

# Indians Defeat Lions In Overtime

## Grove Rally Knots Score In 4th Frame

Eight overtime points by Roseburg's Indians netted them an important 53-47 District 5-A-1 victory over Cottage Grove Friday night on the Lions floor and kept them in the thick of the battle for second place in the circuit.

With regulation time finding the teams in 45-45 tie on a Cottage Grove comeback, the locals took complete charge in the three-minute overtime period to outscore the losers, 8-2.

The Lions' Leon Hayes, and Indians' Larry Sloan, capped Cottage Grove's last-minute rally in the regular play period with a tying field goal from the key hole in the final five seconds of the game.

Indians Back In Lead  
Roseburg hopped right out to a 51-45 advantage in the first two minutes of overtime on successive free throws by Larry Sloan, Wes Jackson and junior varsity graduate Bob Steele. Each hit two.

With a minute left, Cottage Grove's Bob Woodworth scored on a hook shot, but Roseburg's center Tom Barron came right back with a layin to settle the scoring and the issue.

The Indians took the lead at the beginning of the game and held it throughout until the 45-45 tie. In the early going, the locals took a 9-7 first period ending lead and closed out the half with a 25-23 margin as each team tallied 16 points in the second quarter.

Shot Goes 60 Feet  
Roseburg led by three to five points during this time and had a four-point lead until the final seconds of the game when Sloan uncorked a desperation 60-foot two-handed heave that fell through the twine.

Barron, who turned in an outstanding backboard game with 25 rebounds, took control of the boards in the second period and his play with Brady Montgomery's three field goals and Sloan's field pair kept the Indians in command.

The Indians maintained a three to four point lead in the third period, but a Cottage Grove layin at the period's conclusion made the score 38-37, Roseburg.

Roseburg Loses Ball  
It was the same story through almost all the fourth stanza as Roseburg stayed ahead by two to four points. The locals had a 45-43 lead in the final minute, but lost the ball out of bounds.

With eight seconds left the Lions brought the leather down court and fed to Hayes who fired on a line from the key to tie it up with three seconds left.

Steele, elevated to varsity for the first time, came through with two clutch field goals while Roseburg was maintaining its third period pace in addition to his two overtime free throws.

High scoring honors were taken by Hayes with 20, while Sloan had 14 for the Indians. Jackson and Montgomery had 11 each.

A 63-54 triumph by Drain over Willamette Friday night and Oakridge's 59-53 success over St. Francis placed the two winning teams in next Tuesday's final round league game with the second half title at stake.

Should Drain win next Tuesday then the two teams would be deadlocked for the second title and would necessitate a one-game playoff to decide the second half championship. Of Oakridge wins, then the two teams go into a best of three game series to decide the league championship and the state tournament berth.

Drain was the first half champion. If they should win Tuesday and then win the one-game playoff with Oakridge to decide the second half title, then no further playoff would be necessary.

Drain's Warriors removed Willamette from further consideration in the Emerald League second half title chase and set the stage for next Tuesday's showdown battle with Oakridge by defeating the Wolverines 63-54 in a give-and-take struggle at Eugene.

The Warriors came through principally on the strength of Virgil Merrill's 29 points, including 17 out of 17 straight free throw conversions. Merrill had to be at his best in order to outpoint Willamette's high-scoring 6-3 center Bill DeYoung.

DeYoung scored 25 points in the derby and also got 17 free while missing four.

Team-wise, Willamette had the edge at the free throw line with 28 out of 30 tries, but the Warriors outshot the losers from the field 19 to 13. Drain made 25 of 30 free throws.

Drain won the game in the final half after trailing most of the first two periods. In the third period, the winners outscored Willamette 19-12 and in the fourth by 16-11.

Drain took a 53-51 lead in the fourth period on two Merrill free throws and after Mickelson got one for the Wolverines, Drain attempted to stall out the late stages of the game. Merrill then sneaked in for a crumple and after DeYoung got two more free throws, Gary Seaton broke Willamette backs with another layin.

## K-F, Eugene Take Count In Prep Play

Klamath Falls and Eugene, the No. 1 and 2 teams in the Associated Press' Oregon high school basketball poll, suffered shocking upsets in Friday night games.

Two of the other teams in the top 10 were defeated, too.

Ashland, playing a deliberate ball control game, handed Klamath Falls its third loss in 17 games, 30-59, in a class A-1 Southern Oregon Conference (District 5) contest. Medford, No. 6, and Klamath's chief competitor in the conference, was idle.

Eugene's rush to a Midwestern League (District 5) title was slowed when it lost to North Bend, 61-40. Eugene, now with a 16-3 record, runs into more trouble Saturday night on the Marshfield court. Marshfield, which upset Eugene earlier in the season, prevailed over Springfield, 61-49, reversing an earlier defeat.

Astoria, the No. 5 team, was surprised by Gresham, 53-49. Central Catholic of Portland, No. 3, won its 17th of 19 games when it beat Hillsboro, 72-41. Central can clinch the Metropolitan League (District 3) title by beating Astoria Saturday night. It already is assured of a berth in the class A-1 championship tournament at Eugene next month.

