

Recent Oil Price Increases To Bring Near \$85 Million

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rear Adm. O. P. Lattu told investigating senators Tuesday that recent price increases in oil and gasoline will boost military costs "approximately \$5 million dollars during the next 12 months."

Lattu, Navy Supply Corps officer who last year bought more than a billion dollars worth of gasoline, fuel oil and other petroleum products, offered the testimony. He is executive director of the agency which buys petroleum products for all the services.

Lattu was leadoff witness as Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Mo.) reopened public hearings by two Senate groups. The senators are studying the emergency oil lift for Western Europe, resulting from closing of the Suez Canal and Middle East pipelines, and accompanying price increases for domestic and foreign consumers.

O'Mahoney has been publicly critical of the fact that the Eisenhower administration set up a special committee, representing 15

Hopes Held Out To Avert Strike Of Dockworkers

NEW YORK (AP) — Union and employer representatives appear optimistic about averting a threatened strike today by 45,000 dockworkers from Maine to Virginia. The deadline is 5 p. m., EST. Negotiators for the New York Shipping Assn. and the independent international Longshoremen's Assn. conferred until a recess was called at 2:30 a. m. today. The meeting resumes at noon.

"We have never been so close to achieving a contract," declared Alexander Chopin, chief negotiator for the employer group. He said his organization had made "a considerable amount of concessions." A tentative contract agreement is based on a set of proposals put forward by the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

Louis Waldman, the union's chief counsel, said "union progress has been made" toward reaching agreement on a New York pact. He said the ILA's negotiating committee was "in the midst of considering employer clarification of acceptance of the mediators' proposals."

In Philadelphia, shippers said a strike by longshoremen there was likely even if the dispute was settled by the ILA in New York.

VA Nurses To Help In New Drug Rating

Psychiatric nurses will play a key role in the nationwide study of tranquilizing drugs in which the Roseburg Veterans Administration Hospital is taking part along with other VA hospitals.

Miss Cecilia H. Hauge, director of nursing service at the VA central office in Washington, D. C., said the nurses will work with psychiatrists in rating the changes in behavior of patients receiving the drugs.

The new approach to psychiatric nursing is part of a change in the entire role of the mental hospital and its staff, resulting largely from use of tranquilizing drugs, to bring patients back into contact with reality.

Disturbed behavior of mental patients in VA hospitals has been reduced drastically. Also the need for wet sheet packs, continuous tube baths, and use of electric and insulin shock treatment to calm patients has been reduced, according to the director of nursing.

Steelworkers To Elect New President Today

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Members of the United Steelworkers elect a president today. For the first time in the union's 20-year history, the leadership is challenged.

The issue: Donald J. McDonald, running against President David J. McDonald is a Pittsburgh district steelworker opposed to a hike in dues from \$3 to \$5 monthly. He is Donald C. Barick, 37, who works at the nearby Irvin works of U. S. Steel Corp.

USW members also are voting for other top officers, including district directors. In only a few instances are there any opponents for the slate led by McDonald, who succeeded to the presidency after the death in 1952 of Philip Murray.

Howard R. Hague of Pittsburgh has no opposition for his job as vice president.

4. Received a letter from Rep. Charles O. Porter informing the council he was preparing to introduce legislation designed to obtain for the city title to property left by Lillie Moore to the federal government. The Historical Society is making efforts to get the property for a museum. through settling disputed questions exclusively by peaceful means by negotiations.

"2. Noninterference in the internal affairs of the Near and Middle East; respect of the sovereignty and independence of these countries.

"3. Renounce any attempts to include these countries in military blocs with the participation of the great powers (a direct slap at the Western-sponsored Baghdad Pact but not at the Arab League alliance which Egypt has been promoting).

"4. The liquidation of foreign bases and the withdrawal of foreign troops from the territories of the countries of the Near and Middle East.

"5. The mutual renunciation of the supply of arms to countries of the Near and Middle East.

"6. Cooperation toward the economic development of the countries of the Near and Middle East without making any political, military or other conditions whatsoever incompatible with the dignity and sovereignty of these countries."

The Soviet six points appeared to represent the Kremlin's answer to President Eisenhower's doctrine to stabilize the Middle East.

Donald Hong, 19, Sutherlin, was probably wishing today he hadn't carried the bonds of friendship so far. And his friend, "Bud" Griffin, 18, Oakland, was probably heaving a sigh of relief that he had to pay only a \$20 fine despite a "jail-break."

Hong is in the Douglas County jail under \$1,000 bail, charged with helping a prisoner escape.

The prisoner was as surprised as the Sutherlin police when he found he had "escaped" from the Sutherlin jail over the weekend. Griffin, a sailor home on leave, called the police to determine whether he was supposed to be in jail or not in the comedy of errors.

The sequence of the comedy went this way:

A car driven by Hong was stopped by the Sutherlin police for defective headlight and speeding. Griffin was taken from the car and lodged in the Sutherlin jail for drunkenness.

KINGMAN, Ariz. (AP) — An escaped convict surrendered to sheriff's officers Monday night after a 73-year-old spinster ordered him out of a paragon where he had fled during a blazing gun battle.

"I didn't want to see him shot," Miss Louise Freeland said. "He probably would have bloodied up my favorite chair."

Sheriff's officers identified the man as Charles E. Turner, 34, an escapee from Ft. Leavenworth federal prison last June 4. He told officers he had been sent to Leavenworth on an "Army rap from Japan."

With Turner was Joyce Hitchcock, 17, of Helena, Mont., who told officers she was forced to accompany him on a four-state trip after he abducted her at gunpoint last Thursday.

Mohave County Sheriff Frank L. Porter said Turner admitted in a signed statement that he kidnapped the girl. Miss Hitchcock, an attractive brunette, told police that Turner raped her on the second night of his four-state flight. She also said Turner committed several burglaries en route to Arizona. She said he used the money to buy gasoline.

Sutherlin Folk Complain Of Dogs At Large

Dog days arrived in Sutherlin Monday night in the form of complaints about canines running at large.

About eight residents complained to the City Council about dogs running at large throughout the city and requested a stronger ordinance governing them. During the prolonged discussion about dogs, the council noted that for every complainant there is a dog owner who feels just as strongly about the matter and wants freedom for his pet.

The council decided to stick with the present city ordinance which requires a signed complaint before a police officer can pick up a dog.

The council authorized City Manager Dean Smith to contact several photography firms and ask them to send representatives to meet with the council. The city "dads" will then select one firm to proceed with preliminary work for the photographing, mapping and planning program for the city.

The decision was made to go ahead with the advance work, although the federal government has not said whether matching funds will be made available. This was done because of the approach of weather most favorable for aerial photography.

A report on the extra expense to the water department because of the recent freeze was made by the city manager who said the weather increased expenditures \$300 to \$400. This money was used at the water filter plant for thawing and taking preventative measures against further freezing.

The council ruled against allowing credit to water users for losses due to burst pipes caused by freezing. This was done in view of expected requests although none has yet been received.

Passed was the sewer assessment ordinance covering levies for sewer laterals throughout most of the town. The deadline for paying assessments is either by installments or lump sum — is March 1, according to Smith.

The superintendent of the waterworks was authorized to attend the three-day short course for waterworks operators to be held at Oregon State College in March.
