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Church Activities

Bible Collector Scheduled Here

Dr. Guy J. Wright, professor of
the Old Testament at Northwest
Christian College in Eugene, will
be guest speaker Sunday at the
Westside Christian Church in Rose-
burg.

He is scheduled to speak to the
combined youth and adult classes
during the Sunday school hour and
at the 11 a.m. worship service. His
two topics are entitled "The Eng-
lish Bible" and "The Bible: What
it is, where it came from and how
we got it."

Following the service, he will be
guest at a potluck dinner, after
which an informal question-and-
answer period will be staged.

At the evening service, begin-
ning at 5:30, he will show colored
slides to the Christian Endeavor
group. He will also show a movie
of a tour he made of the Holy
Land in 1954.

During his visit in Roseburg, Dr.
Wright will have on display more
than 200 items of Scripture and re-
ligious objects. Among these will
be one of the smallest Bibles in
the world.

Also included will be a Hebrew
Torah scroll Dr. Wright brought
back from Jerusalem. It is more
than 100 feet long. One sheep-
skin section of an Orthodox Hebrew
Torah scroll written by an official
scribe was given to Dr. Wright by
a high priest of the Samaritans and
was one of the treasures of the
scroll of a Palestinian synagogue.

Dr. Wright also will display a
miniature scroll case containing
the 10 commandments in Samari-
tan dialect and a new testament
which saved the life of a soldier.
He said some of the bibles in his
collection date back to the original
printing of the Geneva Bible in
1560 and a reprint of a William
Tyndale New Testament of 1525-
1534.

The public is invited to hear Dr.
Wright and see his Bible display.

beachhead.

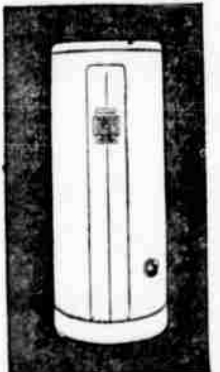

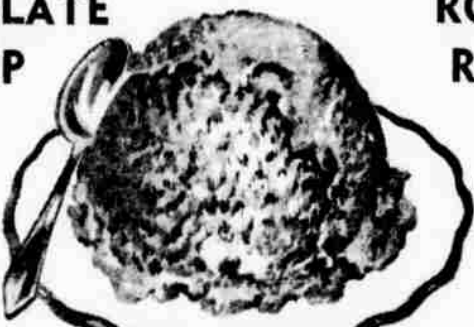
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
