Seattle Dumps Portland Again

EVERETT, Wash. — Seattle University capped its second best season in history Wednesday night with a come-from-behind victory over Portland U. 90-81.

It gave the Chieftains, who are bound for the National Invitational Tournament, a regular season record of 22-2 against collegiate competition, and with two victories over the AAU Buchan Bakers of Seattle thrown in topped the mark to 24-2.

Portland gave the Chiefs all they could handle until about the final six minutes when substitute guard Lloyd Murphy popped in five straight points to make it 83-75 Seattle. It was enough to put the Chieftains out of danger.

Elgin Baylor picked up "only" 28 points, compared to 31 the night before when Seattle beat Portland 105-95 at Seattle, but still held his place as the nation's third highest scorer with an average of 30 points a game.

The night's top scorer was the lower Gene Kufsch, who surprised the SU defense with some underneath field goals to wind up with 29 points, 25 of them coming in the first half when Portland rolled up a 50-44 advantage at the recess.

Trims Lead
It took Seattle only two minutes in the second half to trim Portland's advantage and move ahead 54-52. Wally Panel paced a briefly for the Pilots that put them back in front at 57-56 but the Chieftains retaliated with 13 straight points while holding the visitors to three.

SU stretched the lead to 75-64 before the Pilots put together their last serious bid to move within three points at 78-75 six minutes before the end. After the rally fizzled, Seattle made a run-away of the game.

Dick Stricklin picked up 22 points for Seattle.

Baylor Holds Down Nation's 3rd Spot

The battle for the major college basketball individual scoring title remained unchanged Wednesday night, when Seattle's Elgin Baylor scored only 28 points to hold third place.

Baylor dropped 69 of a point on 11 field goals and six fouls in Seattle's 95-81 victory over Portland. His average is now 20.00.

Columbia's Chet Forte, in fifth place, boosted his average to 29.14 when he hit for 33 points, as the ions defeated Cornell 80-62.

Spring Training Looms But Majors Harassed

Baseball today faced a long list of problems a day before the opening of spring training — and chief among them was a catcher for the New York Giants.

Staggered by the sudden ending of Bill Sarni's active career because of a heart attack, the Giants were appraising a list of available receivers of major league caliber to bolster their weak backstopping corps. Cincinnati's hard-hitting Forrest (Smoky) Burgess was reported to be the No. 1 choice.

Other major league clubs, including the world champion New York Yankees, were faced with an annual problem — unsigned stars.

Career Ended

Sarni's four-year major league career was ended yesterday when doctors said the 29-year-old catcher had suffered a heart attack in Monday's opening workout.

Giant President Horace Stoneham said that Sarni likely will be kept on as a coach to insure his getting a five-year pension. He is two thirds of a year shy of qualifying.

Burgess—often traded verbally, but still a Redleg — was being sought by New York as a first-string catcher. The Giants now are down to two, the veteran Westrum and Bob Schmidt, of the Texas League. Most often mentioned as becoming a Redleg is pitcher Ruben Gomez.

Larsen Unsigned

The Yankees signed Tommy Byrne, the veteran left-hander,

and infielder Bill Skowron — but Don Larsen remained unsigned. He is reportedly seeking \$22,000, about a 50 per cent raise over his 1956 salary.

The Boston Red Sox had five headaches — outfielders Jim Pier-sall and Gene Stephens, infielders Ted Lepcio and Billy Klaus and catcher Sammy White. Ted Williams and Mickey Vernon reported to camp and pitcher Rudy Minarcin agreed to terms.

Philadelphia collared fleet Richie Ashburn. Pitcher Art Houtteman signed with the Cleveland Indians.

Beaver Tankmen Favored To Win

CORVALLIS — Oregon State will be a strong favorite to dethrone the University of Washington in the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division swimming championships which open here Thursday night.

The undefeated Beavers topped the Huskies 52-34 in a dual meet during the regular season. Washington has won the Northern Division title the past six years.

Teams from Washington State College and Idaho also will participate but Oregon, which dropped the sport earlier, is sending only one man, Bob Hays. He will be defending champion in the 200-yard butterfly.

The meet will end Saturday afternoon.

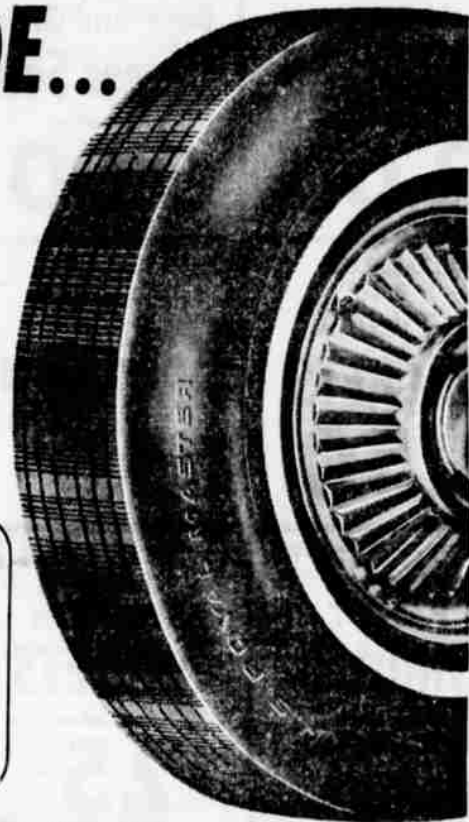

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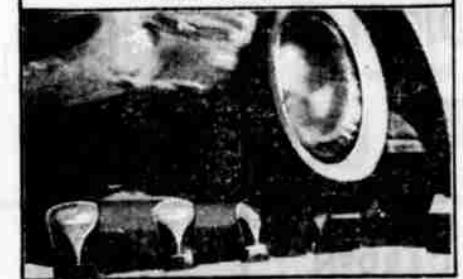
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
