Legislators Have Passed Only 11 Out Of 939 Bills

SALEM — After six weeks of work, Oregon's Legislature has passed only 11 of the 939 bills that have been introduced.

Only two of them have been signed into law.

Committees are hard at work on the many controversial issues, which will begin going to the House and Senate in the next few days.

So far, the House has passed 69 of its 584 bills, and the Senate, making even slower progress, has passed only 30 of its 354 bills.

Taxes and education—the two main problems—will share the spotlight next week.

The Senate will vote Tuesday morning on a bill to reserve the property tax field to local governments. This measure, which would make it impossible for the state to levy a property tax, is expected to be sent to the House quickly.

There has been no action yet on the main tax program because the Ways and Means Committee doesn't know how much money will be needed to run the state government for the next two years. This decision probably is at least two weeks away.

There will be a second hearing Thursday night on the bill to increase the basic school aid appropriation 50 per cent. This hearing will be held by a Ways and Means Subcommittee. The House Education Committee, after holding the first one, recommended passage of the bill.

The answer to this school aid question is needed before the tax program can be drafted.

The House will vote Wednesday on the bill to persuade school dis-

tricts to reorganize and thus eliminate many of the smaller districts.

The House-passed bills to create a state conciliation service to mediate labor disputes and to repeal the 1953 anti-picketing law will be given a hearing Thursday night by the Senate Labor and Industries Committee.

Here is the way other major legislation is shaping up:

Labor—The Senate Labor and Industries Committee plans hearings early in March on labor's bills to increase unemployment compensation benefits. The House Labor and Industries Committee hasn't done anything yet on the measures to boost industrial accident payments.

Highways—The House-passed bill to issue a million dollars worth of highway construction bonds hasn't received Senate consideration. The bill for a \$12,600,000 bond issue to modernize the southern end of the Oregon Coast Highway has been introduced, but nothing has been done about it. The measure to start planning of the highway bridge over the Columbia River at Astoria has been approved by the House Highway Committee, and it now is in the Ways and Means Committee.

Reorganization—Measures to create the office of lieutenant governor, add a member to each house, and to abolish the Liquor, Fair and Unemployment Com-

mission, as well as the Board of Control, haven't been considered by committees yet.

Power—The Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee plans to act next week on the House-approved bill asking Congress to build a high dam in Hells Canyon.

Development—Gov. Holmes' bill to create a state development department seems headed for approval, although Republicans doubt if it will accomplish its purpose of bringing new industry to the state.

Welfare—There has been nothing done on legislation to repeal the relative responsibility law, or to reduce the payments under it.

Elections—The many election reform bills haven't been considered yet by committee.

Veterans—The Senate will vote Monday on a House bill to extend educational aid for World War II veterans until June 30, 1959. The House Military Affairs Committee held a hearing Friday on the Korean veterans maximum \$600 bonus, but little enthusiasm was generated.

Sen. Knowland Hints Interest In Governorship

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Sen. William F. Knowland created a fresh stir among California Republicans Saturday with a letter that kept them guessing on his possible candidacy for governor next year.

The Senate Republican leader wrote President Robert F. Kennedy that he would "make my position clear when I reach a final decision."

The letter was dated Jan. 28, shortly after Knowland announced he would not seek re-election for personal reasons. Craig gave no explanation for its delayed disclosure during the CRA state convention here.

His release to newsmen—and the reference to "a final decision"—rekindled speculation that Knowland would oppose Gov. Goodwin J. Knight for the Republican nomination for governor.

Dock Workers Finally Settle

NEW YORK — Some 45,000 dockers from Maine to Virginia were ordered back to work today. Their return marks the end of a 10-day strike of East Coast ports.

Following settlement of union localities in Baltimore and Hampton Roads, Va., William V. Bradley, president of the International Longshoremen's Assn. (ILA) said yesterday: "This time we mean it. The men go back to work." He made the announcement after New York longshoremen voted 8,829 to 4,017 to ratify the contract.

The ILA, which shipped a master agreement with shipping employers last Sunday and Bradley is used a back-to-work order Wednesday. The edict backfired Thursday when longshoremen in other ports refused to return to work until the Baltimore and Hampton Roads disputes were settled. Baltimore fell in line Thursday night and Hampton Roads yesterday morning.

Joseph Nance Appointed Liquor Administrator

PORTLAND — The new Oregon Liquor Control Commission administrator is Joseph A. Nance, 51.

Nance, now general manager of the Oswego Lake Country Club near here, succeeds W. H. Baillie, whose resignation became effective this week.

He will assume his new duties about March 15. Until then Barney Lucas of Gearhart, one of the three members of the new commission appointed by Gov. Robert D. Holmes, will be acting administrator.

Nance has lived in Portland since 1935 when he arrived to become assistant state director of the federal Housing Administration. Later he was appointed public relations director of the agency in the 11 western states.

He later served on the Portland Housing Authority staff.

Mistrial Is Declared In Mitchell Law Suits

FOSSIL — Circuit Judge E. H. Howell declared a mistrial Friday in the suit of nine Mitchell residents who sought \$200,000 damages from the state because of flood damage last summer.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs indicated they would ask another trial later.

The judge upheld an objection by the state that one of the plaintiffs' attorneys had led a state witness into a prejudicial statement.

The plaintiffs had contended state road construction changed a water runoff course in such a way that the town was flooded when a cloudburst hit the hills.

Rock 'n' Rollers Storm Theater To See Favorite

NEW YORK — Times Square which rocked 'n' rolled Friday quivered again Saturday from an outpouring of thousands of ecstatic teen-agers bent on seeing their favorite kind of show.

Focal point of the bedlam is the Paramount Theater at 43rd St. and Broadway.

