

# Oregon Sportsmen's Group Opposes Legislative Bills

Opposition to proposed legislative changes in hunting and angling license regulations has been announced by the Oregon Sportsmen's Group.

Charles S. Collins, Roseburg, executive vice president, reporting on legislative recommendations of the executive committee, said the federation objects to House bills 462, 398 and 517, each having to do with fish and game licenses. HB 462, which would provide reduced game license fee for persons eligible for retirement benefits, would cause "administration difficulty and expense," Collins said in a letter addressed to legislators. "While any special privilege legislation usually sounds good, in practice it usually does not work, as demonstrated by experience in our own and other states where similar plans have been tried."

**Discrimination Seen**  
A \$1 per day license for non-resident anglers, proposed in HB 398, the federation contends, would discriminate against Oregon residents.

Reciprocal license privileges with Washington and Idaho, as provided in HB 517, would soon be extended to California, the Federation's statement declares, and "our resource could not stand such a pressure from so populous a state."

The federation's executive committee also went on record opposing legislation designed to create advisory game committees for Klamath and Lake counties, claiming that all other counties are entitled to equal consideration and that the program, if adopted for the state as a whole, would leave few funds for professional game management.

**Vandalism Fund Opposed**  
A proposal to pay for hunter or angler vandalism from game funds was opposed on the grounds that investigation of spurious claims, court costs, hearings, etc., would "run into vast sums." It is just as logical to require the state to pay for hit-and-run auto damage, the Federation asserts.

Boat regulations, proposed in SB 103 and David Lake angling, subject of SB76, the Federation believes, should be left to determination by the Game Commission and should not be made legislative acts.

## Stapleton Turns Down Army Coaching Offer

He said that Col. Earl (Red) Blaik, head coach at Army, called him last Friday and offered him the job.

Stapleton, 35, came here two years ago from Wyoming where he was assistant coach.

He also reported he recently had turned down an assistant coaching post at the University of Missouri.

## Basilio, Saxton To Meet Tonight For Welter Title

CLEVELAND — Welterweight champion Carmen Basilio's slugging edge makes him a strong favorite to solve Johnny Saxton's hit-and-run style in their third title fight tonight.

Assured by Basilio that his once-damaged right has completely healed, most boxing men are picking the 29-year-old left hooker from Canastota, N.Y. Saxton is a 13-5 underdog.

Saxton says he will revert to his old boxing style that earned him a questionable but unanimous decision at Chicago last March 14. When he tried to stand and slug with Basilio in their Sept. 12 rematch at Syracuse, N.Y., he was cut up and stopped in nine rounds. Basilio said it won't make any difference what Saxton does because he will be ready for anything. He insists he is in the best condition of his 68-bout career.

The fighters will cut into the \$60,000 radio-TV fee and also will share the estimated \$100,000 gate receipts with 30 per cent going to each man. Each could get about \$41,000.

## Early Wynn Is Earlier This Year In Signing

TUCSON, Ariz. — For a change, pitcher Early Wynn has signed his Cleveland Indians' contract early this year.

The perennial stubborn holdout has agreed to a reported \$40,000 a year salary in a telephone conversation. Tribe General Manager Hank Greenberg said at training camp here Friday. The figure represents a pay raise of an estimated \$3,000 over last season when Wynn won 20 and lost 9.

## Sports Huskies To Play California '5' Over Weekend

California's Bears, undefeated in Pacific Coast Conference basketball this season, run headon into their toughest set to date when they battle Washington at Seattle Friday night and Saturday night.

With their high scoring combination of Bruno Boin and Doug Smart the Huskies have won 10 PCC games while losing singles to UCLA and Stanford. Boin has averaged 17.8 and Smart 19.6 points per game.

Coach Pete Newell's Bears have won all 10 of their conference games and for the season have won 16 while losing only to San Francisco and Kansas.

## 14 Straight Wins

They've won their last 14 straight, but this season's PCC scheduling sends them against Washington and UCLA, the loop's other top club on successive weekends so the toughest lies ahead.

In the other weekend PCC series, Southern California plays at Oregon State at Idaho.

California banks largely on senior forward Larry Friend and a playmaking guard Earl Robinson to keep the club on its winning ways. Newell announced that forward Don McIntosh has sufficiently recovered from an ankle injury to make the trip, but his effectiveness is a question. McIntosh has missed four games.

## Cal Tops Defense

While Washington ranks second behind UCLA in team scoring among the PCC clubs, California holds the top spot in defense.

UCLA's Bruins, the second place team with a 9-1 mark, rate the favorite to turn back the cellar Oregon team to set up things for the meeting with California a week hence. But the Ducks forced Washington into an overtime last Saturday before losing. They could be primed for a surprise.

Southern California draws the assignment of trying to stop Stanford's Bill Bond who has averaged 19.1 points as the Indians won six and lost as many. USC stands 4-4 in the conference.

