Benson And Lincoln Snare Opening Wins In A-1 Meet

EUGENE — Lincoln and Benson, both Portland teams, won opening games in the Oregon A-1 high school basketball tournament here Tuesday night.

First round action continued Wednesday with six games scheduled beginning at 9 a. m.

Lincoln, the No. 4 team in the final AP prep basketball poll of the season, advanced to the quarter-finals by beating a small but scrappy St. Helens squad, 53-48.

Benson, No. 19 in the poll, had an easier time defeating Astoria, No. 8, 60-50.

Wednesday's morning round sent Klamath Falls, ranked second in the state, against Marshfield, No. 7, and North Salem vs. Ontario.

In the afternoon Central Catholic of Portland, the state's top-rated team, was to meet Redwood, and Graceland of Eugene was to meet Clatsop.

Eugene, No. 3 in the poll, will play Redwood, No. 4, and Astoria, No. 10, will play Clatsop, No. 6, in the 10:30 a. m. games.

St. Helens, trailing 40-30 at the end of the first quarter, scored a rally that gave Lincoln a 44-30 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Andre LaRonde got Lincoln out from again with a field goal in the second quarter and the Panthers were ahead 44-30 at the half. They ruled up their largest lead 40-30 midway through the final period.

Prix was high for the game with 15 points.

Benson started fast and moved to a 14-0 advantage in the first quarter while leading Astoria to a 10-0 lead.

Baskin, Gary Anderson, Ralph Norwood and Gordon Smith helped put Astoria ahead 10-0 with four minutes to go in the half. The teams exchanged a 10-0 advantage several times.

Clatsop kept putting Astoria ahead in the closing minutes of the period.

Benson's Jim Warren tied the score at 23-23 and his two field goals put Benson ahead to stay.

Warren was high scorer with 18 points while Reed led Astoria with 15.

A crowd of 4,000 saw the opening games.

The attendance was well under last year's 6,109 and the record high of 6,300 set on the 1932 opening night.

Wildcats Nudge Reedsport Out

Irrepressible Dick Smith of Glide showed Reedsport and a slim 300 A-2 tournament fans why he is an all-state basketball player Tuesday when he scored 33 Wildcat points to lead his team to a 60-41 triumph over the Braves at Salem.

His total fell one point short of the one-game tournament record of 34 points set last year by Marlin Marsh of St. Helens.

Al Smith, who Monday led all scoring for tournament games with 28, settled for only 6 markers Tuesday, but turned in his usual effective floor and board game.

The Wildcats played turn-about with the Braves Tuesday, treating them almost in the same manner as they themselves had been handled by Madras the day before. Reedsport was in the ball game only during the third period when they closed the difference to eight points.

Glide Starts Fast Monday, Madras held an 18-5 first-quarter lead over the Wildcats, and later advanced that to 40-10. Tuesday, Glide, carved out a 17-4 first-period lead and midway in the second chapter, led 30-8.

With about four minutes left in the second period, Coach Loren Thierion inserted his "blitz squad" sub, and by halftime, Reedsport had closed the gap to 30-20.

With the regulars back in the lineup, the Braves continued to fight back in the third period to outscore the winners, 11-9, trailing by a three-quarter deficit of 31-39.

Then, as he is wont to do, Smith took complete charge of the game in the fourth period, and the Wildcats dashed with a rush to win by 19 points.

Most of Dick's scoring Tuesday came from close to the basket; the big center has had trouble in this tournament, finding the hoop on his favorite 25 to 20-foot jump shots and has been missing from the free throw line. So against Reedsport, he turned to his floor skill to get at the hoop.

Al Smith got the game's first two points on a tip-in, and after Jerry Friese made two free throws, it was 12-0. The Wildcats got nine straight points. Wayne Kennedy scored on a lay-in, Dick took loose for a crumple, Allen hit from 10 feet, and Dick made one of two free throws for a 9-2 Glide lead.

Dick's potted pivot shots before and after Roy Burns' baseline shot. Burns' lay-in for 20 feet and Dick smacked one in from eight feet, making it 17-6 at the quarter.

Wildcats Catch Fire Reedsport's Hubert Barker lay-in for Reedsport; the Wildcats ran the count up to 30-8. As Gary Wagner got two gift throws; Dick hit a pivot shot, tip-in, rebound and two free throws; and Eswine fast-broke a lay-in and got a foul shot as well.

