SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Six thousand New York Central Railroad employees will strike at 6:30 a.m. Thursday in the road's Eastern Division, an official of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen said Tuesday.

H. A. Johnson, general chairman of the brotherhood, said his organization had called the strike on the ground the railroad had violated working agreements and the Railway Labor Act.

The Eastern Division encompasses traffic from Buffalo to New York City and from Clearfield, Pa., to Massena, N.Y.

The brotherhood membership includes assistant conductors, ticket collectors, baggage men, passenger and freight brakemen, retarder operators, yard foremen, yard and helpers and switch tenders.

Counties Oppose Using Of Funds For Fringe Areas

SALEM — County commissioners and the Assn. of Oregon Counties disapproved Tuesday of a proposal to let county road departments use some of their funds on "fringe area" roads.

The plan was suggested in a bill by Rep. Clarence Barton (D), Coquille, who told the House Highway Committee that residents in scattered suburban developments near Coquille and North Bend wanted Coos County improve their access routes.

Counties now are prohibited from spending money on dedicated streets. Barton's bill would amend the provision to permit only repairs and maintenance.

Another bill by Sen. Harry Bolvin (D), Klamath Falls, goes farther. It would include road improvements and bridge maintenance, but would limit expenditures to 5 per cent of the general county road fund.

M. J. Gleason, Multnomah County commissioner, said counties now are hard pressed to maintain their own road systems. He said Multnomah has 700 miles of county roads and 500 miles of dedicated streets. A 5 per cent allowance to maintain non-county-owned roads in Multnomah would amount to about \$200,000, he said.

Kenneth Neilson, Lane County commissioner, said Barton's proposal would take in every dedicated street or road in a county and commissioners would be under constant pressure by people wanting priorities. He said it would cost Lane County \$150,000 a year.

Judge F. L. Phipps, spokesman for the counties' organization, said every county he had heard from on the bill was strongly opposed.

Federal Judge Revokes Citizenship Of Matles

NEW YORK — A federal judge has revoked the citizenship of labor leader James J. Matles on the ground that Matles lied about his Communist ties in seeking naturalization.

Matles, 48, is director of organization for the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America. The independent union was voted out of the CIO in 1949 because it was allegedly Communist-dominated. Matles was born in Romania.

Judge Walter Bruchhausen said in his decision Tuesday that the government had shown during a six-week trial that Matles "had plunged into Communist activities and became a party member and officer shortly after he stepped upon the soil of this country in 1929."

Matles, who lives in Brooklyn, became a citizen in 1934.

Doctor Testifies Aged Woman Wanted To Die

LONDON — Scotland Yard's ace detective testified Tuesday that Dr. John Bodkin Adams told him the rich old lady he is charged with murdering "wanted to die."

Detective Supt. Herbert Hannam, wearing the formal morning attire that has won him the nickname of "the Duke," told the jury of 10 men and two women the 58-year-old bachelor doctor spoke thus of Mrs. Edith Alice Morrell.

"Easing the passing of a dying person isn't all that wicked. She wanted to die. That can't be murder. It is impossible to accuse a doctor."

Adams is accused of killing Mrs. Morrell with an overdose of drugs in 1950 to get a chest of antique silver and a Rolls Royce car from her estate. The 81-year-old widow had had a stroke.

HEADS-ONTEST

SALEM — Jeanne Bleckinger, Portland, was announced Wednesday as the winner of the annual essay contest conducted by the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Physically Handicapped.

A student of St. Mary's Academy of Portland, she receives a \$100 savings bond. She also will enter a national competition.

Russians Ready To Begin Trade With W. Germany

MOSCOW — Premier Nikolai Bulganin notified Chancellor Konrad Adenauer Saturday the Soviet Union is ready to begin trade talks with West Germany in April. He said they could be held in Moscow or Bonn.

In a letter to the German leader, released by the Soviet foreign ministry, Bulganin expressed belief relations between the two countries are developing in "an atmosphere of trust and friendship."

He coupled this honeyed phrase, however, with a blast at West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano. He accused Von Brentano of making false, unfounded charges against the Soviet Union that "can only provoke disappointment and do not serve the interest of friendship."

Bulganin's letter was the latest in an exchange between the two leaders which he initiated six weeks ago.

The Soviet premier agreed with Adenauer that cultural, scientific and technical cooperation between the two countries could be initiated through normal diplomatic channels.

West German Ambassador Wilhelm Genscher paid a courtesy call Saturday on Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

Langley Adopts Changed Course For Libel Suits

PORTLAND — Dist. Atty. William M. Langley Monday dropped his two million dollar suit against The Oregonian and several individuals.

