Eugene Plumbers Union Ends Strike With Accord

EUGENE — The Eugene Plumbers Union local here reached an agreement Tuesday night with contractors of the area, ending a strike of several weeks. It is the same as that arrived at by the union and Portland area contractors Friday night. The agreement calls for an immediate 5-cent hourly increase, an 8-cent boost July 1 and a 10-cent health and welfare contribution by contractors. Also provided are two pay increases next year totaling 15 cents and a 1-cent hourly contribution to an apprentice training fund. The old scale for journeymen plumbers was \$3.35.

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Anita Ekberg Denies Rumors

COPENHAGEN, Denmark — Anita Ekberg, the Swedish movie actress, flew into Copenhagen Thursday and denied that she was running away from her British husband, Actor Anthony Steel. "There is no truth to it at all," said the shapely actress. "There is absolutely no rift between the two of us. I have come for a rest and for nothing else." Miss Ekberg left Rio de Janeiro's film festival unexpectedly Wednesday. Her departure from the Brazilian capital was so hurried that she had to pack suitcases and arrive at the airport carrying some clothes over her arm. Steel said his wife was leaving because of sickness in the family, but this was a surprise to Anita's family in Malmö, Sweden, just across the sound from Copenhagen. Her mother said the only member of the family who is ill is Anita's grandmother — who has been suffering from heart disease for six months. Steel told reporters in Rio de Janeiro Thursday that "living out of suitcases is enough to give anybody neurosis." He said he was returning to Los Angeles to close their house, and had a Scandinavian Airlines reservation on its polar flight for Saturday night. He said he expected to rejoin his wife in Stockholm Sunday.

'Corrective Legislation' Seen As Labor Probe Sequel

WASHINGTON — A top business organization leader said Senate racketeering disclosures may lead to "corrective legislation" against labor such as followed certain industry "sins" in the 1920s. John S. Coleman, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said "I am asking labor — as a friend — if it believes it can escape from a similar fate unless it sweeps its own house?" Coleman said in remarks prepared for the Chamber's National Labor Relations Conference the general public seldom understands some of industry's regular complaints against unions for secondary boycott and union "monopoly" tendencies. "But today, there is a difference," he said. "Everyone understands the testimony which is now unfolding before the Senate committee (investigating racketeering practices)." "Much as I regret that innocent representatives of labor should be tarred with the brush of the guilty, it is only a matter of fact that everyone understands the language of pinball racketeering, close-house arrangements and dickers between public officials and labor chiefs."

Cypriots To Quit If Makarios Given Release

NICOSIA, Cyprus — EOKA, the Greek Cypriot underground fighting British rule, scattered leaflets in Nicosia Thursday declaring it is willing to order a cease-fire as soon as exiled Archbishop Makarios is released. The leaflets were signed by "Digenis," the EOKA leader. Archbishop Makarios, Greek Orthodox Church leader of the Mediterranean island, was exiled by the British to the Seychelles Islands in the Indian Ocean just over a year ago on the ground he was a dangerous rebel leader. The true offer was circulated a few hours after the colonial government hanged Evagoras Palikarides, an 18-year-old Greek Cypriot, for possessing a gun. The leaflets, headed "Proclamation," said the offer was made in the spirit of a recent U.N. resolution urging a peaceful and just solution.

Klamath Indian Timber Assets To Be Acquired

WASHINGTON — Chairman Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Thursday the Senate Indian Affairs Subcommittee will begin work soon on proposals for government acquisition of Klamath Indian timber assets. The Senate last week passed a bill postponing until after the 1958 session of Congress any disposal of timber in carrying out the program for ending federal supervision of the Oregon tribe. Although the bill has yet to be passed by the House, Neuberger said "apparently we will now have sufficient time in which to work out a plan for managing the Klamath resources which will be fair not only to the economy of Oregon but also to the individual Indians themselves." He said the primary goal is to see that the vast ponderosa pine stand which constitutes the major Klamath asset "is not exploited or gutted." "It may be," he said, "that the government should buy this vast forest and add it to the holdings of the U. S. Forest Service in Oregon for sustained yield custodianship." Neuberger said he would prefer that the Indian timber be placed under the Forest Service rather than the Bureau of Land Management or the state, because it has had "longer experience" in conservation work. Under any program of government acquisition, the senator said, he would insist the Indians receive "a generous price" based on what similar timber would sell for under competitive conditions.

CYPRIOT HANGED

NICOSIA, Cyprus — The British colonial government today hanged Evagoras Palikarides, 19, for possessing a gun. He was the ninth Greek Cypriot hanged in the current rebellion against British rule and the first executed for possessing firearms, banned by emergency regulations imposed two years ago. Eight other Cypriots were put to death last year for killings.

Governor Holmes Denies He Visited Teamster Office

SALEM — Gov. Robert D. Holmes Wednesday denied that he visited Teamster headquarters in Portland and solicited a \$2,000 contribution to his campaign. Holmes denied the statement which was made Tuesday by Clyde Crosby, Teamster organizer from Portland, before the Senate vice probe hearings in Washington, D. C. Crosby testified the Teamsters contributed \$2,000 to the campaign of Gov. Holmes. Questioned further about this, Crosby said Holmes visited the Teamster headquarters in Portland and solicited the contribution. "I received a check made out by the Teamsters Union for \$2,000 but it was offered and authorized by the joint AFL-CIO committee. I received many checks from various unions but in every case such contributions were authorized by the joint union committee," Gov. Holmes said. Holmes said the contribution was picked up at Teamster headquarters. "All these contributions are a matter of record and Crosby uttered an untruth when he said I went to his office and solicited \$2,000," Holmes said.

Attorney Is Appointed For Accused Slayer

EUGENE — District Judge Edward Leavy appointed attorney Sidney E. Thwing Wednesday to represent Albert Lewis Wachsmuth, 63, in his first degree murder trial. Wachsmuth is accused in the fatal shooting of state policeman Charles C. Sanders in a gun battle at the Wachsmuth home in the River Road district Feb. 26. The court named the attorney after Wachsmuth said he had been unable to obtain counsel. Wachsmuth, who had been in the hospital for treatment of wounds suffered in the gunfight, was transferred to the city jail Tuesday.

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
