"that just changing the headquarters will eliminate the pressure from the Arlington Club. The question is whether the leaders of the party might want to ignore suggestions that might flow from the club."

He said he would leave April 19 for San Francisco to attend a Western conference on higher education, and return the following day. About 26 Oregon leaders in higher education plan to attend the meeting, and the governor will moderate a panel on human resources.

"I am going," he said, "because this is one of the most critical areas for years to come. We must explore what has to be done in this field."

The governor was asked whether his commutation of the death sentence of James Norman Jensen also means he will commute the death sentence of George Sack, Portland wife slayer whose case is on appeal.

"I will not face that problem until he's all through the courts and until we get closer to the time to make the decision," he answered.

He commuted the sentence of Jensen, Medford Hatchet slayer, last week, because he doesn't believe in Capital punishment.

He said that the McClellan committee hearings on Portland vice haven't given Oregon a bad name. "In fact," he said, "I have received only one letter from outside of the state."

"That was from a man in South Carolina who asked what the state was doing to find out the truth. I answered him that the previous governor started the investigation, and that I am continuing it."

Portland Area Teamsters Meet Call Proposed

PORTLAND — A meeting of all Teamsters in the Portland area to discuss the handling of union funds was proposed last Monday by Robert Miller, chairman of a five-man Teamster committee.

Miller said the executive board of the Joint Council of Teamsters No. 37 will be asked at its Friday meeting to call the session.

Miller said that general meeting of members of all locals is so unusual that there is some uncertainty about how to go about it.

Miller said of the committee he heads "We aren't rebels. There is no dissension among the rank and file of Teamster members or even with the local officers. We are in accord with some of the views of Sen. McClellan (head of the Senate committee investigating labor racketeering). Some of our telegrams have been misunderstood."

At least three telegrams have been sent to the Senate subcommittee in support of various aspects of its investigation.

Meanwhile, a mimeographed notice addressed to Teamsters, and signed only "Union Defense Committee" was found on the tailgates of several trucks at the Portland dock Monday.

"If you know you're alive, you know that your union and the whole labor movement are now under attack by the rich parasites of the country through their agents in government—the McClellans, Kennedys, McCarthys, Mundts, Goldwaters—and by a big lie campaign in the brain washing industry," from The Oregonian to the New York Times, from Lowell Thomas to Fulton Lewis Jr.

"Are you going to let these hypocrites 'con' you into turning your union over to a bunch of company flunkies in the union office or in government?"

"Remember, the companies and their agents in government, union and community are the real enemy. The worst that a union official—or member—can be is a company stooge."

Efforts Resumed To Fill Jury In Matovich Trial

MOSCOW, Idaho — Attorneys resume their efforts Tuesday to complete a jury for the murder-trial of Paul D. Matovich, 21-year-old University of Idaho freshman.

The lawyers agreed on four prospective jurors out of the 14 interviewed Monday. The other nine were excused either for having "personal scruples" against the death penalty, or for "having already established an opinion in regard to the action."

Matovich is on trial for charges of first degree murder and arson in connection with a dormitory fire on the campus Oct. 19. Three fellow students died in the blaze.

He sat quietly in the courtroom Monday while attorneys questioned prospective jurors on their feelings towards capital punishment and their opinions on whether or not Matovich was guilty.

Earlier in the day, Judge Hugh A. Baker denied a defense motion to prohibit the state from using as evidence any statements made by Matovich after his arrest.

which has received evidence that Dave Beck, Teamsters Union president, used \$85,000 of union funds to buy rich clothing and other items at a discount through Shefferman, a Chicago specialist on labor-management relations.

In his testimony, Shefferman had named Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers, and several other labor leaders as among the several hundred business and labor executives for whom he said he had made discount purchases.

McClellan said he was releasing the report only to be fair to them because the four names had been injected—"not by myself"—into the public hearings.

Beck meantime returned quietly to Washington and presided Monday over a day-long secret meeting of the Teamsters Union's Executive Board.

There was no immediate official announcement of the meeting's purpose or of the action taken.

The Washington Post and Times reported Tuesday the board had rejected Beck's plan to set up a million-dollar publicity fund.

The Post and Times Herald said only two members of the 13-man Executive Board—Beck and Einar Mohn, a vice president and Beck's executive assistant—voted for Beck's million-dollar proposal.

Beck last week announced plans for the publicity program to tell "the union's side of the story."

