

Several Blood Products Available For Medical Use

Dr. Bernard Pirofsky, medical director of the Northwest Regional Blood Center of the American Red Cross in Portland, told the Douglas County Medical Society this week that several blood products are now available to doctors through the Red Cross.

He was the featured speaker at the society meeting. His subject was "uses of whole blood and blood derivatives."

He told members present that five blood products may be secured through the Red Cross by physicians. They are: Serum, albumin, fibrinogen, gamma globulin, plasma and anti-hepatitis plasma.

Serum albumin is used in shock cases and kidney and liver disease; fibrinogen for stopping hemorrhages in pregnancy and other bleeding cases; gamma globulin for measles and hepatitis and in rare diseases where the body does not produce Gg to prevent infection.

A new type of plasma is available which will not give jaundice to the recipient. It is used in severe cases to combat shock and to replace body proteins. Anti-hepatitis plasma is a special frozen type used to treat patients with hepatitis.

Dr. Pirofsky continued his visit in Roseburg Wednesday to meet with local hospital technicians to review techniques being used in laboratories to type blood and to determine safety of giving blood to patients.

Dr. Pirofsky supervises all medical operations at the regional center and works directly with practicing physicians in development of the blood replacement program.

He is a 1950 graduate of New York University College of Medicine.

violating laws as to attempted bribery of federal employees. McClellan said the committee would meet any "challenge," and Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.) declared: "Goon squad methods applied to the U.S. Senate will not work."

Hoffa, in a statement down town, said he had done nothing wrong and would fight the charges.

Once Langley had refused to answer questions McClellan, ordered the playing of the recordings. These were purportedly made secretly by Elkins.

McClellan said so much of the language in the recordings is "obscene and vulgar" they could not be heard in public, but that full transcripts are available to the committee.

Langley fidgeted as the squeaky tape recordings were played into evidence.

Elkins, who swore he had the recordings made and that they had not been "altered" in any way, sat not far from Langley and called out the voices as he said he recognized them.

The reference to the "screwball in Salem" was in a recording Elkins said was made Aug. 22 by "boggins" a room in a Portland apartment building in which Langley, McLaughlin and Tom Maloney, another Seattle gambler, were talking.

Maloney and McLaughlin have been named by Elkins as agents of Teamster bosses in trying to determine safety of giving blood to patients.

The transcript, as the committee recorded it in writing, continued: "Langley: You can't have 'em going because he'd-I'm telling you, he's nuttier on prostitution than he is on this thing."

McLaughlin: That's right. And now, with this thing here if he—uh—if you're not on his side, Langley: He'd try to hurt me somewhat."

McLaughlin: How long is he in there for?

Langley: Well, he gotta defeat him and us, he's in there until, uh, next year. They have to defeat him next year or it will be a nightmare for four more years. This B—

Maloney: Oh, he'll get beat. There's no chance for him. Langley: I don't know. Maloney: Well, all right. I'm just telling you. I know politics. Elkins has said the purported Aug. 22 conversation discussed a plan to "frame" him because Langley suspected him of holding back on revenues from various rackets.

At one point the recordings went on: "Langley: I don't—ain't got no patience with the S—O—B. He's no good. He's cheated me and he's horsing you guys around. You got too much—yous have too damned much patience with him. He's a no good bastard. He won't treat anybody right, except a bunch of those dizzy policemen I guess, or some of them, some of them (pause). Trys to, uh—He's don't to you just exactly like he did to me. He lied to me, a month for four years. (laughter)."

Elkins said Langley, in this passage, was referring to him.

Centennial Site May Be Shifted To Fairgrounds

SALEM — Holding of Oregon's 1959 centennial celebration at the state fairgrounds in Salem was favored Thursday by three legislators who hold the purse strings.

The Oregon Centennial Commission proposed holding it in Portland, and asked for a \$1,100,000 appropriation in finance it.

The plan to hold it in Salem was advanced by Chairman Clarence Barton (D), Coquille, of the House Taxation Committee; Chairman Robert Steward (D), Keating, of the House Ways and Means Committee; and Chairman Walter J. Pearson (D), Portland, of the Senate Taxation Committee.