His attorney told Federal Judge William East that instead of the federal court prosecution—which was under a rarely used statute—Langley plans to sue the defendants individually for libel.

The federal court complaint had charged the defendants with depriving Langley of his civil rights as a result of charges aired in the Portland vice investigation touched off by The Oregonian.

Defendants were The Oregonian, Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton, racketeer James B. Elkins, former Police Chief Jim Purcell Jr., former Secretary of State Earl Newberry, and six Oregonian employees.

Judge East dismissed the case as Langley asked, and said Langley was to pay the expenses of the attorneys in preparing the defense.

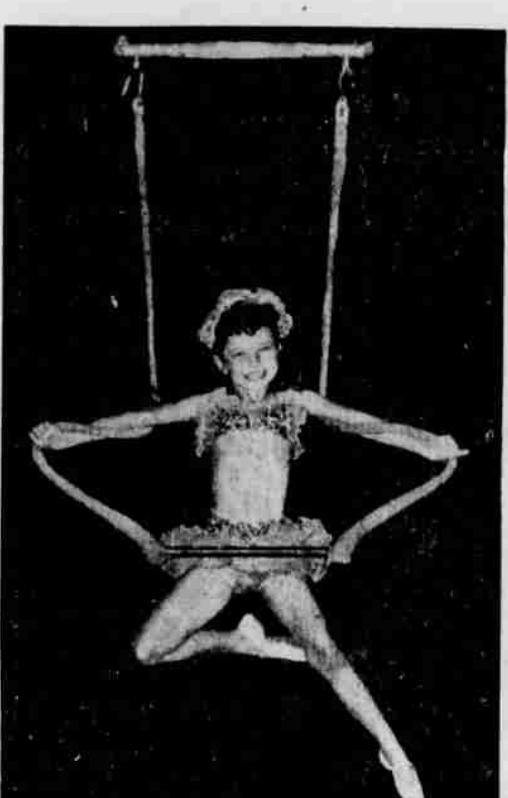
In state court Monday, Langley filed motions asking that two of three indictments returned against him by the February grand jury be set aside. They are indictments charging malfeasance and conspiracy. He asked that the records of the grand jury be inspected in connection with his motions. The third February indictment charges him with failure to prosecute gambling.

RECOMMEND PASSAGE

SALEM — The House State and Federal Affairs Committee Wednesday recommended passage of a memorial asking Congress to provide pensions for World War I veterans, but limiting such pensions to those in need.

The committee vote was 6 to 3. The committee also decided again to table a memorial asking Congress to halt foreign aid.

Hungarians Refusing To Deliver U. S. Letter

NEW YORK — Communist officials in Hungary are refusing to deliver letters from the United States if they bear the postmark "Support Your Crusade for Freedom."

The undelivered letters are being returned here. The action follows a Hungarian Foreign Ministry protest against the postmark earlier this month.

The postmark refers to the Crusade for Freedom, the private anti-Communist organization that supports Radio Free Europe.

The Communists have accused the Crusade of trying to foment revolt behind the Iron Curtain, a charge denied by the organization.

Oregon Rancher Accused In Slot Machines Raid

PENDLETON — O. J. Brogotti, Umatilla County wheat rancher, was under arrest Saturday on a charge of possession of games of chance stemming from a raid in which some 150 slot machines were seized Friday.

He was one of two persons authorized to sign checks for the company, which rented the property, part of a World War II air base, from the city.

Police Chief Ernest Galaher arrested him. After appearance in justice of peace court he was released under \$1,000 bond.

A few pinball machines also were seized with the slot devices. Brogotti and a B. E. Johnson were authorized to sign checks for the company. They were the only names police said were connected with the firm. Galaher said he understood Johnson was a former Oregon Liquor Control Commission enforcement officer.

Red Cross To Continue Aiding Families In Vale

VALE — Red Cross flood relief headquarters will be continued here another two weeks, completing assistance to families who suffered severe losses in the February flood.

Miss Marna Murphy, representing the San Francisco area office, said the Red Cross to March 22 had spent \$14,933 for individual family assistance and another \$1,300 for shelter, food and other help given in the mass assistance program set up shortly after melting snow sent streams out of their banks.

The city Tuesday issued warrants to meet a \$4,000 payroll for flood disaster workers when federal disaster relief funds failed to reach here on time. Previously the city had borrowed from other municipal funds but city clerk Jack Pierce said those funds were exhausted, forcing the city to a warrant basis for payments.

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
