Final Brief Filed In Hells Canyon Dam Squabble

WASHINGTON (AP) — The final brief apparently has been filed in the Hells Canyon case, clearing the way for a ruling on whether the Supreme Court will participate.

Evelyn Cooper, attorney for public power groups, Wednesday filed a brief replying to briefs submitted earlier by the Federal Power Commission (FPC) and Idaho Power Co. The latter two briefs were in reply to Mrs. Cooper's main brief offered several weeks ago.

The public power groups are asking the Supreme Court to review a U. S. circuit court decision upholding legality of a license the FPC granted the power company for construction of three dams on the Snake River bordering Idaho and Oregon. The three dams would flood the site of a federal Hells Canyon project proposed by the appellants.

Mrs. Cooper said in her final brief that the FPC and company made "erroneous and misleading" arguments about the federal power law.

The public power groups are contending the law requires the FPC to deny Idaho Power's application and recommend a federal dam which, they say, would provide greater public benefits.

Cramer Trial Expected To Go To Jury Today

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — The first degree murder trial of Guy Earl Cramer, trial of his finish, was expected to go to the jury Thursday.

Cramer is charged with the fatal shooting of Fred Peterson, Klamath County Welfare Board chairman, at a board meeting Jan. 4. Two other county officials were seriously wounded in the courthouse shooting.

The defense argues that Cramer is insane. Three prosecution witnesses testified Wednesday they believed him sane.

Dr. John W. Evans, Portland psychiatrist, said he believed Cramer was motivated by anger, and not by any "voice from Cramer's guardian angel." He based his belief on two days observations as a courtroom spectator. Cramer had said a "voice" told him to shoot.

Dr. Evans' view was given in answer to a 2,500 word hypothetical question, possibly the longest question ever put to a witness in a Klamath County court. It repeated Cramer's testimony and concluded by asking directly if he were sane.

The other prosecution witnesses who testified they believed Cramer was sane were Dr. Seth Kerion and Dr. J. C. Patterson.

Earlier, defense witnesses testified Cramer was insane.

PORTLAND (AP) — A new chairman of the Oregon Republican Central Committee will be elected here Saturday.

Members are expected to discuss a plan for making the chairmanship a salaried position as suggested by committeeman Al Loucks of Salem.

The new chairman will succeed Wendell Wyatt of Astoria who is resigning.

CHICAGO (AP) — Fifteen white youths, under indictment in the hammer slaying of a Negro high school student March 11, pleaded innocent in Criminal Court yesterday.

Bank Debits Decrease In Douglas, Coos, Curry

Bank debits for February in Douglas, Coos and Curry counties showed a decrease of 21.2 per cent from the previous month and a decrease of 18 per cent from February 1956.

Total bank debits for the area were \$40,926,553, with 11 banks reporting.

Bank debits for the entire state, totalling \$1,417,083,347 with 186 banks reporting, indicated a drop of 17.7 per cent from January, but showed a gain of 5.6 per cent over February 1956.

Bank debits, regarded as good indicators of business activity, represent the dollar value of checks drawn against the deposit accounts of individuals and business firms. The Bureau of Municipal Research at the University of Oregon, Eugene, collects bank debits monthly.
