Restaurant, Bar Open In Hotel Grand Thursday

Two new establishments, a restaurant and bar, valued at \$30,000 will open in the Grand Hotel Thursday morning, according to Ed Moore, owner and bar manager. The restaurant has been named the Timber Grill and the bar, the Timber Room. A special feature of the bar will be a "Speed Bar," which is a system in which liquors come from the basement to the bar through pipes. The bar consists of approximately 1,000 square feet of floor space. The Timber Grill has a seating capacity of 40 persons, according to Jim Lambert, restaurant manager. Lambert has been owner of Luck's Coffee Shop for the past eight years. His son, James Jr., will manage the coffee shop. A specialty of the Timber Grill will be seafood along with barbecued meats. Both the bar and restaurant have indirect lighting and plywood walls. Partners in the restaurant and bar are Paul Ryan, Dale Alight and Ed Moore. The bar is scheduled to open at 7 a.m. Thursday and remain open from 7 to 2:30 a.m. each day. Tentative hours for the restaurant are from 8 to 2:30 a.m.

Newspaperman E. E. Maxey Passes Monday

SPRINGFIELD — H. E. Maxey, former newspaper publisher and chairman of the Oregon Water Resources Board, died Monday at the age of 64. Maxey published the Springfield News for 31 years until he sold it in 1954. He was long active in fighting Willamette Valley flood control and served for many years as vice chairman of the Willamette Basin Project Commission. He was named chairman of the state Water Resources Board when that agency was created 70 years ago. Maxey would have been 65 today. He was born March 5, 1890 in Merced, Calif., and was married to Marian Turner in Springfield, in 1920. Surviving are the widow and two sons, Norman and Bruce, all of Springfield. Maxey had been in ill health a past year and in hospitals several times. An attending physician said death was due to a heart condition. Funeral services are being arranged by the Buell Chapel in Springfield.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Kelley of Canyonville; two brothers, Cpl. George W. Jr. in the U. S. Army, stationed at Ft. Huachuca, Ariz., and Charles of Canyonville; two half-sisters, Mrs. Brownie (Eileen) Low and Mrs. James (Betty) Ellingson, both of Bandon; and his grandmother, Mrs. James Lowery of Alhambra, Calif. Vault interment will follow the services in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

10 Counter-Terrorists Indicted For Murder

ALGIERS, Algeria — French authorities Tuesday indicted 10 counter-terrorists for murder. The move may cause political repercussions in France. They were part of a group of 22 Frenchmen charged with the torture murder of suspected Algerian rebels. Five have been set free, provisionally, and the rest are still being questioned. Both the extreme right and extreme left in Paris are expected to make an issue of the arrests. The Communists have long charged the French colonialists with such measures. The extreme right has long hinted they would be justified.

Voice Changing Big Problem To Choir Boys

Every year millions of teen-age boys go through the process of voice changing. But to a lad with a fine voice like those of the Vienna Choir Boys, the voice change can be a menacing fate, writing period to an active and exciting career. The choir appears tonight in Roseburg at 8:15 at Central Junior High School auditorium, the last of a series of five Roseburg Community Concert Assn. presentations. Voice changing is one of the many problems the world-famous organization faces on such extensive tours as the one that brings it here. Often a 13 or 14-year-old leaves the choir's home, the Augustin Palace in Vienna, with a beautifully even scale up to a high C, and returns six months later a tentative and uncertain tenor or baritone. The moment this happens, and it almost always overcomes the singer without warning, the boy's service with the choir is ended. If a boy wishes to develop a fine adult voice, what care should he take during this period? "Stop singing the minute the voice begins to break," the group's conductor says. "Only in about one case in a hundred, and then only with expert supervision, can a boy continue to sing through these years. Until he is at least 17 and usually older, he should take care not to over-exercise or strain his vocal chords. If he does, it may result in hardening the chords and damaging the frequency and freedom of vibration." There's no guarantee, even with the greatest care, that a boy's soprano voice of great beauty will carry over its fine quality to manhood. The changes that the body goes through are too great. The acclaimed boy singer may, simply because of nature, develop into a garden-variety baritone, ideal for vocalizing in the shower but not much else. When his voice tumbles from its lofty perch, a Vienna Choir Boy is no "has-been," however. He is still a "member of the family" and the organization cares for him and sees him through his education toward any future he has in mind. It's a short career but a very desirable one with its opportunity for travel and excellent education as a benefit. So coveted are the positions in the choir that when it was reorganized after World War II, more than 7,000 children applied for admission. Only 100, however, could be accepted.

