Washington Sees Hope In Clearing Of Rowers

SEATTLE (AP) — University of Washington crews, barred Friday from participation for the next two years in the national intercollegiate regatta in which they long have been a power, entertained a dim hope Saturday they may see the ban revoked.
Announcement of the suspension was made in Newark, N.J., by Ira Bushnell, secretary of the International Collegiate Rowing Assn. He said IRA stewards had decided on the action at the request of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Assn., because of disciplinary action taken against Washington for football recruiting violations.
In Seattle, however, H. P. Everett, vice president of the University, immediately protested the action as a "mistake caused by misinterpretation of a Pacific Coast Conference action."

Frances Bible To Appear In Concert On Wednesday

Frances Bible, one of the outstanding mezzo soprano stars of opera and the concert stage today, appears in Roseburg Wednesday at 8:15 p.m. on the Central Junior High auditorium stage. She will be here under Roseburg Community Concert Assn. auspices.

This season, as a star of the New York City Opera, Miss Bible received critical acclaim for her creation of the title role in Thomas "Mignon." She also scored as Count Orlofsky in "Die Fledermaus." She appeared as a featured performer on the initial tour of the newly-formed NBC Opera Co. in "The Marriage of Figaro" as well as with the opera companies of New Orleans, San Antonio and Houston. Other highlight appearances of a busy 1956-57 season were performances with New York's Little Orchestra Society in "L'Elanc du Christ," with the Cleveland Symphony in "The Messiah," with the Detroit Symphony in Paul Paray's "Mass," and with the Los Angeles Philharmonic in "Salome."

During the past summer she starred in the highly acclaimed world premiere of the Douglas Moore-John Latouche opera, "The Ballad of Baby Doe," at Colorado's Central City Opera Festival. Two summers ago, Miss Bible entertained audiences at England's Glyndebourne Festival with her portrayal of Cherubino in Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro."

Britain's Top Strategist Says Eisenhower's Strong Point Charm, Not Ability

LONDON (AP) — Britain's top strategist of World War II says Dwight D. Eisenhower's strong point as a commander was his charm rather than military ability.

Field Marshal Viscount Alanbrooke, wartime chief of the Imperial General Staff (1941-56), made his observation in a war diary forming the basis of a new book released Sunday "The Turn of the Tide."

Alanbrooke did not have a very high opinion of most U. S. military leaders as strategists, including Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff. But he praised Gen. Douglas MacArthur as "the greatest general of the last war" and spoke well of Gen. Walter Bedell Smith.

Sir Arthur Bryant, noted British historian, who wrote the book credits Alanbrooke with being the mastermind of the grand strategy that brought the Allies victory.

Alanbrooke, in a footnote to his diary referring to Eisenhower, said: "He learned a lot during the war, but tactics, strategy and command were never his strong points."

"...Where he shone was his ability to handle allied forces, to treat them all with strict impartiality, and to get the very best out of an inter-allied force."
