

Young Fugitives Are Recaptured

KINGMAN, Ariz. (AP) — Four like cattle." The fourth was seized two hours later after he hitched a ride with some tourists.

The quartet got away from Maricopa (Phoenix) County sheriff's Capt. Vernon Lamore and his wife Monday night just after being returned from California to face criminal charges in Phoenix.

Three of the fugitives — Mrs. Shirley Duke, 18; Ronnie Durbin, 16, and Robert Kimball — gave up without a struggle. Ranchers tied their wrists and carted them off to jail.

James Seifert, 21, made a run for it, but his freedom was short-lived. Roadblocks had been set up throughout the area, and a Nevada car in which he hitched a ride was stopped by Highway Patrol Sgt. Floyd Cisney about two hours later.

Cisney said Seifert had a .38 revolver in his pocket but offered no resistance.

Compromise Seen Over Passenger PUC Authority

SALEM, (AP) — The battle over abandonment of passenger service in Southern Oregon appeared near compromise Thursday.

Sen. Philip S. Lowry (R), Medford, author of two bills to give the public utilities commissioner power over all aspects of freight and passenger service, said he would make his bills more attractive to the railroad.

He told the Senate Commerce and Utilities Committee he is agreeable to a provision that the PUC must hold a public hearing before passenger service can be reduced. The Southern Pacific had previously told the committee it wouldn't object to that.

Lowry also said he wouldn't mind if the committee removes his provision giving the PUC power over all aspects of freight and passenger service. But he said he still wants a provision permitting freight complaints to be filed with the PUC.

The whole argument was started in 1955 when the SP removed its passenger service on its Siskiyou line in Southern Oregon. The PUC tried to stop the abandonment, but found it lacked authority to do so.

NOT SURPRISED

Senate Resumes Water Projects Bill Consideration

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate resumed consideration Thursday of a 1 1/2 billion dollars water projects authorization bill against a backdrop of criticism by President Eisenhower at the way Congress sometimes authorizes such public work projects.

Before the Senate was a bill by its Public Works Committee to authorize future appropriations totaling 1 1/2 billion dollars for construction of 105 flood control, navigation, hydroelectric and beach erosion projects.

The bill, incidentally, is virtually the same as one which the President vetoed last year.

In an oblique reference to the measure, the President told his news conference Wednesday in discussing his budget and problems involved in trimming it:

"Take the vast number of the great number of public works that are authorized without proper engineering studies to back them up. Congress authorizes them. Why? It must be for political purposes, because the engineering department has not said they are necessary."

This prompted Chairman Chavez (D-NM) of the Senate committee to retort that projects in the bill "will do just as much for the country and for the economy of the country as the proposed additional office space in the White House."

The bill was under fire of Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.), who offered an amendment to trim the authorization by 25 per cent. He would accomplish this by specifying that no projects would be considered authorized until the President scans the list and determines which of them—to the extent of at least 375 million dollars—are the least essential. This group of least essential then would be placed in a deferred list while the other 75 per cent of the projects would be considered authorized.

Another fight shaped up on a

proposal to authorize 25 million dollars for a start on the Bruce's Eddy Dam in Idaho. Sens. Morse (D-Ore) and Neuberger (D-Ore) want to eliminate it from the bill. They said pending studies on the project's effect on fish and wildlife should be completed first.

RECORD BACKLOG

SALEM (AP) — The state Supreme Court had a record backlog of 353 cases at the start of this year, F. M. Sercombe, clerk of the court, reported Wednesday.

During last year, 246 cases were closed, including 174 by written opinion.

The average number of opinions written per justice was 29.7, compared with 25.8 in 1955.

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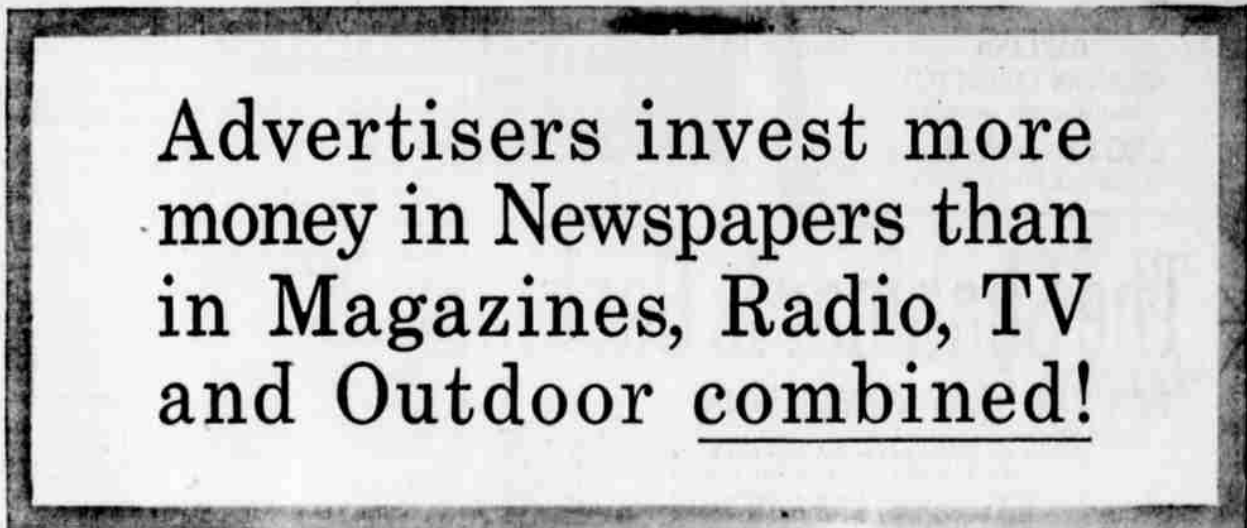
