Non-Union Labor Safety Demands Come From Quiz

WASHINGTON — The Senate investigation of alleged finagling of Teamsters Union officials is spurring demands that Congress act to safeguard the rights of the laboring man.

Such demands were voiced over the weekend by Republican and Democratic senators, by Secretary of Labor Mitchell and by Americans for Democratic Action.

Proposals ranged from greater protection of "democratic process" in unions to closer policing of union funds.

There was some talk that the Senate probe might build a fire under a drive for enactment of more state "right-to-work" laws, which outlaw the union shop. Eighteen states already have them. The possibility was raised too of a federal "right-to-work" law.

Debate arose over whether the disclosures would set back the labor movement. Senators Ives (R-NY) and Kefauver (D-Tenn.) have them. The possibility was raised too of a federal "right-to-work" law.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), chairman of the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee, said "I wouldn't, as a result of these hearings, simply undertake to pass laws of reprisal, laws of punishment."

McClellan said the hearings so far "clearly" indicate to him that "there should be federal legislation to insure the democratic processes in unions" and to insure "the security of their funds so they cannot be dissipated or misappropriated or stolen or diverted to any other purpose than union purposes."

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) said legislation is needed to put some teeth in Fair-Hartley law provisions dealing with union reports of their finances.

Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) said he favors public disclosure of union welfare and pension funds "to clean up this mess."

Secretary Mitchell said on a television program an administration bill to allow publication of union financial reports will be pressed again this year. He said it "lay dormant" in Congress last year.

Ban On Union Picketing Upheld By State Senate

SALEM — The 1953 law banning unions from picketing non-union business for the purpose of organizing them was upheld by the Oregon State Senate Monday.

The Senate refused, 16-14, to reconsider its vote of last Friday, when it rejected, also 16-14, a bill to repeal the law.

Monday's action means that the repeal legislation is dead as far as this Legislature is concerned.

Alleged Forger Wanted Here Held At Pendleton

A magazine tossed from a car window near Pendleton led to the arrest Sunday of Thomas Guy Turner, 33, wanted by the Douglas County sheriff's office on a forgery charge.

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said today that a deputy was en route to Pendleton to pick up Turner after his arraignment in a justice court on a littering charge. Byrd said Turner was accused of forging a check for \$250 at Mark's Market.

According to the Associated Press, Turner was arrested by a state policeman for throwing a magazine from his car window. When the policeman radioed Pendleton to find out how much bail should be set, he was informed that Turner was wanted on the forgery charge.

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Iran Reacts To Killing Of 3 Americans

Premier Will Resign; U. S. Aid Halted

Body Of Mrs. Carroll, Shot In Heart, Found; Bandit Search Pushed

TEHRAN, Iran — Sources close to the Iranian government said Monday Prime Minister Hussein Ala has told associates he will resign as a result of the desert bandit massacre of three Americans.

These informants said the prime minister's resignation will be announced Wednesday, after the departure of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, now in Tehran as a government guest, so as "to prevent embarrassment" to Adenauer.

The sources said Dr. Menecheher Eghbal, vigorous president of Tehran University, court minister and close associate of the Shah, will be proposed as new premier.

The change reportedly was to give the government a stronger hand in dealing with banditry and tribal defiance of the government.

Earlier, the United States announced that the Point Four program in southeast Iran has been suspended until the killers are caught.

The American victims of the bandits were Mrs. Anita Carroll and her husband, Kevin, a U. S. Point Four program official.

Brewster Wilson, development specialist for the Near East Foundation, Mrs. Carroll's body was found Sunday two miles from the

Tornadoes Damage Texas But Rains Lessen Drouth

DALLAS — Tornadoes and heavy rains pounded parts of Texas Saturday but despite the violence there was a bright side to the weather picture — the drought signs of easing its long grip on parts of the state.

A squall line plowed across eastern Texas into Louisiana last night. Tornadoes lashed at least five places. Only two persons were injured, but property damage was high.

A two-mile path of destruction was cut in the southeast Texas town of Huntsville, apparently from a tornado. Damage was estimated at half a million dollars.

The path of destruction, about a block wide, included unroofed houses, smashed power lines and trees and shattered windows.

Hard rains fell in north central Texas. Dallas got almost 3 inches, heaviest rainfall in one day since last spring.

Minor property damage was reported from tornadoes at Austin, Boerne and Bryan. A twister at Baytown damaged at least three houses and knocked down the 265-foot tower of radio station KRCT.

Lightning set fire to three of five storage tanks of the Reford Oil Co. 10 miles west of Goliad. Damage was estimated at \$10,000.

