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Urban Planning Aid May Be Possible For Sutherland Area

Urban planning aid for Sutherland may be possible under a federally approved urban planning assistance grant. Sutherland is among 10 cities for which the Urban Renewal Administration approved a grant of \$59,400 for studies of population, economic trend, land use, drainage problems, zoning, subdivision regulations, streets and highways and traffic and parking. Money given to the city of Sutherland for the studies must be matched by local funds. Last year Sutherland approved the use of \$5,000 from the municipal budget for that purpose. Money was also to be granted by the Douglas County Planning Commission, according to C. Dean Smith, Sutherland city manager. The planning commission has been empaneled since the agreement was discussed. The general planning activities authorized in the preparation of master plans for the 10 cities will be carried on by the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon. The federal grant is authorized on a dollar-for-dollar matching basis under the Housing Act of 1954 and is limited to communities having a population of less than 25,000 people or to metropolitan or regional planning agencies. The State Legislature has authorized the University of Oregon to act as the state's planning agency. Congressional appropriations for this program now total \$4 1/2 million. No state may receive more than 10 per cent of the national program.

Ex-Mayor Lee Tells System Used In Vice Cleanup

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former woman mayor of Portland, Ore., said today it just took law enforcement to clean up vice and corruption there during her four-year term. "I didn't have any trouble," added Mrs. Dorothy McCullough Lee, now head of the government's Subversive Activities Control Board. She said, however, she had to cope with constant agitation from the underworld and "people whose toes were stepped on."

Hammar-skjold Says Israelis Have Complied

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold announced Friday that Israel has fully complied with U. N. demands that it withdraw from the Gaza Strip and the Sharm El Sheikh area of Egypt. At the same time, he reported to the General Assembly that he had made arrangements for the U. N. refugee agency to assist the U. N. emergency force in the temporary administration of the Gaza Strip. The secretary general gave no indication of what his long-term recommendations would be for either the Gaza area or the Sharm El Sheikh area of Egypt. He said his understanding was that the assembly had given him authority to work out future arrangements "in the light of further study and consultations." Hammarskjold's report was circulated as the 80-nation assembly prepared to wind up the current phase of the Middle East debate. The assembly also had before it the application of newly independent African country, Ghana, for U. N. membership.

Dr. Homer M. Noble appeared on behalf of the chamber of commerce to ask the council for \$1,000 from the budget for a summer recreation program. The council voted approval of tennis courts on the old city hall grounds which the Beta Pi sorority has offered to put in. An application for street paving funds for the next year will be sent to the highway commission, Mrs. Edes said. 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Mayor Schrunck Demands Lie Detector Test

test, Schrunck acknowledged he had been told by Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton that the results "were adverse." But he insisted he did not consider that statement conclusive without being provided details, which he said were withheld. "The attorney general," he testified, "brought an expert up from California to give some tests and I agreed to take one. All of a sudden the expert disappeared and another person gave the test." He said that was why he regarded as inconclusive the information he was given on the result. In other developments in the far-ranging inquiry: 1. Council Kennedy told Schrunck that committee investigators have found in Portland 35 gambling places and houses of prostitution which Kennedy said are operating "wide open, some on split shifts."

Schrunck said he doubted the accuracy of Kennedy's list, which was not made public, but added: "It's conceivable. Things like that do happen. I can assure you, sir, as fast as we find 'em we close 'em."

2. Schrunck said he has been told by two prostitutes and a federal narcotics agent in Oregon that Elkins, his principal accuser, is a narcotics addict. He said he did not know whether Elkins ever had been arrested as an addict.

3. Schrunck produced an affidavit bearing the signature of Portland policeman Richard A. Sutter, which said that for more than a month last year, when Schrunck was county sheriff, Sutter had been assigned by police department superiors to watch Schrunck's house. The affidavit said Sutter's superiors "were afraid the sheriff would get up sometime during the night and leave his home and go out and knock over some of their bootleg joints or gambling establishments or some of their illegal enterprises."

4. Sen. Wiley (R-Wis) said in a Senate speech there should be a "tax blitz" inquiry by the Treasury Department into the extent to which "bribe-taking and gangster-consorting union officials have evaded their fair share of federal income tax."

A few minutes before Schrunck returned to the witness stand for a second day, Committee Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) announced that a lie detector test had turned up reactions "indicative of superstition" on the part of Portland night club owner Nathan Zusan.

McClellan made the announcement as the special committee opened its eighth day of hearings. They have concentrated on alleged attempts of Teamsters Union bosses, along with public officials and underworld elements, to "muscle in" on Portland vice profits.

Mrs. Helen (Big Helen) Hardy, an admirer of "call house" madam, had testified she paid Zusan for sending customers to her from his night club, the Desert Room.

She said she opened her place with assurances from Zusan and a gambler, Thomas Maloney, described as friendly with high Teamsters Union officials, that she need have no fears of being closed up by Multnomah County Dist. Atty. William Langley, a Democrat.

Zusan had demanded that a lie detector test also be set up for the Hardy woman, but she had returned to her present home in Miles City, Mont., before the test was arranged for Zusan. The committee has said it is trying to reach Mrs. Hardy to see if she is willing to take a test.

Results of the lie detector test given to Zusan were reported in a letter from U. S. Baughman, chief of the Secret Service which administered the test. McClellan read the report slowly and distinctly as Zusan followed a copy he held while sitting at the witness stand.