Jackie Gleason Given Ouster From Stork Club

NEW YORK — Celebrated comedian Jackie Gleason has now joined the ranks of those who've gotten the celebrated bouncer at the celebrated Stork Club. The TV star staged an impromptu off-camera performance which was a bit too much off-color for club proprietor Sherman Billingsley. Witnesses described Gleason's act as closely resembling that of the character, "The Loudmouth," he often portrays on his shows. Billingsley said, however, that Gleason overdid the part when he played it at the club late Monday night—not only was he loud, he was downright obscene. After a bit of a tussle, it was said, the comedian was escorted right off the premises. Moreover Billingsley decreed, as he has in the case of other impolite patrons in the past, that the latch-string will not be out hereafter for Gleason. It was all a bit vague, but this appeared to be the sequence of events. Gleason, with an unidentified blonde on his arm, arrived at the club on East 53rd Street about 11:30 p.m. after a call at another celebrated saloon, Toots Shor's. Shor and Billingsley are something less than bosom pals, though that had nothing to do with this case, apparently. Anyway, Billingsley said Gleason became loud and boisterous as soon as he and the blonde were given a table. Gleason was requested to leave. He refused. Gleason then was ordered to beat it. Still he kept every one of his portly pounds glued to the chair. That's when the tussle began. When it was over a few moments later, Gleason and the blonde were outside.

Rose City Transit Co. To Keep Buses Running

PORTLAND — The Rose City Transit Co. has agreed to keep its mass transportation system running here in return for a fare increase, two Portland city councilmen said Monday. Commissioners Nathan Boody and Ormond Bean said the council will vote next week on a compromise plan under which the transit firm would increase weekly passes from \$2.75 to \$3 and have a single ride fare of 20 cents. The present plan under which three tokens can be bought for 50 cents would be discarded. The councilmen said fares might undergo another adjustment when the transit firm's books are audited. The firm threatened to quit operations in Portland March 22 unless it got a fare increase.

Ireland On Eve Of Vote; Valeria Trying Comeback

DUBLIN, Ireland — Tension gripped Ireland Monday on election eve, sparked by fears that the outlawed Irish Republican Army (IRA) might strike a dramatic gesture of defiance. Although the campaign was the quietest since Southern Ireland's 26 counties won independence in 1922, special emergency precautions were taken along the jittery frontier separating the republic from the six British-ruled northern counties of Ireland.

American-born 74-year-old Eamon de Valera, in fighting trim though nearly blind, has wound up a strong campaign to win back the premiership. De Valera's Fianna Fail (men of destiny) appeared out front in the campaigning for the republic's 18th national election Tuesday.

The election was forced by the resignation of a coalition government led for the past three years by John A. Costello, mid-man, 65-year-old Dublin lawyer. Sinn Fein, political arm of the illegal IRA, has entered a slate of 19 parliamentary candidates as a show of strength. The Sinn Feiners say they would not take their seats in the Dail (Parliament) even if they won, as a protest against the partition of Ireland. The established political parties, though favoring uniting the country, have condemned the IRA's recent armed raids into Northern Ireland as a futile way of solving the problem. Six of the 19 Sinn Fein candidates are serving jail terms for terrorism, but a strong sympathy vote for their party could have a tremendous influence on the incoming government.

Producers Here Observe 'Marsh Egg Month'

Douglas County producers are observing "Marsh Egg Month," and a proclamation by Roseburg Mayor Arlo M. Jacklin has designated this month as such.

S. Van Zee, branch manager of the Oregon Egg Producers Assn., pointed out the importance of the industry to the county. He cited 1954 figures which he said approximate those of 1956. They showed that some 145,000 hens laid 2 million dozen eggs, bringing 290 farmers a \$619,000 gross.
