Lecturer Says Health Entwined With Religion

History Of Methodist Church Recounted On Eve Of Educational Unit Dedication

The Methodist Church in Roseburg will celebrate its centennial anniversary this year by dedicating in March a new educational building unit at its church site at Main Street and Lane Avenue.

Development of the new unit is part of a history of Methodism in Douglas County which dates back over 100 years, a growth which corresponds with the founding and development of Douglas County itself.

Methodism developed in Douglas County from a divided church in the mid-1800's until 1929 when the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Southern Methodist Church united internationally. The two factions grew side by side in Douglas County until the merger.

The division occurred in 1858. Four years later in September, 1852, the first Umpqua Mission was formally organized at the annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Portland. Rev. J. O. Raynor was named the first pastor of the circuit which covered all of Oregon south of the Calapooia Mountains to the California border at the south and Coos Bay on the west.

The first official sermon was preached in October 1852 at the home of John Aiken on the river bank near Winchester. This community was also the site of the first parsonage here.

Additional population soon forced the division of the mission into smaller circuits with the North Umpqua River serving as the line of separation between the north

and south circuits.

The Southern Methodist branch was founded in Douglas County in 1858 by the Rev. James Stuart. A circuit rider was appointed to serve Roseburg out of Stockton, Calif., in 1859.

Roseburg became the hub of activities for circuit riders of such settlements as Tenmile, Calapooia, Coles Valley, Umpqua, Oakland, Cow Creek, Canyonville, Days Creek, North Umpqua, Camas Valley, Pine Grove, Cleveland and French Settlement.

First church buildings for the two branches were erected in the late 1860's. The southern branch was noted by several site changes in town, while the northern branch settled in the present Methodist site from the beginning.

The first building of the Southern Methodists was built soon after 1865 on Washington Street between Rose and Stephens, under the direction of the Rev. J. W. Craig. Moves into bigger buildings and

new locations were made in 1893, 1916 and in 1922. The last move was to the southwest corner of Main Street and Lane Avenue.

The Methodist Episcopal Church built its first church structure in 1868 on the same property where the present church stands. Land was donated by Aaron Rose around 1861.

Space need brought about a completely new building on the same property in 1896 for the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1913, fire destroyed that church and the present building was built and dedicated in 1914 under the direction of the Rev. A. R. McLean at a contract price of little over \$13,000.

With international unification of three Methodist Church branches in 1929, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Protestant Church, the two branches in Roseburg united under one roof under the united name, Methodist Church.
