

Elderly Persons Eligible To Live In Housing Units

Units in Rosewood Homes are now available to elderly single persons or groups of unrelated elderly persons, the Douglas County Housing Authority announced today.

This change in policy means that single persons 65 years of age or older are eligible for low-rent housing, according to Hans J. Hansen, chairman. The new policy conforms to a change in the Housing Act which was approved by Congress.

Presently the authority has suitable units available for this type housing only in Rosewood Homes here where a supply of one-bedroom units is available. Any single elderly person interested in such housing should contact the housing authority for information, Hansen said.

Charles Dondero, executive director, said only those single elderly persons who are able to get around and manage for themselves would be considered; and that housing for the house-bound, bedridden, senile, those with serious recurring illness and those unable to perform daily housekeeping tasks could not be considered. It has become increasingly evident that housing for the elderly is urgently needed, Hansen pointed out. He said figures show that one-person families increased from 9.2 per cent to 12.6 per cent between 1930 and 1940 and has grown since then.

The chairman went on to stress that statistics show practically all of those aged persons who are living alone on small incomes must put up with seriously inadequate housing conditions. "It was in order to assist this segment of our population that the housing commissioners adopted the policy of admitting single elderly persons or groups of unrelated elderly persons."

Accused Klamath Slayer Is Adjudged To Be Sane

KLAMATH FALLS — Guy Earl Cramer, 76, must stand trial here on a first degree murder charge March 18. Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg said Wednesday as he rejected a contention by defense attorneys that Cramer was mentally deranged. The court finding came after two doctors testified the man was sane.

Cramer is accused of killing the county welfare commission chairman, Fred Peterson, 75, after the commission had turned down Cramer's request for increased payments Jan. 4. Two other county officials were wounded.

Pre-Induction Plan For Local Boys Set For Study By YMCA

A pre-induction training program for youths in the Roseburg area is being planned by the Roseburg YMCA, and several Y representatives will be in Portland Friday through Sunday to learn of the program's operation.

Lloyd Crenshaw, YMCA president, said the program will be worked through churches and other organizations, using an outline compiled by the YMCA organization. The program is nationwide. The Portland meeting will be of the Pacific Northwest Area "Y" Council.

Crenshaw said the increasing problems confronting teen-agers entering the military services, many of them away from home for the first time in their lives, has led the armed services department of the "Y" National Council to project the program.

By a program of physical and emotional conditioning, it's believed an upgrading of quality of service rendered by draftees may result. The program has the approval and advice of military and naval leaders, Crenshaw said.

He added: "We expect a young man to leave school and home to become an adult for two years, then in most cases return home to the status of a pre-adult for a year or two. This doesn't make sense to a lot of people, and the 'Y' intends to help arm the young men from this community to get ready for the experience."

The Northwest "Y" council also will discuss YMCA planning for the next 10 years, Crenshaw said. Problems of the future, he said, include financing, recruitment of volunteer help and identification of the people which the organization serves.

Glendale School Board To Consider Applications

The Glendale School Board Wednesday night set a special meeting for Saturday night in which applications for school superintendent will be considered.

The board originally received about 15 applications from persons seeking to replace James Pate in the office. There are fewer being actually considered now because the applications have been screened, according to Mrs. G. B. Fox, News-Review correspondent.

The board also issued a call for bids on supply of fuel oil and gasoline to the district. The bids must be submitted by March 13, the day before the regular board meeting.

Fire Hydrants Installed In Downtown Sutherlin

Sutherlin is installing new fire hydrants in the downtown area and safety features at the city's water filter plant, C. Dean Smith, city manager, said.

Buildings are being installed around water tanks and overflow mechanisms are being put in at the filter plant. The plant is also being lined with plywood to prevent freezing, Smith said.

The building was frozen for 24 hours during the last cold spell, he said. Eleven thousand feet of eight-inch cast iron pipe is on order by the city, Smith said. The main will be installed about the last part of March on West Sixth Avenue. The main will complete a line which was started last year.

A one block area on East First Avenue was flooded Tuesday when a storm drain was plugged with debris. City street crews are replacing the culvert. Smith said he did not believe there was any property damage caused by the flooding.

Conflicting Versions Given On DiMaggio's Wrong Door Raid Staged In Hollywood

LOS ANGELES — A state Senate committee's inquiry into a bungled raid aimed at catching Marilyn Monroe in adultery resumed Thursday with these possibilities looming:

A perjury charge, resulting from opposite versions of the affair given by crooner Frank Sinatra and a private detective.

