

Limited Stock Market Rally Fails To Last

NEW YORK (AP) — A limited rally in the stock market petered out in the afternoon Tuesday, leaving prices mostly down fractions to around two points a share.

The market went into a quiet decline after an eventful morning in which the high-speed ticker tape twice fell behind the pace of trading.

Monday's decline was the worst since October, 1955.

Based on Associated Press averages, Monday's nosedive clipped about four billion dollars from the quoted value of all stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

The decline was generally described as purely technical. Brokers said the market was seeking a new low level that could prove attractive to buyers.

In the background, however, were a number of developments, which indicated a tightening up of the economy. The declining market was given fresh impetus a week ago when former President Hoover said the current inflation showed possibilities of overshadowing another depression.

Some brokers have been advising investors to proceed with caution and have suggested that a mild business recession could occur later this year.

Contempt Of Congress Conviction Is Upheld

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The contempt of Congress conviction of Herbert Simpson, Portland, was upheld by the U. S. Court of Appeals here.

Simpson, who tried to use the Fifth Amendment to avoid answering questions put to him by the House Un-American Activities Committee at hearings in Portland several years ago, was sentenced to 10 months in prison and fined \$250 by a federal district court.

The appeals court said answers to such questions as his residence and educational background were not such that he would incriminate himself by answering.

ADA Urges More Classroom Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans for Democratic Action today urged enactment of a federal school construction bill providing a billion dollars annually for new classrooms.

Edward D. Hollander, national director of ADA, said in testimony prepared for a House Education subcommittee:

"We are sure the federal government can afford such a program. We see no reason why public education has to yield priority in the federal budget to, say, public roads; or priority in labor and materials to supermarkets or office buildings."

Hollander said the Eisenhower administration's proposal, which calls for an outlay of \$1,200,000,000 for school building over the next four years, indicates a "decision to spare the budget and spoil the child."

Saud Says U. S. Seeks To Maintain Peace

CAIRO (AP) — King Saud was quoted Tuesday as saying he believes the United States seeks to maintain peace in the Middle East and wants the countries of the area to be capable of preserving their sovereignty.

The Saudi Arabian ruler's statement was made in an interview with the New York correspondent of the Cairo newspaper Al-Ghurba.

Saud said his visit to the United States was "useful and very fruitful" and contributed to the maintenance of peace. He now is making a state visit to Spain en route back to the Middle East.

Saud said he made every effort during his U. S. visit to explain the Arab viewpoint to American leaders and "I believe they understood it fully." He also declared there was no Communist threat in the Middle East and termed allegations about such a menace "exaggerated propaganda."
