Johnston is chairman of Senate Civil Service and Post Office Committee.

Ellsworth has been working with the commission to prepare himself for the job although he is not yet on the payroll.

"I'm interested in that, by the way," he remarked with a grin. President Eisenhower is expected to name Ellsworth, a former Roseburg editor, chairman of the commission if he is confirmed.

Ellsworth, a Republican, was defeated for reelection last November by Democrat Charles O. Porter, Eugene.

British Viscount Planes Put Back Into Service

LONDON (AP)—British European Airways today placed eight of its model 701 Viscount turboprop airliners back into service after they passed minute, all-night inspection.

The Viscounts were grounded as a precautionary measure after one crashed at Manchester Thursday with the loss of 22 lives.

The investigation centered on the plane's flap mechanisms.

A different model of the Viscount, modified to meet American and Canadian specifications, has been delivered to Capital Airlines in the United States and Trans-Canada Airlines. Both said they had no plans to ground the planes.