Washington State with its Larry Beck, the leading scorer in the PCC, draws a bye.

The Grade School coaches team won the deciding game of a best of three game inter-city basketball series with the Junior High coaches Thursday off a 38-22 thumping at the Benson School gym.

## Kansas Licked Despite Wilt's 32 Points

Veteran Coach Henry P. (Hank) Iba of Oklahoma A&M, master of possession basketball and disciple of defensive play, had reason to gloat today as his tactics once again proved successful.

Iba, in his 23 years with the Aggies, has won 481 games, but probably none gave as much pleasure as the upset of Kansas that he engineered last night. The Cowpokes squeaked past the Jayhawks, ranked No. 2 in the Associated Press poll, 56-54, in a typical Iba-patterned victory.

The Aggies' record now is 12-4, while the Jayhawks are 19-2.

The Aggies bottled up Wilt Chamberlain in the second half after the fabled Stilt had caged 24 points. A 6-8 sophomore, Arlen Clark, came off the bench in the second half to hold the seven-foot Chamberlain to eight points the rest of the way.

Wilt the Stilt wound up with 32 points to boost his scoring average from 29.0 to 29.2. He moved from fifth to fourth in the individual scoring race, passing idle Elgin Baylor of Seattle.

It was the Cowpokes' possession tactics in the last four minutes that set up the winning basket after Kansas had tied the score 54-all on Maurice King's one-handed shot with 3:49 to go.

Only other team in the top 20 to see action last night also went down to defeat, Oklahoma City, No. 13 nationally, bowed to Wichita 73-65 in another nonleague game. Joe Stevens paced the Wheatshockers with 21 points.

In a Madison Square Garden double-header in New York, Temple, behind the shooting of Mel Brodsky and Guy Rodgers, scored an 80-73 triumph over St. John's of Brooklyn after Seton Hall overhauled National Invitation Tournament-bound Cincinnati 80-67.

Manhattan, another NIT selection, fared better with an 85-66 conquest of Hofstra; Vince Yockel and Tom Cameron combined for 47 points as Clemson whipped Furman 91-73; runner-up Utah (7-4) stayed within striking distance of the Skyline Conference title surprising pacesetter Brigham Young (9-2) 88-66 and Montana withstood a late Utah rally for 78-67 skyline victory.

## Successor To Stilt Scores 92 In Game

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. — Pennsylvania, the home state of Wilt (the Stilt) Chamberlain has come up with a smaller edition of the 7-foot-sharpshooter who has already outscored his well-publicized predecessor.

Monday night Bobby Mullery, of St. Vincent Catholic High in nearby Plymouth, scored 92 points to break the Stilt's unofficial single game record for Pennsylvania high schools by two points. Thursday night, just to prove it wasn't any mistake, Bobby scored 63. Monday Mullery made 41 field goals which also smashed the Stilt's previous state mark of 38.

The 6-foot-6-inch senior has paced Plymouth to a 23-0 record this season. His 92-point performance helped bury Sacred Heart of Plains, Pa., 128-38. Thursday night Mullery led his team to a 116-62 victory over Marymount of Wilkes-Barre and the Wyoming Valley Catholic League championship.

Chamberlain still holds the state's three-year high school mark with a 2,352 total hung up before he graduated in 1955 and went on to Kansas University.

## GOBLE INJURED

CORVALLIS, Ore. — An ankle injury may keep Oregon State center Gary Goble out of action when the Beavers entertain Idaho this weekend, coach Slat Gull said Wednesday.

Goble, of Toutle Lake, Wash., hurt the ankle in practice. Gull said Dave Gambee is expected to switch from forward to take over at center.

## New Gambling Case Claimed In Colleges

Is a new gambling scandal brewing in college basketball? The Des Moines (Iowa) Register said Thursday night that a referee was suspected of helping put over betting coups.

The official was not named. Neither were the games he worked, but the story vividly recalled the gambling revelations that rocked the sport in 1951 and earlier in 1945. Then players on many top teams, notably CCNY's 1950 national collegiate and NIT champions, were involved.

While it has been generally recognized that betting on college games has increased the last several years, no players were reported involved in a betting coup the Register said occurred last week.

The Register said that Minneapolis gamblers were suspicious of the unnamed official because "they suspect him of assisting in betting coups by using his whistle to control the point spread—the number of points by which a game is decided. A sudden last minute spurge of betting on a game last week was mentioned—a spurge in which the bettors are said to have made a killing."

## Washington State Sets Long Baseball Schedule

PULLMAN, Wash. — Washington State College released a 32-game baseball schedule Thursday and a statement by Coach Buck Bailey that he is in "bad shape" to defend WSC's Pacific Coast Conference title.

Bailey said he has only two starters back, Mo Winters, a first baseman from Yakima, and Joe Tremblay, Kelo outfielder. The Cougars open against Oregon State at Lewiston March 23 and play their first P.C.C. game here April 19 against Washington.
