Farmers Guests Of Rotarians Thursday Noon

Rotarians and their farmer guests heard an explanation of the main differences between U.S. and German farms at Thursday's annual "Farmers Day" meeting.

The talk was given by Siegfried Mahn, former exchange student from Germany who has returned to this country to enroll at Oregon State College. Presently he is living with the Ray Doerners at Roseburg.

He told his audience that one of the chief differences is in the size of farms and said the average German farm is 17 acres. Sixty per cent of the country's farms contain less than 12 acres.

Farmers are not specialists there, he said, and try to raise most of what they use rather than buy. To get the most out of their limited land, farmers are using much artificial fertilizer, Mahn pointed out.

The trend in Germany is toward tractors, Mahn noted. This started after the war but he said small farmers still rely on horses.

In the question-answer period, Mahn said there are no colleges of agriculture in his country but that certain schools have farming classes. Germany has a farmer apprenticeship system and these apprentices must attend such schools for three years.

They then may become journeymen. To become a master of farming a journeyman must wait at least five years before taking the tests.

1957 Camellia Festival Slated