Thornion then removed his starters and tossed in the bench, which averages 5-8. At this time also, Reedsport Coach Norm Olson injected 6-4 center Jack Cory into the lineup for his second game of the season. The result was that Reedsport closed the last four minutes before halftime by getting five field goals and two free throws while Glide went scoreless.

Cory laid in three crumples in this rally, and the half closed 30-20. Though outscored 11-9 in the third panel, the Wildcats got five quick points to start the action for a 35-20 lead. These came on Dick's free throw, Kennedy's tip-in and Allen's fast-break bank shot.

Braves Close Gap Reedsport got these back, however, and right before the period ended, they trailed by six, 31-37. But in the final minute of the period, Dick popped in a 15-footer to make it 38-31.

For the first three periods, Dick made 9, 8 and 3 points by quarters, and topped his performance with 13 markers in the fourth panel to apply the clincher.

In the final period, the winners scored seven points to Reedsport's five in the first four minutes for a 45-36 lead, with the Braves pressing, the Wildcats picked up 14 more to Reedsport's 5 in the final four minutes.

Roy Burns topped Reedsport's scoring with 8 markers, while usually high-scoring Lloyd Yandell was held to 2.

Glide hit at a commendable 380 clip from the floor, canning 22 field goals in 38 attempts, and making 16 good of 27 free throw tries. Reedsport was cold, scoring 17 from the field in 60 tries for a 28.3 average, and converting only 7 of 21 free throw attempts. Glide barely out-rebounded the Braves, 40-34.

Fourth Place In Tourney Sure To Come To Douglas

Fourth place in the state A-2 basketball tournament will belong to either of two Douglas County teams, Drain or Glide, after they meet in the consolation bracket finale this afternoon.

The two teams earned the final spots after winning first-round consolation games Tuesday afternoon at Salem.

Glide eliminated Reedsport from the tournament, 60-41, and Drain knocked Cascade out, 58-42.

Today's Glide - Drain tilt was scheduled at 2:30, matching the county's two best - record A schools of the regular season.

During regular season play, the Warriors had an 18-4 mark and Glide was right behind with 14-4. The two schools haven't played one another this season or for several years.

Reedsport finished its season with a 18-10 record, winning the District 2-A-2 title and the Coast League championship. The Braves, coached by Norm Olson, lost their first round tournament game Monday to Dayton, 54-46.

Elon team, Lutheran star Chuck Curtis was held to 14 points, but teammate Roger Iverson took up the slack with 24.

On Wednesday's round, Pacific Lutheran was paired against Stetson, Fla., and Portland University was scheduled against Tennessee State.

With Spivey on a scoring spree, Southeastern Oklahoma, lost, no time in turning its game with the Idaho school into a rout. Southeastern led 42-18 at the half and used reserves most of the second half.

Pacific Lutheran demonstrated its power with a strong second half surge to defeat the stubborn Nazarene 58.

Warriors Trip Cascade, 58-42

Drain outscored Cascade in the third period of its first-round consolation effort at the A-2 basketball tournament in Salem Tuesday, and went to defeat the Cougars, 58-42. The Warriors were led by Virgil Merrill's 27 points.

Merrill found the range in this game up to his regular season capabilities and led the winners to an early second-period lead, then sparked his mates as they spent the rest of the game resisting Cougar rallies.

The issue was in doubt until near the end of the third period. During that eight-minute interval, Drain got 19 points to Cascade's 7, and that proved to be enough for a 44-29 lead going into the fourth quarter. That proved to be sufficient cushion for the win.

The lead-changing first period ended 12-11 in favor of the Marion County team. But Merrill connected on a hook shot and two free throws to start the second stanza, and Drain a 15-12 lead. Except for one tie at 17-17, the Warriors led the rest of the way. Merrill with eight points, and 6-1-for-11 Frank Jacobs with six, scored all of Drain's second-period points, and by halftime, the count was 25-22.

The 6-3 Merrill got 13 points in the third period on six field goals on a variety of shots near the basket and a free throw to lead the 44-29 three-quarter margin. The best Cascade, without a scoring star, could manage was one field goal and five free-throw conversions in the third period.

Drain came through with 14 markers in the final period to Cascade's 13 as both clubs fouled in wild ball exchanges. Drain went into a semi-stall with six minutes left and outscored the losers to the basket and to the ball, and by the 45th, had their biggest margin of the game.

Drain fired a hot 426 from the floor, making 29 shots good of 47 taken. The Warriors hit 18 of 29 free throw tries. Cascade shot a slow 245, hitting on 13 out of 53 field shots, and 16 of 25 free throw attempts. Drain out-rebounded Cascade, 35-28.