Pointing out that \$500,000 of the appropriation would go toward rehabilitating the main building at the fairgrounds, probable site if the proposed trade fair were held in Portland, Barton said the money could better be spent on improvements at the state fair.

Steward and Pearson agreed. All three said that Portland residents, by using the new Portland-Salem Freeway, could get to Salem about as quickly as they could get to the P.I. grounds.

Gov. Holmes said he is inclined to agree with them.

While the Centennial Commission predicted that the \$1,100,000 could be repaid by admission fees and concession charges, Gov. Holmes expressed his doubts that the trade fair would draw as large crowds as predicted by the commission.

Sen. Alfred H. Corbett (D), Portland, chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee, said he won't decide on a site until it is determined whether Portland's proposed Exposition-Recreation Center would be completed by 1959.

Pearson said, however, there isn't a chance of completing the E-R center in time, and that the proposed \$3 million dollar Portland Armory wouldn't be built by then, either.

Pearson said his stand won't be popular in his home city of Portland.

Northwest states and countries on the Pacific Ocean would be invited to take part.

Two More Of Family Die From Accident Injuries
ALBANY, Ore. — Paul Launer, 49, and his son, Paul Launer, 26, both of Selma, Calif., died in a hospital Wednesday of injuries suffered in a Sunday Pacific Highway crash near here.

Two other sons, Lloyd Launer, 23, Berkeley, and Joseph Launer, 17, Selma, were killed outright in the accident.

The California family had been en route to Portland to attend a wedding when the car collided with a freight truck.

Joseph Launer, driving at the time, apparently lost control of the car when it hit a gravel shoulder, Coroner Walter Kropp said.

Mrs. Lloyd Launer, 18, remained in the hospital here Thursday. She suffered two broken legs in the accident.

FCC Recommends Denial Of PNP For Snake Dams

WASHINGTON — The Federal Power Commission (FPC) staff recommended Thursday denial of an application by Pacific Northwest Power Co. (PNP) for a license to build the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams in the Snake River.

The legal and engineering staff said instead that there is urgent need for a larger flood control dam and reservoir downstream at the Net Perce site.

PNP's two-dam plan, which would prevent construction and operation of Net Perce, "is not best adapted to development of the water resources involved," the staff said.

The staff added in a brief filed with FPC examiner Edward B. Marsh that PNP's application should be denied without prejudice. This would permit PNP to request a license for the Net Perce project.

Marsh held hearings on PNP's application last year. He will consider staff recommendations in making an initial decision on the application, which will be subject to review by the FPC.

The Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams would cost an estimated 113 million dollars and have power generating capacity of more than a million kilowatts.

Public power groups are opposing the application on grounds Net Perce would more fully develop the Snake River's resources.

PNP was organized by these private power companies: Montana Power, Pacific Power & Light, Portland General Electric, and Washington Water Power.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. A. C. Seely of Roseburg, and Mrs. Grace Lutz of Myrtle Creek; a son, Clifford J. who died in 1915 and many nieces and nephews.

High Teamster Boss James Hoffa Arrested

lines and in the courts against the forces opposed to trade unionism. Hoffa said.

"This is not the first instance when a labor leader has been unjustly accused."

The accusation against Hoffa, 44-year-old vice president of the Teamsters Union, was that he hired John C. Cheasty, a New York attorney, to get a job with the special Senate committee and provide Hoffa with information from committee files. The Senate group's inquiry so far has centered on Teamster affairs.

Both the FBI and Senate Committee Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) said Cheasty had cooperated fully in the mounting investigation that led up to Hoffa's arrest. Kennedy said Cheasty worked as "a double agent."

The FBI said that when Hoffa was seized, "he had in his possession documents from the committee files which he had just received."

Soon after Hoffa's arrest, he was taken before U.S. Commissioner James Spahn on charges of violating the federal bribery statutes.