The calling of former baseball hero Joe DiMaggio, Miss Monroe's ex-husband, to testify, A committee source says DiMaggio has been asked by letter to appear but no reply has been received.

The committee is investigating the raid in its search for the sources of sensational stories appearing in scandal magazines.

Marilyn Monroe was the objective of the raid, in which investigators invaded the wrong apartment. But most of the testimony in yesterday's opening session concerned this point: Did Frank Sinatra actually take part in the fiasco?

The issue never was resolved. Also left unanswered were these questions:

How did the raiding party happen to smash the wrong door at a small apartment house where Marilyn was helping a girl friend wash dishes?

Why did Joe DiMaggio, the famed home run slugger, insist upon the raid two weeks after Miss Monroe had divorced him?

And was Sinatra merely a reluctant chauffeur for DiMaggio or an active participant in the raid? Sinatra led Wednesday's parade

Myrtle Creek Schedules Public School Hearing

A public hearing on the 1957-58 Myrtle Creek School District budget has been scheduled by the school board next Monday at 8 p.m. in the Myrtle Creek primary building.

Supt. Al Neet said anyone having questions about the budget of \$594,964.13 may have the floor. The proposed budget is almost \$54,000 lower than the current year's budget of \$748,453.07.

Neet told correspondent Ruth M. Evans that the reason for the decrease is a drop in the number of pupils expected. This means less teachers and capital outlays.

The district is under the jurisdiction of the County Rural School Board. The board must examine the budget figures and approve them before the county-wide vote for the Rural School District in the spring.

Frank Malloy Ordered Cited For Contempt

he was under indictment in Oregon for extortion and extortion conspiracy.

Malloy, business agent for Teamsters Local 223, used the stock phrase "I decline to answer that question" to a long series of inquiries.

But Malloy got mixed up several times and said he refused to answer "because it might intimidate me." "Pardon me," he corrected, "I mean might tend to incriminate me."

Finally, Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) summarily ordered his staff to draw a resolution citing Malloy for contempt.

McClellan said the witness had made "capricious" use of the constitutional protection by refusing to answer questions under cross-examination, after having given answers in the same "area" in interrogation.

He said Malloy had sworn he had no business relations with Crosby other than union business, but refused in cross-examination to tell whether they had discussed pinball and other rackets.

Recessing the public hearing until 3 p.m., McClellan ordered Malloy to stand by for possible further questioning.

Earl, first witness of the day, described himself as a lifelong member of various unions.

Under questioning, he said he had been arrested twice—once for a fight at a union convention and once for picketing.

After Earl's testimony, Elkins came back to the witness chair and testified that a pinball company which he described as Teamster backed could have made "fantastic" profits of a quarter of a million dollars a year.

He said the pinball company was the Acme Amusement Co., and was formed by his brother, Fred Elkins; Joe McLaughlin, Seattle gambler; Verla P. Wright, Portland pinball machine operator, and Herman Walter, an associate of Wright.

He and Thomas Maloney, Seattle and Spokane gambler, were "silent partners" and would have shared in the profits, Elkins said.

Elkins had told the committee that McLaughlin and Maloney were working with Teamsters Union officials who Elkins contends were trying to get into Portland rackets.

Elkins said there was an agreement that the Teamsters Union wouldn't let other pinball operators establish machines in taverns and business places.

"Then the union wasn't trying to get new members but was trying to blackmail people out of business," Sen. Mundt (R-SD) said.

"That's right," Elkins replied. "They were simply using the union as a club to put Acme into business."

"That's right," Elkins said. Teamster pickets would halt deliveries of beer or other deliveries to any tavern or other business with a pinball machine not bearing a "union sticker."

As to income from the machines, Elkins said it was impossible to estimate the daily return from a single unit.

"These new pinballs," he said, "are a lot faster than slots (slot machines)."

Earl related that in the election he was actively opposed by the Oregon Joint Council of Teamsters, the Teamsters' newspaper, and by tavern operators and others who he said were influenced by the Teamsters.

But he said he continued to keep political support from "rank-and-file union members," although opposed by the Teamsters leadership.

Earl said he had been an active opponent of pinball machines in Portland for a number of years. He said the Teamsters Union displayed no interest in "organizing pinballs" until 1955.

Then, he said, Crosby came to him at a asked support for a pinball licensing ordinance. He said the request was coupled with a threat of political opposition if he didn't.

