

Taxi Business Transfer Gets Sutherlin Okay

Sutherlin City Council members approved the transfer of taxicab permits to Earl Cheal at a council meeting Monday night in the Sutherlin City Hall.

Cheal bought the taxi business from Nicholas Bosnyak. Bosnyak had been in the taxi business in Sutherlin for the past three to four months. C. Dean Smith, city manager, said. The business has been named the X-L Taxicab Co. by Cheal.

Among other business transacted at the council meeting was the appointment of two Sutherlin residents to the budget committee. Persons receiving the appointments were Mrs. C. J. Bielmann and Robert Mock. It was decided, by the council, that a budget committee meeting would be held Monday night from 7 to 10 p.m. in the city hall.

The council also gave Smith permission to buy a new billing machine. Approximately \$600 will be spent on it, Smith said.

Councilwoman Hazel Green was appointed president of the council. She will preside at council meetings when the mayor, J. C. Kerner, is absent.

Approval was given for the purchase of 1,100 feet of eight-inch asbestos cement pipe. The council took a low bid of \$3,163. The bid was from Sutherlin and included fittings.

Council members directed Smith to go to Salem to confer with state authorities concerning a mapping program for the city of Sutherlin. After the Salem visit Smith will go to Portland to talk with aerial mapping company representatives.

Dulles made the statement to the SEATO Council of Ministers, which continued closed-door sessions of its third annual conference.

Pro-Russian Spy Given 10-Year Swedish Jolt

STOCKHOLM — Bedros Zartarian, a Turkish-Armenian engineer, Tuesday was sentenced to 10 years at hard labor on charges of "grand espionage" for Soviet Russia.

The 32-year-old engineer will be deported after serving his penalty.

Zartarian denied all charges against him and claimed he had been exposed to "mental torture" by the Swedish security police.

During police hearings he admitted delivering a secret blueprint of a Swedish defense establishment to a Soviet embassy official.

Water Extension Asked

Received a petition signed by about 30 residents of Melrose Rd. asking that the city have the water main extended from the terminal at Micell Village to the sewage disposal plant site. Spokesman for the petitioners, Joe Mathews, said the residents of the area had no fire protection and that wells in the area dried up in the summer. It was pointed out that the city doesn't own the water supply but the matter was referred to the city manager for study and recommendation.

Approved plans and specifications for Maple and Kane St. improvements and set a hearing on the projects for the first regular meeting following the period of last advertising.

Adopted a resolution giving city manager George Farrell authorization to sign acceptance forms for the \$250,000 grant-in-aid money for the construction of the sewage disposal plant.

Gave Farrell and Geddes authority to carry out final negotiations for the land for the plant. Farrell said agreement had been reached to buy the ten acres needed at \$1,000 per acre with \$5,000 to be paid for the house at the site.

Approved the advertising for bids for chain link fence for two sides of the disposal plant property.

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whether Schunk, now that he had answered the questions for the senators, would submit to the Secret Service lie detector.

"No sir," Schunk replied, adding:

"After consideration and after spending 11 days around here, in my opinion this will be settled in the Oregon courts. I'll rest on that."

Affidavit Hits Mayor

After Schunk's testimony, committee counsel Robert F. Kennedy read into the record another affidavit relating to the charge that Schunk, while sheriff in 1953, received a \$500 "payoff" to halt a raid on the 8212 Club where gambling was suspected.

Signed by Kenneth Lindholm, identified as a Portland policeman, the affidavit asserted that Lindholm saw Schunk and Clifford O. Bennett, operator of the club talking on the street.

It said that another officer, Richard Sutter, walked across the street to talk with three policemen standing there.

The affidavit said that Sutter returned to his automobile and "stated he had seen Sheriff Schunk pick up a package beside a utility pole."

The affidavit continued that "Sutter was certain that Schunk had received a payoff of some sort and angrily denounced him as a dirty rotten crook."

PORTLAND — The Central Labor Council here said Monday night it has "full confidence in the ability, integrity and honesty" of Mayor Terry Schunk of Portland.

On a resolution, delegates from labor unions making up the council expressed belief that Schunk when "given sufficient opportunity, will drive the underworld elements out of the city."

James E. Blackwell, business agent of the Auto Mechanics Union who initiated the resolution, said Schunk is the target of "mudthrowing" by "this character, Jim Elkins."

An associate of Elkins, a Portland gambler, accused Schunk of taking the bribe.

Schunk was elected with support of organized labor including the Teamsters Union, which is under investigation by the committee.

TWO SADDLES STOLEN

cation, is the only junior college in the state.

Rep. Tom Monaghan (D), Milwaukie school teacher, indicated he might oppose use of basic school money to support junior colleges on the ground that it might take money from grade and high schools. He suggested a pilot program be set up to give the idea a trial.

The Bend college charges \$195 tuition per year for full-time students, the same as the tuition at the state university and college. This raises \$40,000 a year, paying half the total cost.

Jewell said that before the college was started eight years ago, only 15 per cent of Bend High School graduates got a higher education, but now 48 per cent of them go to college.

Robert W. Chandler, Bend publisher, estimated that the basic school support for eight junior colleges would amount to only about \$200,000 a year, out of the entire basic fund of 37 million dollars a year.

Pay For Parole Board?

Meanwhile, Gov. Holmes agreed to a proposal that the unpaid three-member parole board be changed to a full-time paid board. The governor had recommended that the board be replaced by a single administrator.

The change was proposed by Rep. Norman Howard (D), Portland, who said the paid board idea would have a better chance of being approved by the Legislature.

The House-passed memorial asking Congress to provide funds for construction of John Day Dam hit at least a temporary road block in the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

Sen. Warren Gill (R), Lebanon, proposed an amendment to provide that Oregon be guaranteed a "fair and equitable share" of power from the proposed dam.