McClellan said the alleged bribe by "Mr. Hoffa is clearly indicative of the steps that the gangster elements are undertaking and will continue to undertake to hinder, hamper, obstruct and destroy this committee."

The arrest of Hoffa, head of the Central States Conference of Teamsters, marked a dramatic new turn in the Senate probe, which thus far has been concentrating on allegations that West Coast Teamster officials allied themselves with underworld figures and some public officials in an effort to control vice and gambling.

Thus far, Hoffa's name has not figured in the committee's hearings, although the Senate investigations subcommittee — which began an earlier probe along the same lines — announced in September it planned to talk with him.

The FBI said Hoffa "is reported to have hired Cheasty Feb. 13 in Detroit, Hoffa's home city, to obtain a job with the special committee."

"At that time," the FBI said, "Hoffa paid Cheasty \$1,000 and offered to pay him a total of \$18,000 to report to him during the committee's investigation."

McClellan said in a statement: "The information came to us more than a month ago that Mr. Hoffa was undertaking to plant some one on the committee's staff to report to him during the investigation, to keep him informed of the committee's plans and of any information the committee might obtain or possess that would be of interest to him."

Kennedy said Cheasty had been on the committee staff for about three weeks.

He described the documents involved in the case as "extremely important." He said they were given to Cheasty by the committee in the knowledge that they would be passed along.

Documents involved, Kennedy said, were "two staff interviews with certain key people, a copy of a telephone interview between a member of the staff and a future witness, and other documents."

The FBI said Cheasty "fully cooperated" in the investigation. McClellan voiced gratitude to Cheasty "for his great courage and patriotic devotion." He said Cheasty would stay with the committee "so far as I know."

In Seattle, Dave Beck, president of the Teamsters Union, said, "I can't conceive that he (Hoffa) would do such a thing." He declined to say more.

Hoffa — a short, heavy set man — is reputed to be the real power in the Teamsters Union, which claims 1 1/2 million members.

Not only does he head the Central States Conference, but he also controls the Teamster organization in the South and along a large part of the East Coast.

Texas Oil Man To Hunt Abominable Snowman
KATMANDU, Nepal — Texas oil man Tom Slick left Thursday for the wild Himalayan area of eastern Nepal to launch a natural history expedition that will include a hunt for the Abominable Snowman.

Slick and his party were flying to Biratnagar and will push off from there Friday with seven Sherpa guides and 65 porters on an eight-day trek to Iowa Khola.

Nepalese living in the area believe the snowman is a huge, hairy two-footed monster that inhabits the slopes of the world's highest mountains. The only purported evidence of its existence ever found has been bear-like footprints in the snow.

Danish Atomic Physicist Winner Of Peace Award
NEW YORK — Danish atomic physicist Niels Bohr is the winner of the first \$75,000 atoms for peace award set up as a memorial to Henry and Edsel Ford.

The award to Bohr, 71, was announced Wednesday by James R. Killian Jr., chairman of the trustees of Atoms for Peace, Inc., a nonprofit corporation financed by the Ford Motor Co. Fund.

Bohr, who won the Nobel Prize in physics in 1922. Since 1920 he has been director of the Institute of Theoretical Physics.

Eisenhower Sails Tonight Aboard Missile Cruiser

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower sails tonight aboard the guided missile cruiser Canberra on a leisurely six-day voyage to Bermuda.

He hopes the trip will benefit his health, clearing up a stubborn cough, head cold and ear infection. He told his news conference Wednesday he was "some better."

The President arranged an afternoon one-hour flight to the naval air station at Norfolk, Va., for transfer a bit later to the big warship.

The plan is for the Canberra to meander lazily for six days and nights, mainly in warm gulfs and streams waters, and arrive at Bermuda next Wednesday afternoon.

A week from today in Bermuda, Eisenhower will start four days of talks with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

He will continue to carry the duties of presidency.

The President noted at his news conference there are "complete and secret" communication facilities aboard the Canberra to keep him in close touch with Washington.

"All the time I am out at sea," The White House said later that a courier seaplane could put Eisenhower ashore quickly in event of any emergency that called for return to the capital.

