PORTLAND — The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in January was 149,821,000 board feet, only 82 percent of the 1952-56 average.

The figures were reported Wednesday by the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. Orders averaged 141,621,000 board feet and shipments 146,593,000. At the end of January, the report added, the industry's unfilled order file stood at 585,263,000 board feet and gross stocks at 1,074,880,000.

Eugene Gleemen Benefit Concert Slated March 5

An annual benefit concert will be given for the Eugene Hearing and Speech Center at 8 p.m., March 5, by the Eugene Gleemen. The center, organized to provide training and testing for persons with auditory or speech handicaps, is the nearest facility to Douglas County furnishing this service.

Accepting cases only on a basis of medical referral, the Hearing and Speech Center is now carrying a patient load of 28 children and adults. It conducts classes for pre-school and school age deaf and hard-of-hearing children, pre-school and school age speech handicapped children, and for adults to learn lip reading. The center also gives individual therapy hours for specialized auditory and speech handicaps.

Organized 1½ years ago with an enrollment of three, the center is now located in the basement of the Eugene Crippled Children's Hospital School. It is supported by the United Appeal in Lane County. The center requires equipment such as a cathode ray oscilloscope, an instrument that electronically produces a visual representation of speech to teach the difference between voice and voiceless sounds. Proceeds from the concert will aid in acquiring such equipment.

U. S. Chamber Opposes Federal School Aid Now

WASHINGTON — The U. S. Chamber of Commerce said today there is no critical national shortage of classrooms, and that it regards federal aid for school construction "unwise and unnecessary."

The chamber position was presented to a House Education subcommittee by Thomas A. Ballantine of Louisville, Ky., chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Committee on Education.

He said in prepared testimony: "It is the consensus of business in this country that the states and their communities are responsible for, and able to finance the development of the school systems required by their citizens."

Federal help he said, "would lead inevitably to the transformation of public education from a state and local function to one increasingly directed by the federal government."

REBELLION NOT OVER
NEW DELHI — Indian officials acknowledged Thursday that the Naga rebellion in east India is far from over. They disclosed Indian army units have been forced to extend their operations from the Naga Hills to the neighboring plains.

Russians Veto Kashmir Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Soviet Union has vetoed a Western plan to send the Security Council president to India and Pakistan in an effort to settle the Kashmir dispute.

The Russian delegate hinted that an alternate proposal by the United States would get the same treatment.

It was the 79th Russian veto in the council and their first in the nine-year-old dispute over whether Kashmir will go to India or Pakistan. The vote was 9-1, with Sweden abstaining.

India, not a council member, objected to any proposal that might

lead to sending a U.N. force to Kashmir to pave the way for the plebiscite the U.N. has called for several times.

The Western plan would have sent Gunnar V. Jarring of Sweden, council president for February, to the Indian subcontinent to seek means of ending the Kashmir controversy, possibly by sending a U.N. force there.
