Myrtle Creek Taverns Report Bogus Checks

Two bogus checks cashed in Myrtle Creek taverns March 16, were reported Saturday by the Myrtle Creek police.

Police Chief James Haun said that the checks were for amounts of \$66.42 and \$17.43 and were made out on small fictitious logging companies. They were made payable to George Galindo, he said.

The chief added that a check protector was used and the checks were drawn on the Citizens Bank of Eugene.

Chief Haun told News-Review correspondent, Mrs. Ruth Evans, that he felt the check passers were going through Myrtle Creek since earlier reports indicated checks of a similar nature being passed elsewhere. The chief told Mrs. Evans that the matter had been reported to the sheriff's office for further investigation.

Firemen's Effort To Revive Heart Victim Is Failure

Roseburg firemen tried in vain at a market in West Roseburg Saturday afternoon to revive Leo Pearl Cooper, 42, of 338 W. Umpqua St. after he had suffered an apparent heart attack, according to Coroner L. L. Powers.

The firemen used a resuscitator on Cooper after he had collapsed in a market on West Harvard Avenue but he did not respond. A physician, whose office was nearby, was also summoned. Death occurred at a hospital shortly after.

Cooper was an engineer for the Bureau of Public Roads. He was born Dec. 2, 1894, in Conway, Iowa, and came to Oregon 25 years ago. He had lived in Roseburg the last two years. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Wayne (Betty) Kirk of Seattle, Wash., and Miss Charles Cooper of Coos Bay; a son, Robert, of Yakima, Wash.; four brothers, John of Roseburg, Roy of Marshall Town, Iowa, Clyde of Clearfield, Iowa, and Paul of Shreveport, La.

Funeral services are scheduled in the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg, Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. The Rev. Eugene Gerlitz of the First Baptist Church will officiate. Interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, said his group favors the measure as being "in the best interests of rural people."

Rackets Case Witness Wife Tells Of Threats

SEATTLE — Police are conducting an investigation into a threatening telephone call received by the wife of a witness who testified last week before the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee in Washington.

Howard Sylvester, a Seattle insurance and public relations executive, said he has given police the name of an employee of the Teamsters union whom he believes made the call.

Union officials were not available for comment.

Mrs. Sylvester told the police Saturday about the anonymous telephone call she received Thursday evening. That was the day her husband told the Senate committee headed by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.) that the Teamsters spent nearly \$600,000 in the fight to defeat a right-to-work initiative in Washington state last year. The initiative was snowed under in last November's election.

Sylvester also told the committee the union owes him \$10,000 for his work in the campaign and that an effort had been made to settle the bill for \$1,800.

Mrs. Sylvester delayed telling police about the telephone call until her husband returned from Washington Saturday night. She said the caller told her "I just want to tell Howard he is a phony SOB and he'll get sorry he ever testified and I'll get even with him someday."

of lower Michigan and Indiana. Accumulations of from 8 to 10 inches were predicted for parts of Iowa, Nebraska and Missouri with generally lesser amounts expected over affected portions of Kansas, Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and lower Michigan. North central Indiana had freezing rain and snow.

The snow band was fringed to the south by rain.

Despite the immediate hardships resulting from the three-day storm, farmers welcomed the moisture. In some areas it was sufficient to bring expression of belief that the prolonged drought had been broken.

Ranchers, however, feared huge livestock losses.

Many cities were left without power or telephone service as the wind and heavy drifts snapped lines by the thousands.

President, Dulles Lashed By Morse On Mideast Policy

BALTIMORE — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) said Sunday night President Eisenhower's Middle East doctrine is unconstitutional and "an instrument of unbridled, unchecked executive power."

Morse said he was at "a complete loss to understand American foreign policy in the Middle East."

He predicted that the administration's new doctrine would create a situation "that will lead this nation right down the road to a police state."

Morse spoke here at the 21st anniversary banquet of the Har Zion Tifereth Israel congregation. He said the Eisenhower doctrine in the Middle East is unconstitutional because it gives the President independent power for offensive military action.

He said the Constitution gives the President only emergency powers to act in a defensive situation.

An outspoken critic of the Eisenhower policies, Morse lashed out at Secretary of State Dulles for "ducking, weaving, equivocating, hedging and double-talk" during Senate hearings on the Middle East resolution.

