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NCAA Tourney Gets Under Way Tonight; North Carolina, Kansas Are Favorites

KANSAS CITY (AP) — North Carolina's all-winning iron men and Kansas, with a seven-foot giant who stuffs rather than shoots the ball into the basket, are favorites to gain the final round of the National Collegiate Basketball Tournament tonight.

North Carolina, ranked No. 1 in the nation on its 30-0 record, tangles with Michigan State in the opening semifinal game at Municipal Auditorium.

Kansas sends its celebrated ace Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain against San Francisco's defending champions.

The presence of Chamberlain has made Kansas the choice for the title.

The star-spangled lineup raised tournament interest to an all-time pitch. North Carolina and Kansas finished the season one-two in the national Associated Press basketball poll. San Francisco has won the tournament the past two years. Michigan State is the "cinderella team," having knocked off third-ranked Kentucky in the eliminations.

The four coaches all appeared highly confident.

"We feel we can beat anybody," said Fordy Anderson, who masterminded Michigan State to a blaring finish of 10 straight wins in the regular season.

"In 11 years of coaching I've never seen the fire that's inside the heart of this ball club," North Carolina coach height, speed and shooting strength but lacks reserves.

"Our boys are trained to run 40 minutes," said Coach Frank McGuire. "They don't get tired. We only substitute when a boy fouls out, which isn't often."

McGuire said his boys feel no pressure from their long winning streak and are relaxed and confident.

Phil Wolpert, who coached San Francisco's great national champs last year when he had Bill Russell for a star, called the present squad "comparable in defense but not in offense — we have no counterpart to Russell."

Kansas was beaten twice during the season, by Iowa State and Oklahoma A & M. But rival coaches still figure Chamberlain makes the Jayhawks the favorite.

He is the most fantastic player of the age," says McGuire.

Major League Conduct Code Opposed By Congressman

WASHINGTON (AP) — A proposed "fair play code" for major league baseball and football Friday faced an objection that it could breed "socialized sports."

Rep. Hillings (R-Calif.), who voiced the objection, said he thought organized sports would be subject to less government regulation if they all were placed under federal antitrust laws rather than under a legislated code of conduct.

Rep. Keating (R-NY) said he was drafting such a code after conferring Thursday with Bert Bell, commissioner of the National Football League.

Keating offered this approach as a compromise in the controversy among some members of Congress over whether sports-for-pay should be legally declared big business or exempted from antitrust jurisdiction.

Keating said he did not believe sports constituted the kind of business Congress expected to regulate when it enacted the Sherman and Clayton Acts many years ago. But he said there was a need for a set of principles, with enforcement provisions.

The Supreme Court ruled last month that pro football falls within the scope of antitrust statutes. That decision, however, did not affect its previous judgment that baseball is exempt from the same laws.

Professional basketball and hockey, as team sports, also would be covered by Keating's code.

Keating, senior Republican in the House Judiciary Committee, said "legal representatives" of the Library of Congress already are at work on his measure.

The New York congressman said he is "pretty well convinced" that any such legislation should sanction the reserve clause which ties players to the clubs with which they first signed.

Coaches Change Free Throw Rule

KANSAS CITY (AP) — The National Assn. of Basketball Coaches recommended adoption of one professional rule for collegiate ball Thursday and was expected to discuss another Friday at its annual meeting.

Recommended was the rule, as modified in use by the Big Ten Conference, which awards a rival team a bonus free throw on its opponent's seventh foul in each half, and a one-for-one extra foul shot thereafter. An act-of-shooting foul would still carry two shots.

The recommendation by the coaches, passed 72-22, now goes to the Rules Committee, convening Sunday and Monday.

Expected for consideration Friday was the pro rule providing a shot must be taken within 24 seconds after a team gets possession of the ball. It also was discussed Thursday but no action was taken.

The meeting made only one other recommendation. The coaches suggested the ball may be thrown in from any point in the end zone when play is at the defensive end of the floor. The present rule provides the ball cannot be tossed in from a 12-foot area under either basket.

Boston Celtics Grab Playoff's First Game

NWL Proposes Change

PORTLAND (AP) — Directors of the six Northwest League baseball clubs have been asked to vote on a proposed change in the league's veteran limit by-law, president Jim Fleishman said Thursday.

The rule change, proposed by Yakima, would relax the present regulation limiting to five per team the number of players with three or more years of service.

Fleishman said the rule will remain in effect unless there is a unanimous vote to change it.

Boxers In Title Round

NEW YORK (AP) — Cocky Miguel Berrios, nicknamed "Little Devil" by his Latin-American rosters, pits his aggressive style against the smooth boxing of Brooklyn's clever Carmelo Costa Friday night in the first round of the featherweight elimination tournament.

The 24-year-old, 5-2 Puerto Rican is the 7-5 choice to win the radiotelevision, 12-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Outfield Advisor Proves Point; Braves Drub Chisox

Johnnie Logan, star Braves shortstop, may have been thinking of John Wesley Covington the other day when he suggested that Milwaukee's National League pennant chances would brighten considerably "if the guys in left field" would improve their batting averages.

On the other hand, Logan and Manager Fred Haney also may be putting the old squeeze play on Bobby Thomson, so the former New York Giant will start worrying about his job.

Wes Covington, as a rookie in 1956, appeared mainly in pinchhit roles but played 35 games in the outfield. Yesterday he socked three homers, so did Logan. Each drove in five runs as the Braves overpowered the Chicago White Sox 10-7.

In other exhibitions, the New York Giants defeated the Baltimore Orioles 2-1; the St. Louis Cardinals ended a four-game losing streak at the expense of the New York Yankees 5-2; the Chicago Cubs edged the Cleveland Indians 5-4; the Brooklyn Dodgers rallied to turn back the Kansas City A's 6-3; the Detroit Tigers whipped the Washington Senators 4-2; and the Cincinnati Redlegs had their second big day in a row, thumping the Philadelphia Phillies 13-10.

The Redlegs, who drubbed the

Yankees 20-6 Wednesday with 25 hits, collected 22 against the Phils, including a homer by Hal Bevan. Ted Kramski, Roy Smalley, John Kennedy and Joe Lonetti homered for the Phils.

Herm Wehmeier, Larry Jackson and Hoyt Wilhelm limited the Yankees to five hits, while the Cards scored six unearned runs on three errors.

A triple by Eddie Bressoud with a mate aboard, and a sacrifice fly broke up a scoreless game in the seventh between the Giants and Orioles.

Homers accounted for all five Cub runs against Cleveland. Ernie Banks drove in three runs with two round-trippers, and Gene Baker hit a two-run homer. Al Smith and Same Mele homered for Cleveland.

Charlie Neal and Don Zimmer each hit a two-run homer in the seventh to wipe out a 3-0 Athletic lead and the Dodgers added two more in the eighth.

Gill and Jack Friel of Washington State College are deans of Pacific Coast Conference coaches, each with 29 years of service.

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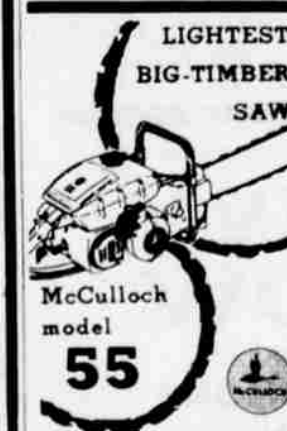


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