This will be Eisenhower's first ocean voyage since he returned part of the way from Korea aboard the Cruiser Helena as president-elect in 1952.

While aboard the 675-ton warship, Eisenhower will occupy the quarters of Rear Adm. Lawrence S. Daspit, commander of Cruiser Division 5. The suite includes a 40-by-20-foot main salon for a combination dining-conference-office facility, and sleeping quarters 22 by 18 feet. A separate galley is available.

Engine Failure Forces Nixon's Plane To Land
TRIPOLI, Libya — The plane bringing Vice President Nixon to Libya was forced to return to Khartoum Thursday by a partial engine failure.

The U.S. Air Force plane carrying the vice president was 30 minutes out of the Sudanese capital when trouble developed in its No. 2 engine. The plane turned back.

Nixon's plans to visit Tobruk to meet King Idris of Libya were shelved temporarily. He may fly on directly to Tripoli for a visit to the American Wheelus Air Base after the engine has been repaired, or may change his plans further.

Nixon was to have paused in Tobruk for four hours with the Libyan King before going on to Tripoli. His schedule calls for a three-day visit, with a weekend, then a final visit in Tunis.

Nixon received the coolest reception of his African tour in Khartoum. Fewer than 3,000 spectators watched impassively along the route as the American party drove from the airport two miles to the presidential palace.

The Communists, who wanted to boycott the visit, distributed Red leaflets reading: "Go out of our country, Nixon."

passed, the period for impounding dogs be cut to three days.

Mrs. Hull and Mrs. William Davidson, Wilbur, said the dogs should be impounded to give owners a chance to reclaim them.

Jackson said the county dog control officer doesn't kill all dogs immediately, but Mrs. Hull said many of them are executed as soon as they are caught.

After Jackson said the dog control officer has an adequate pen at his home to keep impounded dogs for a few days, Mrs. Hull described it as too small, 10 miles out of town at the end of a dead-end road, with a "no trespassing" sign blocking the premises.

Elton Jackson, president of the Douglas County Livestock Assn. and son of the judge, said the county court could establish a pound, but Mrs. Hull said the court has refused to do it.

"We're coming to the state asking that it make a law to settle something in Douglas County that should be handled at the local level," he said.

Mrs. Hull replied that she has to come to the legislature because the county officials won't provide the pound unless the state forces them.

Darley Ware, chairman of the County Dog Control Board, described the dog catcher's method of killing dogs in a box in which carbon monoxide gas is piped.

He described it as "the most humane method possible," asserting the dogs are killed in nine seconds. He denied the dogs are "burned," averring that a temperature of 88 degrees is the maximum reached in the box.

Rep. Al Flegel (D), Roseburg, vice chairman of the committee and one of the bill's sponsors, presided at the meeting.

Leftist Premier Of Indonesia Resigns Position

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Leftist Premier Ali Sastroamidjojo finally quit today. President Sukarno proclaimed a "state of war and siege," in effect recognizing rebel military leaders, and summoned them to Jakarta for talks.

The rebels have staged four bloodless coups in less than three months, taking over control of virtually all of this 3,000-island republic except Java. They defied the central government and demanded Sastroamidjojo's resignation, while generally pledging loyalty to Sukarno.

The Premier's resignation was known to be imminent. The outgoing government had lasted less than a year, although Sastroamidjojo had a previous term as premier in 1953-55. He was ambassador to Washington in 1950-51.

Sastroamidjojo stepped down at a meeting in the presidential palace also attended by chiefs of the army, navy and air force.

Sukarno's emergency proclamation cited "the critical situation" throughout the country. He formally delegated governing authority to the district military commanders, who had already seized it in their four rebellions.

The commanders were summoned to Jakarta, the national capital, for talks with Sukarno and Gen. Abdul Haris Nasution, army chief of staff. All were expected to arrive by tomorrow except Lt. Col. Ahmad Hussein, who headed a December revolt in central Sumatra. The Antara News Agency said he was "too ill to make the trip."
