About 29 years ago he moved to Roseburg from Oakland. During his lifetime he worked as a railroad bridge carpenter and at farming.

### Bicycle Safety Week Continues At Local Schools

Bicycle Safety Week moved into Benson and Riverside schools today. The combined Roseburg police and sheriff's department team continued safety lectures and films at the two schools along with inspections and licensing of bicycles. Emphasis on safe practices when bicycle riding and use of proper hand signals is being brought to school children in the Roseburg district by the combined Roseburg police and sheriff's department team.

The safety team visited Rose and Melrose schools Tuesday and at Green and Fullerton schools Wednesday along with the safety lectures.

Officers checking the bicycles lined up on playground during the noon hour or recess inspected for condition of the tires, brakes, fenders, sprocket chains and reflectors. A strip of reflector tape was placed on each bicycle.

City ordinance requires that bicycles be licensed in the city. "When the bicycles are licensed," Roseburg Police Chief Carl E. Rumpf, says, "the police have a permanent record of the bicycle by its make, license number and by its serial number which it is virtually impossible to change."

A charge of 50 cents is made for licensing each bicycle. "This fee is not for revenue raising purposes," the chief states, "but is charged to cover the cost of the license and the safety program."

Licensing is not mandatory for children living beyond the city limits, but several students at Melrose school and others have been licensed, the chief adds. "We have their bicycles listed on file so that if the bicycles are lost or stolen and repaired, we can still identify them and see that they are returned to the right owner," he says.

### Ed Oldfield Scores Hot 70

Eddie Oldfield, Roseburg Country Club professional, paced a field of 21 pros and 83 amateurs in a pro-amateur golf tournament at Medford this week, but he came from behind too late to capture the three-round aggregate leader. Oldfield took the honors on the Rogue Valley Country Club course with a 2-under-par 70 to raise his aggregate to 219 among the pros.

Eddie Hogan with a 54-hole total of 206 and Dave Killen's 214 topped Oldfield's in the three-day golf tour over the Laurelwood, Roseburg and Rogue Valley courses.

In his best day, Oldfield also shared best-ball honors with a 66. Playing with him were Marvin Clark of Grants Pass and Miles Doran of Medford.

### Mrs. Waincott Succumbs Here

May E. Waincott, 72, wife of long-time Douglas County health officer, Dr. Elmer J. Waincott, died in a local hospital Wednesday. She was born at Long Creek, Ore., Oct. 25, 1884, and was married there to Dr. Waincott Sept. 24, 1905. She and her husband came to Douglas County from Richland, Ore. in 1909 to reside at Drain. A year later they moved to Oakland, where Dr. Waincott practiced medicine until 1924. At that time, the family moved to Roseburg. Dr. Waincott retired as county health officer last year.

Mrs. Waincott was a life-long member of the Methodist Church. Surviving besides her husband are a son, Harold C. (Doc) of Medford; a daughter, Mrs. Harry (Bernice) Sandouist of Ontario, Ore.; a brother, William Lee of Escalon, Calif.; and two grandchildren. Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Friday at 2 p.m. The Rev. Ellsworth Tilton of the First Methodist Church will officiate. Concluding services and vault interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

### Committee Will Help Select Superintendent

The Reedsport Elementary School District No. 105 board has nominated a screening committee to aid in the selection of a new superintendent. The five-member board was chosen, County School Supt. Kenneth Barneburg said Wednesday, to "screen out" all but five or six applicants for the position. "Their applications for the job have been received so far and the deadline is April 1," Barneburg stated. The board, selected on the same basis as employed by other districts in the past, will include one member from the state board of education, staff members from the Oregon College of Education, the school of education at the University of Oregon and Southern Oregon College and a county school superintendent not necessarily from the county concerned. The Reedsport school board will then select the new superintendent.

### Torrential Rains Flood Texas Areas; Tornadoes Strike

DALLAS — Torrential rains flooded streams and roads in central Texas yesterday and five tornadoes skipped across portions of the state without causing any major damage. Thunderstorms continued to lash portions of south central Texas today, but the rain was tapering off in other areas. A freak spring storm blanketed Dalhart in the Panhandle with 3 inches of snow and hail the size of golf balls pounded parts of the hill country in central Texas.

A father and son believed drowned when heavy rains caused streams to overflow later turned up safe as the water began receding.

