Wildcats 50, Vikings 48

An aroused band of Glide Wildcats, led by All-American Dick Smith, bumped Myrtle Creek 50-48 Friday night on the Viking floor to win a clear-cut Umpqua Valley League basketball championship and the subdistrict 4-A-2 playoff berth against Eagle Point.

The irrepressible Smith bucketed 32 points in an amazing .700 shooting percentage from the field, including the all-important game-winning shot from 15 feet with six seconds left to play in the contest.

For the evening, Smith canned 14 fielders in 20 tries, including an amazing tip-in of his own missed layup shot and 13 fielders from 10 feet or better away from the hoop.

His final effort was preceded by two straight buckets from the 30-foot mark in the same general vicinity that kept the Wildcats in the game.

Glide Gets Chance
Glide got its final chance with 48 seconds left in the game after Myrtle Creek had maneuvered the

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Huskies Rap Ducks 84-62, Stay in Race

Undefeated California walloped Idaho to make it nine in a row in Pacific Coast Conference basketball Friday night and challenging UCLA and Washington also posted victories to keep title hopes alive.

The Bears made it look easy at Berkeley in rolling by Idaho, 81-54. They led 42-29 at the midway point and Idaho never threatened.

Second-place UCLA had a rough time with Stanford in the first half but the Bruins caught fire in the second to whip the Indians, 86-63. Stanford led at halftime, 39-38. The win left UCLA with an 8-1 record.

Two Hit High Scores
Indian forward Bill Bond was high man with 23 points, trailed by Bruin Ben Rogers with 22. Rogers was especially deadly at the free throw line, getting 10-for-10.

Washington kept up its threat to California and UCLA by tromping on tattered Oregon, 81-62, to acquire a 9-2 record. Washington took the lead in the first minute and led, 43-26, at the half.

Washington forward Doug Smart got 20 points—the average he has had per game—before he was removed with 14 minutes left in the game.

Southern Cal Stalls
Southern California went to stalling with only a 68-64 lead in the final three minutes against Washington State but the strategy paid off in a 73-68 Trojan victory.

The Cougars gave the Trojans fits in the first half, holding a 12-point lead at one time for USC then began a pressing defense and the Trojan regulars started to connect. It was tied up 36-36 at the half.

Washington State's Capt. Larry Beck, leading scorer in the PCC, was high man in the game with 23 points.

Surprising Eastern Oregon moved into second place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball race Friday night with a 62-41 victory over Oregon College of Education, while Southern Oregon was dumped into third place by Portland State, 79-66.

A disciplinary action had cost Eastern Oregon six of its varsity players earlier in the week and the La Grande team was expected to be an easy mark for the visiting OCE team.

OCE found the going easy early in the game, but by halftime the Irish were in front, 38-21, and in the second half Eastern Oregon came up with a rush.

Sutherland wrestlers led Douglas County qualifiers in the annual district 5 meet at Eugene Friday, placing 10 men into the semi-finals of the championship bracket, which will be run off today.

Roseburg placed eight men into the semi-finals and Myrtle Creek got the remaining Douglas County position with one placer. Douglas failed to qualify anybody.

Coach Ralph Dyon's high team effort netted the Bulldogs second place in the unofficial team scoring behind Springfield and just ahead of Roseburg.

Placing in the championship bracket for Sutherland were Durrell Gieger and Jerry Perez, both 106 pounds; Allen Barnes and Larry Modrell, both 115 pounds; Layton Ferguson, 123 pounds; Bob Lintard, 130 pounds; Gene Knapp, 136 pounds; Norm England and Jim Seal, both 141 pounds; Tom Bennett, 149 pounds.
