prisoners apparently hid in boxes of asphalt paper used for packing steam pipes when a truck left the prison power house Wednesday afternoon.
