

Trojan Quint Stops Eagles In 57-36 Tilt

Yoncalla's class B basketball team showed Douglas a couple of lessons in the game Tuesday night in the first quarter, but a superior Trojan bench lowered the boom on the Eagles at two points as the host coasted to a 57-36 non-league win at Brockway.

Yoncalla took a 2-0 lead at the start of the game and held on before Douglas finally took over at 10-9 near the end of the first period, which ended 14-9.

Then Douglas' Tracy McClendon came off the bench and hit four straight buckets, and the game was decided. Douglas held a 28-19 half-time lead.

Larry Bissonette, the Trojan's lanky center, poured 9 of his 13 points through in the third quarter as Douglas rang up a 47-26 margin. As the fourth started, sub Jim Taylor hit three straight goals to widen the gap.

Rudy Powell with 10 points and Leroy Noffsinger with 9 kept Yoncalla in the game.

It was only a 48-46 margin for Grant, but it was enough to drop Benson to second place. Idle Lincoln held to third place. Jefferson scored an expected 61-52 over Franklin to remain fourth. Grant was rated No. 10 in the latest AP poll.

South Salem, ranked No. 9, went through three overtimes and lost to Milwaukie, 47-45, in another Tuesday game.

McMinnville managed to down Oswego, 69-61. Elkton defeated Drain, 44-39, and Sutherlin lost to Myrtle Creek, 42-39, in other games.

It was the 19th straight victory for Elkton and its second consecutive decision over highly regarded Drain (15-3). As in their previous meeting, Elkton held Drain to two points in the last quarter to squeeze out the win. The score the first time was 52-50.

University Runners Use Russian System
 EUGENE — The experimental sprint-and-jog style of distance running, introduced by Russian ace Vladimir Kutz in the 1956 Olympic Games, is being tried out at the University of Oregon.

Coach Bill Bowerman said he is pleased with the results.

In a recent three-mile cross-country run, eight men were timed at less than 15 minutes. Phil Knight, who came in third, used the sprint-and-jog style.

"The even-pace men are ahead of those running the uneven style, basically because the uneven style is harder and takes longer to perfect," Bowerman said.

It was the second win over the Rooks, whose tall center front Irigoin, Joe Mann, led scoring with 16 points. For the Frosh, Jerry Anderson, Doug Lundstrom and Hugh Springer scored 12 each.

Beavers Stun Ducks, 68-55, In Noncount

CORVALLIS — Cashing in on nearly twice as many free throw chances gave Oregon State a 68 to 55 basketball victory over Oregon in their kings-X game here Tuesday night.

The two teams were even in field goals at 22 apiece, but Oregon State scored on 24 out of 32 free throws for the winning margin. Oregon got only 18 charity tosses and made 11 of them.

The game, which does not count in conference standings, drew a crowd of 4,370.

Oregon State got away to an early lead and led 31-25 at the half.

Dave Gambee of OSC led the scoring with 23 points. Ken Nanson, a teammate, got 20.

Charley Franklin, Oregon's scoring ace, bagged only four field goals and a total of 10 points. Franklin picked up three fouls in the first 10 minutes, sat out the rest of the period and finally fouled out late in the second half.

Despite the even-Stephen stand-ins in field goals, OSC got 61 rebounds to Oregon's 29 in dominating the backboards.