Pleasanton Arthur Lewis, 42, of Buda, Tex., 13 miles south of Austin, was trapped on the Williamson Creek bridge when floodwaters stalled his pickup truck. He got out of the vehicle and clung to a tree until an ambulance crew rescued him. His truck was washed away. Some 8 or 10 miles east, his son Burton Lewis, 17, was having a similar experience. The boy was on a school bus returning from a track meet when it was caught in a terrific hail storm in Creedmore, 12 miles southeast of Austin. Windows of the bus were knocked out and the engine stalled. Young Lewis borrowed a car to go for help and the vehicle stalled in high water on a bridge. He was forced to hang on to the bridge railing until help arrived. Heavy rains also fell in north central Texas and along the Gulf Coast, which was lashed by a weekend. Lighter rain fell in portions of the drought-seared range country of west Texas.

### House Slashes Deeper Into 18 Federal Agencies

WASHINGTON — The House yesterday cut deeper than its Appropriations Committee had recommended in slicing nearly \$38 million dollars from a bill to finance 18 separate federal agencies. The reduction, as approved by the House on a voice vote, was 9 per cent below the \$3,923,195,000 President Eisenhower had requested in the fiscal year starting July 1.

### Twin-Engine Plane Crashes Into Cliff

CASCADE LOCKS, Ore. — A twin-engine plane with only the pilot aboard crashed into a cliff, then plunged into the Columbia River near here Wednesday night. Lou C. Herron, 36, of The Dalles, was the pilot. Divers sought his body. The accident occurred five miles east of here as Herron apparently was attempting to land his plane on the highway. He was flying from Vancouver, Wash., to The Dalles when darkness closed in. The landing field at Cascade Locks is not lighted at night. The plane belonged to the Inland Navigation Co. which employed Herron.

### Subcommittee Rejects Plan For Budgeting

WASHINGTON — A House appropriations subcommittee Thursday rejected an "impracticable and unworkable" administrative proposal to improve congressional control of the budget. The plan was advanced first by Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey in 1955. One of its major proposals was that Congress withhold final action on all appropriation bills annually until sometime in June of each year. At that time a final tabulation would be made showing the effect on the budget of all appropriation and revenue bills tentatively approved up to that time. Congress then would enact an "amendatory" appropriation bill altering amounts previously voted in individual bills so spending wouldn't exceed income.

alleged discrepancy "it will be Frank Brewster" did not the auditor. "I know that," Brewster said, his forehead wrinkling in an expression of deep concern. "Isn't it possible that some of that (difference) could be expenses?" he asked. Pierre Salinger, a staff investigator, testified that a check signed by Brewster on the Western Conference's funds was used to buy a car registered in the name of Mary James, Route 1, Bothell, Wash. Salinger said he found out in a telephone interview with Miss James that the car was purchased for her in June 1954 for \$3,115 by Terry McNulty, paid as a union organizer.

There has been previous testimony that McNulty, while carried on the conference's payroll as an organizer, devoted considerable time to Brewster's horse racing stables. Salinger said McNulty also interviewed by committee investigators, claimed the price of the car was refunded in cash to the Western Conference. But Salinger said no such amount is shown as an incoming item on the conference's records.

Salinger said McNulty claimed he turned over the money to Gordon Lindsey, former secretary-treasurer of the conference but now deceased. At one point, the senators swung into a discussion as to whether the Western Conference of Teamsters should not be nearly twice as rich as it is. The conference's financial report for 1955 valued its assets at \$1,069,474.

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz) said its income of 20 cents a month from each of 375,000 members should have produced a surplus between \$300,000 and \$400,000 in every year since 1953. He said that dollar figure given as the value of current assets.

At the outset of the committee session, Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) read a telegram from Dave Beck, Teamsters Union president, advising that Beck intended to appear before the committee next Tuesday as requested. Beck said he would bring his financial records "under the provisions of my previous wire."

In the earlier wire, Beck had said he was reserving his constitutional rights. This left a question whether Beck would turn over his records once he did appear. McClellan commented that he did not mean the meaning of Beck's "reservations."

At Seattle, Beck declined to shed any further light on the exact meaning of his wires. "I have no further comment whatsoever," the Teamsters' head told a reporter. "The telegram speaks for itself. The only thing I can say is I will be following the advice of my attorneys explicitly."

The British government also has not announced the target of its reduction program. Informed speculators have said that it would likely bring annual defense costs down from 1 1/2 billion pounds (\$4,200,000,000) to one billion.