"Analysis of the test results," Baughman wrote, "by the polygraph specialist who conducted the examination reveals specific reactions which are indicative of untruthfulness on the part of Mr. Zusan in his responses to the relevant questions."

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County Native Dies Thursday

Ialo D. Stephens, 61, lifelong resident of Douglas County and a veteran of World War I, died at the Veterans Administration Hospital Thursday evening following a prolonged illness.

He was born at Oakland, Sept. 30, 1895, the son of Robert L. and Theodosia Fate Stephens, a pioneer Douglas County family. For more than 30 years he operated the Stephens Auto Co. in Roseburg and in late years was employed at the Umpqua Hotel.

He was a life-long member of the Christian Church; a charter member of the Umpqua Post No. 16, American Legion; Vulture No. 1221, Forty and Eight; Laurel Lodge No. 13, AF and AM; Laurel Chapter No. 15, Royal Arch Masons; Ascolon Commander, No. 14, Knight Templars; Hillah Temple of the Shrine; Roseburg Shrine Club, and the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club.

Surviving are his wife, Jane Stephens of Roseburg; a son Ialo D. Stephens Jr., of Calgary, Alberta, Canada; and a daughter, Mary M. (Marge) Stephens of Portland.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Monday at 2 p. m. with Dr. R. L. Dunn officiating. Ritualistic services will be conducted under the auspices of Laurel Lodge No. 13, AF and AM. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Woman Charges Husband Proved Much Wedded

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A Los Angeles woman charges that the man she thought was a millionaire oilman-sportsman turned out to be, in reality, an ex-convict who married "numerous and sundry" women for money.

Mrs. Virginia Clawson, 47, estimated Raymond W. Clawson's marriages at six. She said she was No. 5.

Clawson, 63, made more than a half-million dollars from his many wives, she alleged in a six-page complaint for divorce or annulment, filed Thursday. She said he never divorced any of his wives.

She said that she loaned Clawson \$60,000 during their marriage, which began in Las Vegas in May, 1932, and ended when they separated in Mexico last April 19. She said she spent most of the \$60,000 on an 85-foot yacht—on which she said he now lives at Acapulco, Mex.

After their separation Clawson invited her to his sixth wedding, and simultaneously asked her for more funds. The complaint said the sportsman's wives were listed in Mrs. Clawson's complaint as Louise Russell, Phyllis Mottique, Kathleen Albea and Marty Schauman and, after her own marriage to Clawson, a sixth marriage to Doris Sexton in Mexico. They were not otherwise identified.

Sanitarians Attend Mosquito School

Three Douglas County Health Department workers recently completed a three-day school in control of disease — carrying insects — at Oregon State College.

Persons attending the school were Joseph M. Gates, Fred Lamouraux and R. F. Shukie. Special emphasis was given at the school to fly and mosquito control. The County Health Department and Boy Scouts of the Douglas Fir District are planning a drive March 30, to inform the public on how to kill mosquitoes. The day has been designated M-Day.

The three-day school at Corvallis was sponsored by the State Board of Health, Oregon State College, U. S. Public Health Service, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture entomology research branch at Corvallis.

It is held each year at OSC to keep public health and county sanitation workers abreast of latest insect control and importance to human health and comfort.

Army Demonstrates Newest Brain Child

DETROIT (AP) — The Army gave a public demonstration Thursday of its new electronic computer that a spokesman said will save millions of dollars and man-hours in keeping track of Army supplies throughout the world.

The \$1,100,000 machine, largest of its kind in the world, reduces months of paper work to minutes of push-button operation. Developed by the Radio Corp. of America and named "Birmac" is installed at the tank-automotive command here. It takes up the space of about half a football field and requires 100 highly trained persons to operate it.

Birmac works by electric impulses which are "memorized" by magnetic tape, which, in turn, can be added, subtracted, divided or multiplied by its parts.

Charles S. Diehl, chief of the command's electronic data processing branch, said Birmac can take inventory, catalog spare parts, prepare manuscripts for catalogs, forecast supply requirements and produce budget summaries at electronic speeds. It can print at the rate of 600 lines a minute.

It can complete in 48 hours, an inventory which a year ago took three months.

Maj. Gen. Nelson M. Lynde Jr., chief of the command, said Birmac could "contribute importantly to our job" by streamlining operations and freeing personnel for other jobs.

Recruits Claim Blows Only Taps From Instructor

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C. (AP) — Several Marine recruits testified Thursday that a drill instructor charged with hitting them actually only tapped them.

The testimony came in the court-martial of Cpl. William R. Walsh, Lyndhurst, N. J., charged with 24 counts of hazing and maltreatment involving 11 members of Recruit Platoon 399. It is the fourth such trial here in less than a month.

Pvt. Edmund L. Ramie, Water-town, N. Y., one of the recruits, said he was told to sign a statement or go to the brig. He said the statement contained the word "hit" but Ramie said he never claimed to have been hit, "only tapped."

Walsh's civilian counsel, lawyer Fred W. Shields of Mount Vernon, Va., then asked, "Did Capt. Morgan tell you it was the truth and to sign it or go to the brig?" "Yes, sir," Ramie replied.

The officer Shields mentioned is Capt. Pat Morgan, Austin, Tex. Of the recruits who testified all except one, Pvt. David Lee Porter, 18, Hartford, Vt., said blows Walsh is accused of delivering on them actually were "taps."

Porter is the recruit who started the investigation of Platoon 399 from which have originated three preceding courts-martial in this latest flurry of maltreatment charges.
