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We Give Roseburg Bucks

HHFA Administrator Says Building Loan Proposals Would Increase Funds Flow

WASHINGTON — Albert M. Cole, the government's chief housing spokesman, said Monday administration building loan proposals would increase the flow of private funds into mortgage investment.

Cole told a Senate housing subcommittee he is "confident that the supply of mortgage funds will improve in the near future."

Cole, head of the Housing and Home Finance Agency (HHFA), said as a result of legislation recommended by the Eisenhower administration "the market for government-aided loans would function to eliminate large discounts in the private market."

For this reason, Cole told the senators, there would be "no need" to adopt proposals that would require the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) and the Veterans Administration (VA) to control mortgage discounts.

As the subcommittee hearings opened, Chairman Sparkman (D-Ala.) suggested a new 250-million-dollar low-interest housing program for elderly persons, large

families and related "moderate income" groups.

"The program could operate, despite today's tight money markets, without loss to the treasury," Sparkman said.

The subcommittee is examining more than a dozen housing bills. Cole was leadoff man for agency representatives.

Among other things the administration proposals would increase the maximum interest on VA-guaranteed and direct loans from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent in the wake of a similar hike in the rate on FHA loans.

The administration also would reduce FHA down payments on what Cole described as "homes of moderate cost."

Other administration proposals would enable the Federal National Mortgage Assn. (FNMA) to obtain an additional billion dollars to purchase mortgages in the secondary market and extend the voluntary home mortgage credit program another three years to serve small communities and rural areas where mortgage money is scarce.

Auto Collision Insurance Overcharges Are Claimed

WASHINGTON — Better Business Bureau officials said Monday thousands of car buyers were "fleeced" on collision insurance rates and are owed some 20 million dollars in refunds.

Many state insurance commissioners, they asserted, have kept the overcharges "secret" and thus there is some question whether affected motorists can collect what they have coming to them.

This testimony was presented before the Senate subcommittee on automobile marketing practices by Kenneth Barnard of Chicago, and Allan E. Backman of New York, both of the Assn. of Better Business Bureaus. The subcommittee is headed by Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.).

Barnard and Backman said the over-charging was done since 1950 by some insurance companies affiliated with finance companies. They said these firms charged the higher rates levied on autos driven by persons under 25—whether or not such charges were warranted. Only car buyers on installment plans were affected.

They said the practice has been stopped.

Barnard said the "scheme for mulching" car buyers was "on a scale well nigh incredible" and that overcharges amounted to at least 25 million dollars.

But he said refunds to those who were overcharged have added up to only 5 million dollars due to what he called lax regulation by many state insurance commissioners. Questioned in this connection, Backman specifically mentioned California, Oregon, Tennessee and New York as having kept the "secret" as long as possible.

Backman said it was his opinion that if these states—and many others—had publicized the over-