Sen. Walter J. Pearson (D), Portland, then asked for time to think it over.

Gill said that he feared that, under the law giving preference to publicly owned power agencies, most or all of the power might go to Washington state.

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Two-Sided Slaughter Continues In Algiers

ALGIERS — French sources reported Tuesday 12 civilians and 36 rebels were killed in Algeria in the last 24 hours. The civilian dead included eight Arabs and two Europeans killed by nationalists, and two train crewmen killed when a mine blew up under their train.

Surviving are three children, Allan of Wenatchee, Wash., Albert and Mrs. Marion (Doris) Moore, both of Roseburg; three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services are scheduled in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Friday at 10:30 a.m. The Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church will officiate. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Melrose Cemetery.

Minimum Minors' Farm Wage Rule Altered

PORTLAND — The Oregon Wage and Hour Commission Monday changed its regulations so the 50-cent an hour minimum wage law will not apply to minors engaged in farm harvests on a piecework or unit basis.

The commission also said at its meeting here that work permits will not be required for minors who work on non-hazardous farm jobs.

The new rulings will go into effect in 60 days.

Twenty-five farmers testified at the hearing that the minimum wage and work permit rules would hamper harvesting.

The attorney general's office had interpreted the commission's regulations as applying to minors working in farm harvests, and the changes were adopted, so they would not. The effect is to continue past practices.

Gambler Costello Free On Bail Pending Appeal

NEW YORK — Gambler Frank Costello has been freed from jail here in \$25,000 bail ordered by the U. S. Supreme Court pending decision on an appeal of his income tax evasion sentence.

Costello has sworn in various appeals courts that he is suffering from cancer, heart disease and ulcers. He told newsmen that he had lost 15 pounds and had a cold for three months.

Costello has served 10 months of a five-year prison term imposed for evading \$28,332 in federal income taxes for 1948 and 1949. He also was fined \$20,000.

Dixon Funeral Set For Thursday At 2

Funeral services for William L. (Will) Dixon, 83, well-known stockman and local pioneer resident, are scheduled at Long & Orr Mortuary in Roseburg Thursday at 2 p.m. Dixon died in a local hospital after a long illness.

The Rev. J. John Adams of the First Presbyterian Church of Roseburg will officiate. Concluding services and vault interment will follow in the family plot in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Imitation Of \$1 Bill Draws 3 Years In Pen

PORTLAND — Edward L. Martin, a 63-year-old cook from Baker, Monday was sentenced to three years in a federal prison for printing an imitation \$1 bill.

Both he and another Baker cook, D. A. Langford, 44, pleaded guilty to another charge of conspiring to violate the federal counterfeiting act. Langford was placed on probation for two years.

Martin testified he made the bills to be used in a scheme to convince investors that crudely made bills could be turned into excellent imitations by putting them in a chemical solution.

Eisenhower Moves In Mideast Situation

U.S.S.R., to arrogate to themselves decisions on matters of vital importance to the nations of the Middle East.

It also said that under the Eisenhower plan, approved by Congress and signed by the President last week, this country intends to undertake "genuine practical efforts" to secure peace in the region "in full cooperation with the Middle Eastern countries."

A possible hindrance to Richards' assignment is the fact that new troubles appear to be building up between Egypt and Israel over the U. N.-occupied Gaza Strip.

Military Force Praised

Eisenhower asked Richards, former Democratic representative from South Carolina, to go to the Middle East primarily to explain what he has in mind for future United States policy under the resolution just passed by Congress.

In this, Congress agreed with an Eisenhower proposal that the United States be prepared to use military force if necessary to oppose any "overt aggression" in the area by international communism.

Well-informed neutrals here reported the Egyptians were in no position now to send military forces in any strength to Gaza. They said the condition of communications across the Sinai Desert to Gaza would put an almost impossible burden on the Egyptians if they attempted to make over defense of the area.

Practically all Egyptian army installations in the Sinai Desert were destroyed by the retreating Israelis.

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River Conditions Said In 'Watching' Stage

River conditions this morning were "not dangerous," but the situation bears watching," U.S. Weather Bureau officials at Roseburg said.

The Weather Bureau gave rain fall and river readings this morning for a 24 hour-period, ending at 8 a.m. Rainfall readings were: Kellogg, 1.05 inches; Curtin, 1.21; Winchester, .97. The snow line at Tiller was down to 2,900 feet. Rainfall in Roseburg totaled .78. The deficiency in rainfall, for the Roseburg area, since Sept. 8, now stands at .37.

River readings were: Kellogg, 17.30 feet and rising; Roseburg, 12.49 and rising; Winston, 14 and rising; Tiller, 8.42 and falling. The North Umpqua River at Winchester crested at 3 this morning at 11.30 feet.

Mrs. Arthur Selby, News-Review correspondent, said U.S. Forest engineer Roy Gaare recorded a 1.38 foot rise in Little River at Glendale at 8 a.m. The Weather Bureau reported rainfall at Little River totaled 1.58. Mrs. Selby said Glendale was having rain mixed with snow and hail this morning.

Snow was reported at Glendale this morning by Mrs. Grace Fox, News-Review correspondent.

Borneo Joins Revolt Against Indonesia Govt.

JAKARTA — Another major unit of the Indonesian republic, Borneo, was reported in rebellion against the central government today. Rumors circulated that the revolt might even spread to Java, virtually all that the Jakarta regime still controls.

High government sources said Premier Amditjojo and his cabinet would resign tomorrow. There was no indication, however, that they would check the other islands' move toward control of their own affairs.

The rebels demand only nominal control from the Javanese dominated government in Jakarta, and particularly that the revenues from their islands' rubber, oil, tin, copra and other resources be used for development at home.

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