Several homes were evacuated, a bridge was washed out and many roads were temporarily closed by rain waters near Dallas.

Hells Canyon Decision Death Blow To Public Power Group

High Court Refuses To Review Licenses Granted Idaho Firm

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court Monday dealt a blow to public power advocates by refusing to review Federal Power Commission licensing of three private power company dams in Hells Canyon.

The case for years has been the center of a political and private-public power dispute.

Public power groups appealed to the high tribunal after the U. S. Court of Appeals here upheld the FPC license for private power dams on the Snake River bordering Idaho and Oregon.

The Supreme Court's refusal to review was announced in a brief order, which noted only that Justice Douglas felt the case should have been reviewed.

The public power groups have been seeking approval for construction of a single high federal dam in Hells Canyon. The commission license was given the Idaho Power Co. for dams at Belle Canyon, Oxbow and Brownell. These dams would flood the proposed federal project site.

Steamboat Creek Scene Of Roseburg Worker's Death

A 39-year-old Roseburg man died Saturday afternoon in Steamboat Creek near the Lane County line. Coroner L. L. Powers said today that he's still trying to have cause of death determined.

John Roy Thomas' body was pulled from the swift stream after he apparently slipped and fell while wading across the creek with a prospecting partner, Thomas Lester Cook, Winston.

The accident occurred about 3:15 p.m. 12½ miles above the bridge at Steamboat. Powers said an autopsy Sunday morning failed to show cause of death, but added that it wasn't by drowning. The autopsy disclosed Thomas had suffered a hemorrhage in his right temple. Specimens have been sent to the University of Oregon Medical School, Portland, for pathological study.

Cook told Powers and investigating sheriff's deputies that he and Thomas had started to ford the creek 400 or 500 feet downstream from where Thomas fell in, Powers said.

Lloyd McCord, Roseburg, who owns a mining claim next to that of Thomas and Cook, and Richard Anderson, a Joseph Lane Junior High School student on an outing with Cook, pulled the body from the creek 400 or 500 feet downstream from where Thomas fell in, Powers said.

Cook, Powers said, had tried unsuccessfully to grab Thomas after he fell. Also in on the rescue was Cook's son, Edward, a high school student.

McCord said that both Thomas' boots and a sock were off the victim's feet when the body was rescued.

Thomas was born March 30, 1918, at Okmulgee, Okla., and came to Roseburg 12 years ago. He was a crane operator for Umpqua Plywood Corp. and a member of International Woodworkers of America, Local 9-2.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Bertha Thomas, Roseburg; two sons, James and Bobby; a daughter, Diane; four brothers, Roy of Holliday, Texas; Albert of Vera, Okla.; William of Tacoma and Edgar of Tulsa, Okla.; four sisters, Mrs. Pearl Taylor of Claremore, Okla.; Mrs. Jewell Wennerholm of Tulsa, Mrs. Ella Moore of Wichita Falls, Texas, and Mrs. Bertha Wise, Tulsa.

The body was removed to The Chapel of the Cross and funeral arrangements will be announced upon arrival of relatives.

Killer Of Two Kin Dies With Officer In Battle

MARION, Ohio — A young father's bitter resentment against his child's grandparents erupted Saturday night in a wave of terror that cost four lives.

Police said Manford Draper, 27, ran down with his auto and killed Albert Pollock, 41, and his wife, Sylvia, 42, the grandparents of his daughter. Shortly after, Draper and state patrolman Robert E. Karsmiski, 35, were killed in a gun battle that climaxed a 29-mile chase.

Draper's fury against the Pollocks resulted from his belief that they were "poisoning the mind" of his daughter, Martha Elizabeth, 6, against him, police said.

The child's mother, Marilyn Pollock, said she was never married to Draper but had lived with him before Martha was born. She said Draper had threatened her because he believed she and the Pollocks were keeping him from seeing the little girl.

Airplane Wreck Injuries Keeping Long In Hospital

Jerry Long, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Long of Roseburg, is reported in good condition this morning at a Corvallis hospital.

Long and another youth, Al Wood, 21, of Salem, suffered skull and minor injuries Thursday night when their light plane crash-landed at the Corvallis airport.

Mr. and Mrs. Long are in Corvallis where their son is hospitalized with head and other injuries. A private nurse reports his condition is good, but he is not expected to be released for some time.

Allen, who was not hurt as badly, has been released from the hospital. Both youths are students at Oregon State College.

Parents, Sister, Brother Slain By Boy Of 14

2nd Sister Wounded In Shooting As Sequel To Quarrel At Home

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. — "How are they? Are they going to live?" Chief of Detectives Verne Starmer answered the telephone at the Ossie Woolridge home.