The Oregon Democrat charged the administration with "political immorality" in catering to the what he described as the only free station in the Middle East—Israel.

George A. Wilcox of Oakland and Robert Ganz of Myrtle Creek. Resignations had been received earlier from V. R. Thomas of Drain and Robert Franks of Glendale, as had quit because of business pressure and Franks because of illness.

The county court followed up the resignations with the announcement it had dissolved the county building department. The citizens' group had been formed to accomplish this as well as abolition of the planning commission.

Building Inspection Stopped

The court announced it had unanimously "decided to do away with building inspection. Jobs of C. H. Bonolis, building inspector, and Chester Hamm, his assistant, were ended. Also losing their jobs were three technicians and a planning consultant.

To replace the building inspector and his staff, the court said it was going to hire a man to serve as a building adviser and "public relations man for the commission."

This man, Judge Jackson said, must:

1. Be able to meet the public property.

2. Have some knowledge of building and construction.

He also will issue building permits which primarily will be for registration purposes. These will cost \$1. "Use cost of printing."

In announcing the sweeping changes, Jackson said he and the two county commissioners, Clough and Frank Ashley, had given the matter "a lot of thought" and investigation. "We feel the plans just went a little too fast for the county," he said.

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Damage was estimated at \$35,000.

'Luck Of Irish' With Man Shot Through His Heart

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Edward J. McDonald woke up on the operating table at St. Mary & Elizabeth Hospital. A Catholic priest was administering last rites.

"I thought it was all over," McDonald said.

But McDonald had the luck of the Irish with his heart. He was watching over him.

McDonald was shot through the heart on St. Patrick's Day. The wound closed behind the bullet. The 31-year-old Irishman is looking forward to having the lead removed from his back today.

In that brief interval of consciousness that might have been his last, McDonald thought of his family. He wasn't worried about the hereafter.

"I had communion that morning, St. Pat's morning, and I had just been given the last rites. I just worried about my family."

"I wondered what would happen to them," he said. "We have two sons and my wife is expecting."

Sequel To "Few Beers"

"McDonald entered an inn with a group of friends. They had 'a few beers' and sang Irish songs."

Several hours later, the group began leaving. McDonald said he heard loud voices inside the tavern. He returned and saw the bartender, William B. Collier, had a gun pointed at McDonald's cousin and was threatening to shoot him.

"I told the bartender not to shoot him," McDonald said, "and he turned and shot me. I hit the floor, then pushed myself up. They put me in a car and I blacked out. I came to on the operating table."

Collier is free on bond and awaits trial on a charge of malicious shooting. McDonald's cousin is also free on bond and is charged with assault and battery.

wobbly state of Jordan collapses or if new fighting flares between Israel and the Arabs.

2. The two statesmen agreed to drop all thought of short-term pressures to force Egypt into a settlement of current Middle Eastern disputes. Simultaneously, they undertook to act independently outside the United Nations if long-term measures should be needed to isolate an uncooperative Egypt.

And they cleared their ideas about promoting European unity and encouraging African political and economic development.

To Pool Military Data

3. The two decided to order their governments to resume cooperation at all levels, to pool military and political information, and to dovetail diplomatic planning.

In the coming months they likely will be a flurry of consultations to implement this, with the high-ups of both countries traveling back and forth across the Atlantic and to some of the world's trouble spots.

The need for the two government chiefs directly to order such a renewal of cooperation, even to spell out and sign understandings, underlines the revamped nature of the British-American Alliance.

In the years preceding Britain's intervention in Egypt, which the United States joined in condemning, this sort of thing was never necessary.

Taken together, all the understanding reaches, to pool military and political information, and to dovetail diplomatic planning.

McDonald begins a two-day conference today with Canada's Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent and his aides, flying in from Ottawa.

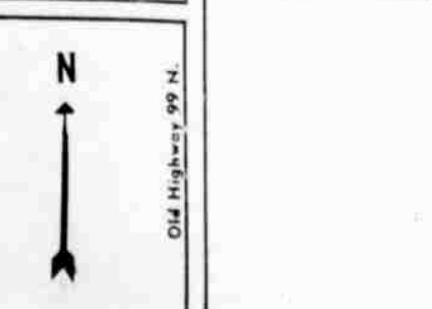
