

Oerding Twirls No-Hitter At Grants Pass

Roseburg Drops Host Team, 9-0

Bill (Lefty) Oerding, auspicious ace of Roseburg's American Junior Legion pitching corps last summer, got off to an awesome 1957 prep baseball season start Friday afternoon with a 9-0 no-hit shutout of Grants Pass.

Working over the seven-inning route, the 5-11 left-hander didn't waste any time getting his name into the record books for the season as he set the home team Cavemen down with 12 strikeouts and allowed two walks. Nobody got past first base on him and the only other Caveman to reach first base besides the two walks came on a fourth-inning error.

Oerding finished out the game in dynamic style, striking out the side in the bottom of the seventh inning. In addition, he struck out the side in the third frame.

After a scoreless first frame, the locals picked up one run in the second inning, two in the fifth and broke up the game with five in the sixth and one more in the seventh.

The first run came on Paul Hansen's single to center which scored Mike Hatfield who had got on base on an error.

In the fifth frame, Oerding walked and first baseman Ronnie Beamer lifted a towering 400-foot drive over the left fielder's head for a triple. Beamer then scored on Hatfield's single.

The first two batters reached base on infield miscues at shortstop and third. After an infield out, the shortstop misplayed Beamer's grounder, scoring two. Jim Brown then walked, the shortstop made his third miscue and Don Wells doubled to left field to finish out the scoring.

In the seventh, Jack Berney got a single to left and went all the way around when it was misplayed there.

Oerding walked the third man to face him in each of the first two innings, and kept the losers off base the rest of the way except when third baseman Rod Hoenisch bobbled one in the fourth inning.

Oregon, which had played to an 8-8 standoff with San Jose Thursday, cashed in on seven opposition errors to easily take the second game of their series. Shortstop Jim Puffer rammed a two-run homer in the fifth for the Ducks.

In the Idaho-OSC twin bill, the Vandals did all their first-game scoring in the second inning. The attack was sparked by Jim Christian and Larry McDonald, with triples, and Ron Braden and Ray Copeland, both of whom doubled. In the Beavers' big second-game comeback, Joe Francis and Tom Hunt each got 2-for-3.

Oregon plays a doubleheader with Stanford Saturday at Palo Alto, Calif. Idaho meets Whitman and Oregon State plays Washington State at Lewiston.

Baseball To Stand Ground On Regulatory Legislation

BELLEAIR, Fla. — Baseball has set its course — preferring not to pick a fight, but ready to scrap to defend itself against regulatory legislation. The next move is up to Congress.

It took major league representatives just 90 minutes to reach accord on the strategy as drafted by Commissioner Ford Frick and baseball attorneys in their unprecedented special meeting Friday.

"We're not looking for controversy," said Frick following the meeting. "And we're not looking for a fight. But we are not scared. We're not frightened; we'll be ready to defend ourselves if we have to."

Frick, American League president Will Harridge, National League head Warren Giles and George Trautman, president of the National Assn. (minor leagues) were selected to serve as a committee "to handle any legislative matters on behalf of baseball" in Washington.

With three bills pending in Congress (all of which would declare baseball a business subject to antitrust laws although one would permit some leeway for the game) organized baseball decided its situation is the same as it was five years ago. That was when the Supreme Court, while finding baseball a business, ruled that it was not subject to monopoly regulations.

The present situation developed when the Supreme Court, in finding professional football a business subject to antitrust laws, asked whether a reappraisal of baseball was in order.

KANSAS CITY — Can Kansas and Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain crack the 31-game winning streak and fabulous luck of North Carolina's self-termed "team of destiny?"

That question will be answered tonight when the nation's No. 1 and 2 basketball teams clash in the final of the National Collegiate (NCAA) Basketball Tournament at the Municipal Auditorium.

Kansas, although ranked second behind the unbeaten North Carolinians, ruled a 3-point favorite. A consolation contest between last night's semi-final losers, Michigan State and San Francisco, precedes the championship game.

Tar Heels Edge MSU
North Carolina, twice within a breath of defeat, weathered three overtime periods to turn back a big, tough Michigan State team 74-70. Kansas, with the seven-foot Chamberlain dunking the ball regularly, crushed San Francisco 80-56.

Frank McGuire, coach of North Carolina, is worried about Chamberlain, the beanpole Negro who can reach within 6 inches of the rim of the basket standing flat-footed.

"This big boy frightens you, the things he can do with the ball," McGuire said.

Bravery Prescribed
"At any rate we are going to play him normally, and we're going into the game unafraid," Dick Harp, Kansas coach, said. "It will be our toughest game."

North Carolina's 6-foot-5 Lennie Rosenbluth, was the individual standout and scorer of 31 points in the nerve-jarring victory over Michigan State. Chamberlain dumped in 32 points for Kansas.

Rackets Topic Of Resolution Of Young GOP

PORTLAND — Clay Meyers of Portland Thursday night called upon Portland Young Republicans to spearhead a movement for "achieving integrity in local government" and "opposing the infiltration of racketeering or lawless elements in our community."

The organization, of which he is an active member, approved a resolution, citing disclosures made by the Senate committee investigating labor racketeering in Portland.

Meyers said that such a committee might work toward a recall movement, "should a public official be convicted of a crime."

George Brown, head of labor's Committee on Political Education, said that speaking for himself and for labor here, Portland Mayor Terry Schunk was innocent of bribe charges made against him by witnesses at the Senate hearing.

He said that the Washington hearings have brought out in some cases the membership has lost control of its union.

"That's what makes possible the kind of thing you are reading today. And that's the only way correction that needs to be made. If the union's membership has control, that union isn't going very far wrong," he said.

Rockets Fired To Determine Extent Of Winds

FT. MONMOUTH, N.J. — The Army announced today it is firing rockets from deep in northern Canada to measure icy winds as high up as 80 miles.

The experiments are expected to lead to more accurate predictions of cold weather during the winter. And that's the only way scientists of the U.S. Army Signal Engineering Laboratories here.

The Army said the first specially equipped "Aerobee" rocket was fired last Nov. 12 at Ft. Churchill, Man. A series of nine more launches are scheduled between 1957-58. International Geophysical Year, the first on next July 19.

The Aerobee sprays 18 packets of high explosives into the air at pre-set intervals during its ascent.

When the four-pound charges explode, sensitive instruments on the ground record the barely audible blasts.

Scientists measure the time lag between each explosion and the arrival of the sound at the earth. From this data they compute important facts about the direction, speed and temperature of polar winds.

Legislators Could Get Entire Pay In One Year

SALEM — Oregon's legislators could receive their \$1,200 biennial pay in one year instead of \$600 yearly, as presently under a bill approved by the Senate Friday.

Sen. Ward Cook (D), Portland, one of the sponsors of the bill, said the change would give legislators their full day during a session of the Legislature, "when they need it most."

Actually, the bill permits the lawmakers to draw their second-year pay in advance.

SPECIAL STAMP
WASHINGTON — The 100th anniversary of Oregon's admission to the Union may be commemorated by a proposed special series of postage stamps.

Bills to authorize the series were introduced Thursday by Oregon members of Congress, Reps. Norblad (R), Ullman (D), Porter (D), and Green (D), and by Sens. Morse and Neuberger.

The proposed stamps would go on sale Feb. 14, 1959.