It is featuring a week's run of the movie, "Don't Knock the Rock," also a rock 'n' roll stage show starring Alan Freed, a local disc jockey who claims to have invented the term.

Saturday's turnout as the second day opened was much smaller and far more orderly than Friday—and police far more experienced at their task of restraining the exuberant youngsters.

From 4 a. m. Friday until midnight there were 20 hours of near pandemonium in and around the movie house.

The youngsters, clad in dungarees and other attire favored by much of today's youth, literally stormed the area, pushing, shoving and scrambling to get inside.

Once in, they stamped, screamed and climbed atop seats, beating out ear-splitting time to the rhythms. Gangs of boys roamed the aisles and corridors.

Police rushed reinforcements until there were 175 engaged in trying to preserve order. A group of private officers tried to cope with the melee inside.

Two girls were hospitalized with leg injuries. Scores suffered barked shins, sore feet and bruises. They lost shoes. They littered the area with remnants of lunches and other brought along—and sometimes tossed them at policemen.

Said the 35-year old Freed, himself overwhelmed by his gigantic success: "They are not bad kids, they are just enthusiastic. If the kids let off steam here, they won't be doing it somewhere else."

Missile Escape Cause Reported

ALAMOGORDO, N. M. — The commanding officer of the Holoman Air Development Center says the escape of a Matador guided missile Thursday was due to the failure of two electronic self-destruction systems.

The unarmed missile escaped from White Sands Proving Ground and soared at an altitude of 35,000 feet toward the Rocky Mountains, about 700 miles northwest. The \$100,000 weapon has not been found and the search for it has been called off.

Maj. Gen. L. L. Davis, Holoman commander, told a news conference yesterday the two self-destruction systems were checked and approved by the Army before the missile was fired. He said missile safety was the Army's responsibility.

Davis said he was not attempting to place the blame on the Army, but was merely offering assurance that every precaution had been taken.

The self-destruction systems were designed to destroy the Matador in flight if it should go astray.

Georgia Calls For Impeachment

ATLANTA — The Georgia Legislature completed its 1957 session by adopting a resolution calling for impeachment of six members of the U. S. Supreme Court and killing a bill to ban interracial sports and social activities.

Gov. Marvin Griffin praised the legislators for "holding the line on taxes" and strengthening the state's segregation defenses.

In a brief appearance before adjournment yesterday, the Governor lauded adoption of the resolution charging six members of the high tribunal with what the document described as "high crimes and misdemeanors" in connection with their sedition and racial decisions.

Opponents of the measure described it as a "stupid thing" and "a bit of tomfoolery."

Nehru's Congress Party Faces Tough Election

NEW DELHI — In the small South Indian state of Kerala, Prime Minister Nehru's Congress party is facing perhaps its toughest battle in the Indian general election.

Kerala, where polling begins next Thursday, is the one state in India where the Congress party appears to be fighting an uphill battle against the Communists and Praja — People's — Socialists. It is the only state that has ever failed to give the Congress party a legislative majority.

The Congress position in Kerala led Prime Minister Nehru to schedule campaign tours through this state tomorrow when voting is to start elsewhere in India.

Conciliatory Resolution For Cyprus Shows Favor

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — The U. N. General Assembly is expected to give overwhelming approval next week to a conciliatory resolution calling for new negotiations on the Cyprus dispute.

The Political Committee adopted the resolution last night and sent it on to the Assembly for final action. The same 80 countries are represented in both bodies.

The committee vote was 76-0. Afghanistan and Panama abstained. Hungary and South Africa were absent. The vote represented a victory for V. K. Krishna Menon, India's foreign minister, who had introduced the resolution only six hours earlier.

SEATTLE — The pluck of little Bobby Long softened The Rock Friday night and the former world's heavyweight boxing champion dug deep to help the legless nine-year-old.

Bobby lost both legs when run over by a freight train in a railroad yard near his Everett, Wash. home last December. The youngster said he was searching for bottles he hoped to sell to buy a Christmas present for his mother.

While being taken to a hospital he pleaded with the ambulance driver: "Don't let mommy see me like this."

The plea touched the hearts of boxing fans and other well-wishers who contributed \$700 to a special Bobby Long fund. Bobby was brought here for the presentation ceremony during the Golden Gloves boxing tournament Friday night. The Rock—ex-heavyweight king Rocky Marciano, who was guest referee—was asked to give the money to Bobby.

Marciano took Bobby into the ring and after hearing the story quietly added a \$100 bill to the fund. Al Weill, Marciano's former manager who was at ringside, contributed another \$100.

Big Ten Okays Aid To Athletes

CHICAGO — The Big Ten Conference approved a new financial aid program for athletes Friday and, without saying as much, hoped that other major conferences would follow suit.

The plan provides an athlete with room, board, books, tuition and fees based upon his need. To determine a youth's need, his parents must file a financial statement with the Big Ten.

Through this statement, a separate agency, the Intercollegiate (Big Ten) Conference Financial Aid Service, will determine how much money—if any—a family will contribute towards an athlete's education.

After a figure is reached, the school desiring the athlete will underwrite part of the rest of the expenses needed for the school year.

Oregon College Upsets Oregon Tech By 58-56

NEW YORK — Ron Delany, the turkey-trotting Irishman from Villanova, faces the sternest opposition of the year in his bid to sweep the indoor board circuit tonight in the National AAU track championships in Madison Square Garden.

The Olympic 1,500-meter champion from Villanova goes up against Fred Dwyer, a Villanova alumnus, and László Tabori of Hungary in the featured mile race of a star-studded meet that has drawn 254 assorted entries and promises at least a couple of new indoor records.

PORTLAND — Portland University staged a last-half
