Joseph Henry Abein, 57, who operated the Roseburg Transit Co. for a number of years until bus service was suspended about a year ago, died Saturday at his home at 240 NE Patterson St. He was born April 13, 1880, in South Dakota, and came to Roseburg 12 years ago to make his home. He was a veteran of World War I.

Surviving are his wife, Eleanor, Roseburg; two sons, Joseph Henry Jr., Roseburg, and Marvin Edward, a marine stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif.; a stepson, Donald, Roseburg, and a sister, Mrs. Mary Forbes, Waterloo, Iowa.

The body was removed to the Chapel of the Risen, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

farm forest facts

A recent visitor to our county was Hardy Glascock, regional forester of the Industrial Forestry Assn., sponsor of the American Tree Farm System.

To become a tree farm, which is an honorary title given to an area devoted to the continuous production of trees, the owner must qualify in a number of ways.

First, he must be seriously attempting to protect his woodland against fire by cutting snags, having adequate roads, water holes, equipment and a fire plan that will insure future crops of trees.

HE MUST also take reasonable precautions against insects, disease, and destructive grazing.

During the course of his visit we visited the following Douglas County tree growers, about which we will hear more at a later date.

The Stewart Neeleys' of Camas Valley were among the first to be visited. Both husband and wife are "farming" Christmas trees on their 100 acres which they have been marketing in California for several years.

LOUIS PAPT, also of Camas Valley, is likewise "farming" his 17 acres of Christmas trees which includes planted trees in open areas.

Chester and Norman Rydell of Drain are old timers at pole, piling, and log thinning, having started this work about 11 years ago on their 1,400 acres of timberland.

Gail Briner, state 4-H forestry winner, and her sister, Donna, have also been doing a fine job of pruning on the family ranch in Scotts Valley.

When Hardy returns again next month, we will visit more Douglas County tree growers.

Oregon GOP Elects New Committee Head

PORTLAND 10 — James F. Short, former state director of agriculture, was elected chairman of the Republican State Central Committee here Saturday.

Short, 54, succeeds Wendell Wyatt, Astoria attorney, who resigned.

Short now makes his home in Salem where he is establishing a ranch brokerage business. He also operates a livestock ranch at Redmond.

The committee voted to move the state headquarters from Portland to Salem and took under study a proposal to make the post of state chairman a paid position.

The committee also discussed a program designed to regain control of major state offices in 1938.

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12,000 Presley Fans Hear Hip Swinger Sing

CHICAGO 8 — Elvis Presley, wearing a \$2,500 gold leaf suit and \$100 golden slippers, sang 16 songs in less than an hour before some 12,000 shrieking teen-agers last night at the International Amphitheatre.

Thirteen girls, many wailing "We want Elvis!" were carried to the first aid station during the rock 'n' roll singer's one-night Chicago program.

When he came on the stage, nearly two hours after the program started, his young fans stormed the stage. One girl swung her purse at a policeman, missed him and hit Tony Carvatta, 18, an usher. He suffered head injuries and was taken to a hospital.

The fans stood on chairs, in the aisles, and wailed as Elvis swayed and strummed his guitar. They paid \$2.50 to \$3 a seat. Elvis reportedly got \$10,000.

Complaints Filed

Lawrence R. Bailey vs. Warren R. Campbell. Plaintiff claims injuries suffered in auto collision Nov. 16, 1935 on Nonpareil Rd. He asks \$10,000 for pain and suffering and \$75 for medical treatment.

Marie Putnam vs. Jimmie C. Ashley, Robert J. Bell, John S. Landers, Calvin Rayburn. Plaintiff seeks \$10,000 general damages and \$150 special damages for injuries allegedly suffered in car accident Dec. 28, 1936 on Highway 99, about seven miles south of Roseburg. Plaintiff claims her car slipped on ice and defendants hit her car and one another.
