Fretwell received basic training at Ft. Knox, Ky., and arrived in Europe in June of 1956. He attended Roseburg High School.

The 19-year-old soldier completed the school's eight-week artillery surveyor course which trained him in the fundamentals of surveying and in the use and care of its equipment.

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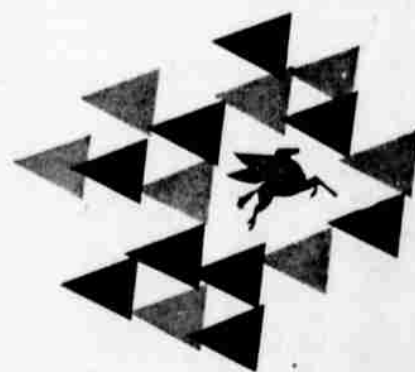
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
