Fourth Child Dies Suddenly

MILWAUKEE — A 16-year-old girl collapsed and died at school Friday — the fourth child in her family to be stricken similarly within a period of about nine years.

Margaret Rose Molitor collapsed at Pius XI High School while attending a mass. She was dead on arrival at a hospital.

The medical examiner's office said death was due to an "apparent" heart attack.

Margaret Rose was the fourth child of Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Molitor to die suddenly.

Twelve-year-old Frederick collapsed and died while playing in August, 1950. An autopsy disclosed no abnormal heart condition in his case, his mother said.

Rita Marie, 18, died while helping an elderly man from a street car in December of 1949. Death was listed by the medical examiner as due to an "apparent" heart attack.

Thomas, who also was 12 at the time of his death, collapsed while swimming on July 12, 1948. The medical examiner's report in his case gave a heart ailment as the cause.

Surviving, in addition to the parents, are two more children — 24-year-old Donald and Yvonne, 15.

Oregon Labor Press Says Safeguards Needed

PORTLAND — The Oregon Labor Press said in this week's edition the federal government must create union "safeguards" if the AFL-CIO fails to police its own house.

A \$50,000 a year salary is too high for any union official, the paper said, and added: "Leadership in a trade union should more resemble a religious vocation than a business career."

The paper is the official publication of the Oregon AFL-CIO. Among the "safeguards" the paper urged be created would be regular audits of local and national union funds, either by "independent accountants and-or rank and file members."

The paper also called for full reports on all health, welfare and pension funds. Labor officials also should be forbidden to have "any substantial interest" in firms with which their unions have bargaining agreements, the paper said.

Doctor Found Innocent Of Delinquent Death

JUNEAU, Alaska — An Idaho surgeon accused of manslaughter in the death of a patient was found innocent of the charge.

After 10 hours of deliberations, a U.S. District Court jury freed Dr. Edward K. Distler, 37, of Caldwell, Idaho, of charges filed after the death of Clarence Weaver, 40, an employee at the Mt. Edgewood Medical Center near Sika.

Weaver died after a cystoscopic examination at the hospital in July, 1954.

During the two week trial, Dr. Distler, a former senior assistant surgeon in the U.S. Public Health Service, was accused by government attorneys of "gross negligence" and a "wanton disregard" for the life of Weaver.

Music Teacher, Students Killed

GREAT FALLS, Mont. — Five Fort Benton high school students and the school's music director were killed Saturday in a car-truck collision on U.S. Highway 87 northeast of Great Falls.

The accident was Montana's second worst. The state's worst traffic crash, which killed seven Montana State College students, occurred near Bozeman in 1950.

Killed in Saturday's crash on a highway reported wet from rain and in foggy weather were Merle Parsons, the Fort Benton high school music director, and these five students:

Mark Paul, Jerome Nagegast, Alderine LaBarre, Cleo Lorene Crane and Bob Peterson.

The victims were in a car heading for Great Falls to take part in a music festival.

The truck driver, John A. Henen, Great Falls, said survivor of the crash, had an injured knee.

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
