Killam Demands Morgan's Resignation From Position

SALEM (AP)—Rep. Graham Killam, Portland Republican, Tuesday demanded the resignation of Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan as a result of testimony before a U. S. Senate committee investigating labor racketeering.

In a letter to Gov. Holmes, Killam said Morgan "was involved in an illegal transaction of an offer from the Teamsters Union to support you financially (\$10,000) in your campaign for governor, in return for you appointing one of their people to the liquor commission."

Killam wrote that "since he (Morgan) failed and neglected to turn this information over to the attorney general or the proper district attorney," he was asking Morgan's removal on the ground of criminal neglect.

In his testimony before the committee, Morgan said that Holmes, then the Democratic gubernatorial nominee, rejected a campaign offer from the Teamsters.

Meanwhile, George Brown, political education director of the Oregon State Labor Council, AFL-CIO, issued a statement denying Teamster Union officials in Portland led a move in 1956 to endorse state Sen. Carl Francis, Dayton Republican, for attorney general in opposition to incumbent Robert Y. Thornton, a Democrat.

Commenting on Morgan's testimony concerning labor inducements in last year's campaign, Brown said "the two Teamster officials serving on the board of the Oregon State Federation of Labor did not initiate" an endorsement of Francis, or attack Thornton.

"After the merger of the two state labor bodies in June into the Oregon State Labor Council, Carl Francis was again unanimously recommended by the executive board of that body," Brown said.

"At no time was the executive board of either state body approached by any Teamster official, to my knowledge, to attempt to secure the endorsement of Francis or any other candidate for that position."

"The record should be made clear that Francis received the recommendation of labor upon our belief in his ability and integrity and for no other reason."

Myrtle Creek PTA Meeting Rescheduled

The change was made because the scheduled meeting date fell during spring vacation, according to correspondent Ruth M. Evans.