Woolridge, 57-year-old plumbing and heating installer, was dead. So was Mrs. Woolridge, 45; DeLores, 11, youngest of their two daughters; and Paul, 6, youngest of their four sons. Doris, 12, was shot through the neck and side, critically wounded.

"You better give yourself up," Starmer told the voice on the phone — "Mr. Smith." It was a young voice. Starmer recognized it despite the disguise.

So the police picked up 14-year-old Daniel Woolridge at a theater where remorse had overtaken him as he watched "The Wrong Man," an Alfred Hitchcock detective thriller.

Prosecutor Frank Connett Jr. said the sobbing boy signed a statement saying he "suddenly went crazy."

A quiet Sunday dinner at the Woolridge home, after Sunday school at the Riverside Presbyterian Church, had erupted in a fuss between Daniel and his parents.

Daniel wanted to go for a ride. His father said it was too cold. (Continued on Page 3 Col. 5)

Bermuda Confab Threat Of Atomic War, Soviet Says

MOSCOW — Russia has accused President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Macmillan of planning atomic war at their Bermuda conference and warned of massive Red retaliation.

The Soviet Foreign Ministry charged that the two Western leaders made decisions which tended to increase international tension and the danger of new conflict.

The statement — first official Soviet comment on the Bermuda parley — was clearly aimed at arousing British fear of nuclear bomb reprisals from the East in case of war.

The statement said the American promise to give long-range guided missiles to Britain would turn the island into "a springboard for rockets" and an "atomic bridgehead for the United States."

"The British government places the English people under the fatal danger of inevitable atomic retaliation," it said.

The statement warned both the United States and Britain "the course they are following could lead to catastrophe for those who are trying to unleash such a war on other nations."

Local Building Slows In March, Report Shows

Building in Roseburg almost came to a halt in March, reports from the city building inspector show.

During the month, C. N. Currier, building inspector, said today, the total valuation of work done came to \$28,161. This covers 28 building permits issued. All permits were for alterations and repairs, no new houses or commercial building permits were issued.

A year ago the same month, six residence permits and one commercial building permit were issued. The total valuation for that month was \$88,735, with \$61,000 for new houses and \$3,000 for the commercial structure.

In February of this year 22 permits were issued for \$45,783 valuation. This was mainly for alteration work with carpentry the only new construction.

Henninger's Glendale Market Burglarized

Henninger's Market in Glendale was broken into Saturday night. Sheriff Ira C. Byrd reported today.

A wide variety of items were taken from the store, the sheriff said, ranging from suitcases to clothing and cigarettes. About \$750 cash was also taken, he added.

The sheriff's department is continuing its investigation.

Democrats Out Today For Sweep In Michigan

DETROIT — Michigan Democrats seek to consolidate a decade of political gains in today's state-wide election by a pair of victories that would give them a sweep of the State Administrative Board for the first time in history.

Democrats haven't held every seat on the nine-man board since its creation in 1921. The board, made up of the state's top office holders, exercises general supervisory control over administrative departments.

State highway commissioner and state superintendent of public instruction are the only board jobs not held by Republicans, who 10 years ago had all 23 state elected offices.

Democrats now hold nine state-wide posts. They swept six out of six last November despite the fact the state gave President Eisenhower a 553,000-vote majority.

A convincing Republican victory today would do much to inject new hope and fire in the state party. The GOP, under the direction of its new 35-year-old state chairman, Lawrence B. Lindemer, has been emphasizing the qualifications of its candidates in the campaign.

Name, Location Changed By Douglas Abstract Co.

The Douglas Abstract Co. name has been changed to the Douglas County Title Co., and the organization has moved from 603 SE Jackson St. to 629 SE Main St., R. M. Beardsley, secretary - treasurer, said.

The company opened for business in the new location this morning. The building on Main Street was formerly occupied by the Umpqua Insurance Agency, which has moved to a new building at the corner of Lane Avenue and Rose Street.

The Douglas Abstract Co. was established in Roseburg, under another name, in 1979. In 1920 the company moved from the corner of Washington Avenue and Jackson Street to the location just vacated.

Reason for the move to 629 SE Main St. is more space, Beardsley said. Seven people are working at the new location.

Student Pastor Reveals His Prison Rap To Congregation

MURDER PENALTY TAKEN FOR KIN, Later Sent To Electric Chair

NEWARK, N.J. — A student pastor once convicted of murder and sentenced to life in prison, Sunday revealed his prison rap to his congregation.

With tears in his eyes, Jerry Cacopardo stood for a few minutes facing the congregation, then began:

"A great deal has happened since I last spoke to you. . . . A great deal had."

