Ohan was asked about Egypt's school system. He said, "Egypt has three types of schools: missionary, religious and those run by the government. Egyptian schools stress languages."

Collins, when explaining the British Guiana school system said, "British Guiana has compulsory education up to the age of 14. Not many technical subjects are taught in British Guiana schools and it is a tradition for West Indian students to attend English universities."

British Run Colony

"British Guiana is still a colony of Britain and ruled by the British government," Collins told a Kiwanian member who asked how his country was governed. He went on to say that "British Guiana hopes to join a West Indian Federation within the next 11 years."

Collins is a political science major at the University and Ohan is majoring in architecture. Ohan said, "The relationship between education in Egypt and the United States is very different."

Bronx Schoolboy Easily Answers Difficult Quiz

NEW YORK (AP)—Robert Strom, 10, Bronx schoolboy, easily answered three scientific questions Tuesday night to win his TV quiz winnings up to \$80,000 toward a possible \$250,000.

The fifth-grader won \$16,000 to add to the \$64,000 he won last week on CBS-TV's "94,000 Question."

He will return next week to try to boost the \$16,000 to \$32,000, and, if successful, will qualify to try the following week for his second \$64,000.

A contestant can advance through four \$64,000 rounds without losing any \$64,000 block he has won along the way.

The boy first was asked to explain the difference in creating electricity by the piezo-electric and thermionic emission methods.

He said the piezo-electric method was by distortion of crystals and that, in the second method, the heating of a cathode in a vacuum tube accounted for the electric flow.

To a second question, he recited of carbon, oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, iron, iodine, magnesium, sodium, phosphorus and potassium as 10 of the many elements in the human body.

The boy checked a telescope to answer the third question. He was given the hour angle and declination settings on the instrument. Then he correctly named the autumnal equinox as the space in the sky he was looking at.



ese rule were recounted by Bang. "In summary," he said, "before I left Korea a missionary friend told me that Korea was the most Christian country in Asia."

Bang, the political science major from Korea, was followed by a Netherlander, Wim Gerritsen, who is studying business administration in Eugene.

Gerritsen told the Women's Club that he had to come to America to hear the story about the little Dutch boy saving his country by plugging the hole in the dike with his finger.

Gerritsen described his native Holland, dwelling on the dense population of the country that has caused 300,000 persons to emigrate since 1945. He made some comparison between Holland and the United States including the superior Dutch telephone and postal system.

"In Holland," Gerritsen stated, "you can mail a letter at 5 p.m. that will go 100 miles and have an answer back before 5 p.m. the following day." In concluding, he explained a broken leg, a skiing accident at Willamette Pass, 14 months, and informed the Women's Club that he had received word from home that Elvis Presley's fame had reached Holland.

Soldiers Taught English

A graduate of the University of Tehran (Iran) was the third speaker at the Women's Club.

Mehdi Farash, an economics student, said that he learned English during the war from an American soldier stationed in Iran. Farash explained that he had several American friends in Tehran and said that he had worked for the American Embassy there.

Farash enthusiastically endorsed the foreign student exchange program carried on between various nations and the United States. He pointed out that by contacts between nations such as the program provided that "good relationships between nations" could be established.

He urged that the scholarship programs be increased to allow more students to participate. "This," he said, "will cause better understanding."

Nepal's Change Noted

The largest single delegation of any country on the foreign students' tour was from mountainous Nepal located on the border between India and Tibet.

Bhakti Shrestha, an education major from Nepal, explained to the Women's Club a recent revolution in the Nepal government that had opened his country to education.

Shrestha pointed out that until a few years ago the government allowed virtually no contact with other nations and that the advantages of foreign learning were denied the people of Nepal. "Following a revolution that installed a new government, however, education and foreign learning were favored," he said.

The University of Oregon is cur-

rently engaged in a program to help a university in Nepal.

Russell Walker, executive secretary of the YMCA at the University, accompanied the students on their tour to Roseburg. The tour continues to Medford today and then on to Ashland and Klamath Falls. The return to Eugene is scheduled via Crater Lake.

Morse Charges Malfeasance By Sec. Dulles

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Morse (D-Ore) told the Senate Tuesday there is "growing evidence of gross malfeasance in office by the secretary of state."

Morse, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, criticized Secretary of State Dulles for his actions in connection with the withdrawal of Israeli troops from the Gaza Strip and the Gulf of Aqaba area.

Morse, who voted against the Middle East resolution requested by President Eisenhower, said Congress should have made certain that "we got some commitments out of Arab nations before we passed that resolution."

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic floor leader, said earlier there is "a great deal of apprehension in Congress" over Egyptian reoccupation of the Gaza Strip. He told his colleagues it would be "a great tragedy" if Israel's withdrawal leads to new strife in the area.

SOCIALISTS QUIT

ROME (AP)—Two prominent Socialist Labor leaders announced Monday they have quit the big, Communist-led Italian Federation of Labor (CGIL). Giuseppe Della Motta and Aldo Ramella, both secretaries in industrial Genoa's CGIL organization, said they had joined the Free Socialist Italian Labor Union (UIL).

First Round Of Wage Negotiations Started

VANCOUVER, B.C. — The first round in wage negotiations between the International Woodworkers of America and coast logging operators started here Monday.

At the meeting, the union formally presented its demand for a 20 per cent wage increase in the 1957 contract which takes effect July 15.

Employers have already indicated strong opposition to the IWA's 20 per cent demand, which was decided upon at the union's district convention in Vancouver last month.

The basic wage is \$1.59 an hour.

3-Month Trial Delay Requested

PORTLAND — A three-month delay in a trial on federal wiretapping charges was asked Monday for James B. Elkins and his employee, Raymond F. Clark.

Attorneys for the pair said they had only recently taken the case, and had not had time to become familiar with details.

They also said recent publicity has made it "impossible to obtain a fair and unprejudiced climate of public opinion" for the trial within the next 90 days.

Elkins, the Portland gambler who was a key witness in the Senate investigation of Teamster Union activities in Portland earlier this month, is accused with Clark of tapping a phone in an apartment used by Tom Maloney of Seattle and Spokane. Maloney is under indictment by a grand jury that investigated vice conditions here.

District Judge William G. East said he will hear arguments on the motion Wednesday.

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
