Flight Of 25 B36s Arrive From Far East

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. — A flight of 25 B36s—the 10-engine, 8-million-dollar bomber which can pack a nuclear bomb 10,000 miles nonstop—began arriving Thursday from a secrecy-surrounded training mission in the Far East.

Earlier in the day, other B36s passed over the San Francisco Bay area on a 9,000 mile nonstop flight from Okinawa to their home base at Roswell, N.M.

The first B36 to touch down here was commanded by Col. Charles B. Screws, 35, of Little River, Texas, who was permitted to say only his plane had been aloft 21 hours and was up 31 hours, 45 minutes on the flight out over the Pacific. Each flight, he said, was made without refueling aloft.

Earlier this week, an Air Force spokesman in Tokyo said several of the planes had been over Yokota Air Base near Tokyo and at least one had landed there. Strategic Air Command offi-