Last Wednesday, Gov. Averell Harriman of New York announced that he was freeing Cacopardo, now a pastor at the Reformed Christian church in Hackensack, from lifetime parole restrictions.

In 1937 Cacopardo had been convicted of the murder of a 27-year-old Brooklyn, N. Y. girl. Now married he is the father of two young children.

In his sermon Sunday, Cacopardo repeated an earlier statement that he "took the rap" for an uncle who later died in the electric chair for heading a Philadelphia murder - for - insurance ring.

While in jail, Cacopardo became an assistant to the prison chaplain and began his studies for the ministry. He took correspondence courses while in prison and entered the Bloomfield, N. J. College and Seminary on his release in 1952.

He is scheduled to graduate this month and has already received six calls from Presbyterian parishes. Until Harriman's announcement only a few friends and relatives knew of his past life.

Cacopardo took for his sermon the 22nd Chapter of the Book of Genesis, Verses 1-19. The section deals with God's command to Abraham asking that he sacrifice Isaac, and when Abraham prepares to carry out the command, God's repudiation of it.

"My tragedy gave me the opportunity to turn unto God," he said.

"For 20 years I have waited for this day, and all I ask is to be given a chance to prove I was not the man I was painted to be."

Oregon Traffic Mishaps Claim Eight Lives

Three Of Victims Die In Two-Car Collision On Coast Highway

Weekend traffic accidents killed eight persons in Oregon. A ninth died of injuries suffered earlier. It was the worst weekend of the year for highway fatalities in the state.

Two died early Sunday when an automobile plunged off Highway 30, near Lime, some 40 miles east of Baker. They were Beryl V. Ham, 40, of Summerville, and Mary Jean Howe, 24, of Baker. Two others, Jack Whitbread, 26, and Robert D. Gordon, 23, both of Baker and passengers in the car, were injured.

Pvt. Lee Roy Riggs, a soldier stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash., apparently fell asleep while driving on Highway 99 south of Medford early Sunday. He was killed outright when the car collided with a truck. A passenger, Miss Lila Mae Gunter, Prosser, Wash., died a few hours later. The truck driver was not hurt.

On the Coast Highway south of Coquille, three persons were killed in a two-car crash. They were Leslie W. Moench, Coquille, V. M. Newton, 30, Gold Beach; and Mrs. Mona Barnes, Eugene.

Mortimer Hartwell was fatally injured Saturday night when he was struck by a car in downtown Portland.

And Mrs. Maude F. Hamburger, 79, died in a Portland hospital Saturday from injuries suffered Thursday when she was struck by a car.

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State Senate Approves Umpqua Boat Angling

SALEM — The Senate passed and sent to the House Monday a bill to repeal the law which bans boat fishing in the North Umpqua River above Winchester Dam.

The effect of the bill would be to permit the Game Commission to regulate boat fishing in that area.

Sen. Dan Dimick (D), Roseburg, said that the Game Commission plans to permit boat fishing in four reservoirs formed by hydroelectric projects in the river above the dam.

The law closing that portion of the river was passed in 1931.

REAR ADM. YOUNG DIES

LOS ALTOS, Calif. — Rear Adm. Edward Watson Young (ret.), 55, who won a Navy Cross in the submarine service in World War II and was associated with a tool firm since retiring from naval service in 1954, died Saturday.

Interior Dept. Action Boon To Lumbering

Timber No Longer Need Be Processed In Area Where It's Purchased

PORTLAND — The U. S. Department of the Interior Monday abolished marketing area restrictions on the two million acres of rich O&C timberland in Western Oregon.

The decision means that O&C timber no longer has to be processed or manufactured in the area where it was purchased. It applies also to the Coor Bay Wagon Road grant lands.

Undersecretary of the Interior Hatfield Chilson said abolishment of the restrictions will boost employment in logging areas "as the end result of better utilization."

He said that knocking down the marketing barriers will promote "conditions conducive to competition" and that the end that prices will naturally be higher for the most efficient manufacturers.

Many communities benefit. Many lumbering communities will be aided by the new program, Chilson said. He added that "any possible injury will be minor."

The federal government's decision to end the controversial marketing areas followed four years of study and a hearing in Portland March 1.

Chilson said the federal government will continue to impose its sustained yield program on the broad belt of Douglas fir that covers most of western Oregon.

The timberland has been administered by the Bureau of Land Management since 1936. It reverted to the federal government in 1918.

The land originally was given to the Oregon and California Railroad Co. in 1866, but the firm later failed to comply with stipulations of the federal grant.