Grants, sixth-ranked in the state, continued on top in the Portland League with a 64-49 victory over Washington. Lincoln, No. 10, remained close behind by thumping Cleveland, 67-51. Jefferson moved into a tie with Benson, No. 9, for third place in the league with an 8-9 contest of Wilson. The league sends three teams to the state tournament.

Pendleton, No. 8, virtually clinched a place in the District 7 playoff, to start March 1, by defeating Hermiston, No. 7, on a 66-62 score. It was Pendleton's victory in 20 games and Hermiston's third loss in 19 starts.

McMinnville Wins  
McMinnville wrapped up the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League (District 4) title and a playoff spot with a 65-51 win over Newberg while runnerup St. Helens was losing to West Linn, 70-67.

In the Valley League (Sub-district 8) North Salem surprised South Salem, 51-49, to move into a tie for second place with its city rival. Albany continued in first place with a 63-47 triumph over Lebanon. Corvallis just about eliminated Sweet Home from title contention, winning 59-54.

The state's four unbeaten teams preserved their perfect records. Madras made it 18 straight by trimming Redmond, eastern Sub-district 8 champion in class A-2, 33-28. Madras is a class A-2 team.

Elkton Wins 21st  
Elkton ran its string to 21 with a 72-44 victory over Days Creek. It is favored to win a class B state tournament berth in a playoff next weekend.

Knappa and Sisters, two other class B schools, stretched their records to 21 and 17 unbeaten games, respectively. Knappa was handily defeated by Corbett, 30-28, but Sisters dominated Maplin, 52-46.

## 2 Locals Qualify In Golden Gloves

Roseburg boxing fans last night were treated to some of the finest amateur boxing matches seen in this area in many a year.

Little Billy Kempe of Roseburg probably thought his opponent was on stilts as the local boy lost a decision to Rex Howe of Medford who was approximately six inches taller and had nearly six inches of reach on him. This was a 90-pound bout, and Kempe just couldn't get in where he could reach his man.

The Miller brothers of Glendale, Dennis and Virgil, split their bouts with 100-pound Virgil punching out a decision over Charles Kimball of Medford and 80-pound Dennis dropping a decision to Bill Atkins of Medford.

Out of 11 Douglas County entries, two won qualifying matches Friday night, five others qualified automatically for the finals by virtue of byes and four lost matches in the preliminaries.

Winners Friday night were Virgil Miller of Glendale who defeated Charles Kimball, Medford, in the 100-pound class and Allen Richter, Roseburg, who TKO'd Leroy Umberger of Medford in the second round of their 139-pound clash.

Automatic qualifiers from Roseburg were 80-pound Jimmy Cummins, 125-pound Roy Marshall, 155-pound Johnny Green, 135-pound Bill McSpirrit and 175-pound Dick Gilman Jr.

Richter of the Roseburg YMCA used a good left jab and sharp leg combinations to pound out a second round TKO over Umberger. Referee Tim Lester stopped the bout in the second round as Richter had his opponent cornered on the ropes and peppered him with solid lefts and rights.

Powers TKO Victim  
Jackie Powers of Roseburg went down to a second round TKO to one of the top amateur boxers of the state, Larry Lewis of Medford, in a 119-pound engagement. Experience was the story of this fight as Jackie put up a game fight until Lewis' straight right crosses sent him to an early shower. The ref stopped the bout with Powers in trouble but still willing to slug it out with his sharper opponent.

In probable the best fight of the evening, Johnny Renfro of Coos Bay pounded out a unanimous 125-pound decision over Dennis Lynch of Eugene. It was a beautiful crowd pleaser from start to finish with Renfro using his educated left and Lynch countering with right crosses and uppercuts.

The first two rounds were pretty evenly exchanged by the boxers with Renfro pulling it out with a closing rally in the third. Renfro earned the decision but not without an outburst from the "ring-side referees."

Quick Win Gained  
Quickest TKO of the evening came in the 112-pound ninth bout when Gary Johnson of Eugene, utilizing a terrific overhand right, stopped Stewart Schroeder of Medford in the first round.

## Basilio Kavoes Saxton In 2nd

CLEVELAND (AP)—The lethal left hook which belted challenger Johnny Saxton into second-round oblivion last night boosted welterweight champion Carmen Basilio into a middleweight title match with either Gene Fullmer or Sugar Ray Robinson.

Before the cheering had stopped over Basilio's routing victory in the "rubber" match with the two-time ex-champion, he was on his way up a notch in class.

Harry Markson, managing director of the International Boxing Club, settled it when he said, "We want to match Basilio in July in Yankee Stadium against the winner of the Fullmer-Robinson fight in Chicago, April 24."

Fullmer took the middleweight crown from Robinson in January, and the April date is a rematch. Rated off his performance last night in the nationally televised scrap, there's little doubt Basilio will jump at the chance to trade punches in the 160-pound class although he went against Saxton at 147.

The third meeting of Carmen and Johnny, each of whom has held the welter crown twice, was a far cry from the first two. Last March in Chicago Saxton used hit and run tactics to gain a disputed unanimous decision, a decision which cost Basilio the crown.

Saxton Beaten Badly  
In September, at Syracuse, Basilio got the laudable back with a technical knockout, but he needed nine rounds to do it.