"I guess he thought since I was from labor, I'd be their champion," Earl said. But he said he continued to oppose pinball licensing.

Earl said he had been a member of the Carpenters and International Woodworkers unions and now belonged to the State, County and Municipal Workers Union.

He said the Teamsters could have had no interest in pinballs from a membership standpoint because it would take less than 100 employees to service machines throughout Portland.

Earl was asked what reasons were advanced as to why the union wanted to organize the industry and get it licensed.

"What happened was they did organize the industry and they had to deliver, and what they had to deliver was an ordinance licensing pinballs," Earl said.

But "they just didn't have the votes" on the five-member city council to get the ordinance, he said.

The Rev. Ellsworth Tilton, chairman of the Roseburg School Evaluation Subcommittee on Exceptional Children, said his committee is trying to determine if the emotional child is a responsibility of the school system.

The Rev. Mr. Tilton gave his preliminary report at a meeting of the committee Wednesday night at Central Junior High School. He said his committee is also trying to determine their responsibility in two other fields. These are to formulate a program for possible help of exceptional children and the evaluation of work now being done. Mrs. Gordon Stewart, chairman of the school district subcommittee, reported that her group will co-ordinate part of their report with the final part of the transportation subcommittee.

national organizer for the Teamsters Union in Oregon, made his statement available to newsmen in advance.

He accused Elkins of trying to "make crooks and racketeers out of teamster officials" and at the same time establish himself (Elkins) as a baron of the rackets in the city.

Elkins testified the Teamsters union successfully opposed Mayor Fred L. Peterson in the last election because, he said, Peterson didn't cooperate in plans to expand the city's vice operations.

He said he was told earlier that Crosby had been designated to see Peterson "and tell him to change the chief of police if he wouldn't play ball."

Crosby's statement said the union supported Terry Schunk, who became the new mayor, because the teamsters hoped he would "end Mr. Elkins' stranglehold on the city."

The Senate committee intends to quiz officials of the Teamsters Union, including Dave Beck, its president, and Frank W. Brewster, head of its Western conference.

Robert F. Kennedy, committee counsel, said Brewster had been "invited" to hear Elkins' testimony but did not show up. He said Brewster now has been "ordered" to appear Monday.

Elkins described himself as a front man for a combine of union officials and racketeers from Seattle, Wash., who, he said, were attempting to muscle in on Portland rackets in which he said he was entrenched.

He named Thomas Maloney and Joseph McLaughlin, Seattle gamblers, as kingpins in this move and alleged that Brewster was backing them. Elkins said Brewster warned him in 1955 that he might end his days in a lake wearing "concrete boots" if he should "bother my boys."

He said Brewster named the "boys" as Crosby and William Langley, Portland district attorney.

Tape Recording Played Back In Courtroom

and under "no pressure in any way."

"I accused her" of being unfaithful to me," the tape played. "She told me where she was at a certain time to see friends," and the people denied even knowing her.

Geisler said on the recording that he didn't take any conscious aim at his wife as she turned back through the door but that he "looked around the sights."

He stated on the tape that he and his wife had argued earlier in the evening but not loudly because "the children were still up." When asked by Sanders when he first made up his mind to shoot his wife, Geisler answered that it was "a few minutes before Mrs. Gano left."

Geisler also said on the tape that his wife was conscious after she fell to the floor and that she called to Mrs. Gano for help.

Dr. Munroe Testifies

Following the tape recording, Dr. Allen B. Munroe was called to the witness stand. Dr. Munroe testified that he was Mrs. Geisler's physician and that he was called to the emergency room of Douglas Community Hospital the night of Jan. 29.

He stated that Mrs. Geisler was suffering from "considerable shock" and was bleeding externally and internally. He testified, with the aid of four X-ray pictures taken of Mrs. Geisler on that night that a "foreign metallic object" had entered her body from the front and lodged just under the skin on the back side. He stated that Mrs. Geisler died at 9:25 p.m.

Tr. Munroe also testified that he was asked to perform an autopsy on Mrs. Geisler at the Chapel of the Roses following her removal from Douglas Community Hospital.

The court recessed at 10:45 a.m.

Defense attorneys Eldon Caley and Donald S. Kelley raised objections during the morning session on the use of the X-rays brought by Dr. Munroe and entered as state's exhibits on the grounds that it was "not relevant."

Judge Woodruff overruled the defense on each of the objections.
