Hatfield Hits Conditions Of State House Basement
SALEM — Secretary of State Mark Hatfield said Monday that conditions in the basement of the state office building here are "unhealthy and inefficient," and called for immediate correction.

The secretary said he had written letters to the state Board of Health, the labor commissioner and the fire marshal asking them to make prompt inspection of the building and make recommendations for improvements.

"Although I am not fully familiar with all aspects of sanitation and safety regulations, I question if the conditions would meet basic standards for private employment," Hatfield said. "The state should meet the same standards it imposes on others in fairness to its employees."

Among agencies occupying space in the basement of the building is the state Civil Defense Agency.