He said then the board already had approved the plan in an informal telephone poll, but that story was challenged by the union's secretary-treasurer, John English.

James R. Hoffa, a vice president of the union, said there was no consideration given at the meeting to the possibility of withdrawing the Teamsters Union from the AFL-CIO.

McClellan's announcement said a staff search showed Reuther had made two purchases totaling \$129 through Shefferman. He said it also showed 13 purchases by William F. Schmitzer, secretary-treasurer of the AFL-CIO, totaling about \$1,600; four purchases by the late Matthew Woll, an AFL-CIO vice president, totaling \$2,300; and two purchases totaling \$224 by Herman Winter, former president of the Bakery Workers Union. He said most of the purchases represented "household goods" that Shefferman could buy at a discount.

"There is nothing significant about it," the senator said, "in view of there being nothing in our file at present to indicate these purchases were paid out of the funds of any union."

Dulles Says Decisions On Suez Canal Pending

Quemoy and Matsu out of Red China's hands.

It is not true the United States canceled its offer to help Egypt build the Aswan Dam in order to force a showdown with the Soviet Union in the Middle East. The action was taken, for a number of reasons, Dulles said, the first being that the House Appropriations Committee had forbidden use of foreign aid funds for the dam.

The Dulles biography by John Robinson Beal of Time magazine asserted the Aswan Dam cancellation was a "major gambit" by Dulles in the cold war with Russia.

The United States has no intention of trying to shoot its way through the Suez Canal or of boycotting the waterway.

Dulles said the United States has no pressures, such as boycotts, to bring on Egyptian President Nasser.

He said the American government still entertains hopes, at least, that the situation will be worked out with respect to the operation of the Suez.

Budget Cutting Drive Slows To Snails Pace

By WILLIAM F. ARBOGAST WASHINGTON — A budget-cutting drive that started with racehorse speed a week ago moved at a snail's pace into its sixth day in the house Tuesday.

There were no indications when, if ever, it would resume the momentum that cut \$16,800,000 in three days from committee-recommended 1958 appropriations for the Labor and Welfare departments.

Appropriations Committee members handling the bill appeared in no hurry to speed the measure along. Their hopes were that adverse reaction to last week's cuts might build up to the point that the House would reverse itself later in the week on final rollcall votes.

Protests from individuals and groups interested in project affected by last week's amendments reportedly were increasing in volume.

The House spent four hours Monday debating the \$2,800,000,000 measure. At the end of the day it had covered six lines of the 43-page bill without making a single change. It beat proposals to cut \$13,550,000 from federal payments to school districts and to change the formula under which the payments are made. Districts affected are those whose pupil census has been swollen by operations of the federal government.

Last Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the house adopted 12 amendments cutting \$15,473,100 from Labor Department funds and \$13,277,000 from Welfare Department allotments. Two others were defeated. Announced goal of the budget-cutters was to trim from 75 to 100 million dollars from the bill in addition to the 118 millions pared by the appropriations committee.

Makarios Rejects Turkish Minority

MAHE, Seychelle Islands — Archbishop Makarios Tuesday rejected participation of Cyprus Turkish minority in negotiations on the future of the Mediterranean island.

The Greek Orthodox archbishop said in an interview he is ready to have rights of the island's Turkish population "internationally safeguarded," but insisted that talks can be held only between him and Britain.

Makarios has already refused to enter negotiations with the British on the future of Cyprus because their order freeing him from imprisonment specified he could not return to his home island. The British have given no indication of relaxing that ban.

Makarios was deported from Cyprus a year ago after Britain accused him of leading the campaign of violence to end British rule and unite the island with Greece.

Cyprus' Turkish minority, about one-fifth of the island's population, firmly opposes any move that might make the island a political part of Greece.

force would have to give in or face a "little lesson in discipline."

Fear was expressed that the quarrel might lead to shooting unless a compromise is reached, but Aramburu was said to be confident that his support in the army and navy would force the air force dissidents to toe the line.

Navy vessels were reported moving toward Buenos Aires in a pointed show of support for the government.

Highly placed quarters said Aramburu was considering taking "police measures" against the air force factions if they persist in their objections to his plan to postpone national elections. Aramburu announced Saturday he was delaying the voting from sometime this fall to Feb. 23, 1958.

Democrats Take All Positions

DETROIT — Michigan Democrats and their leader, Gov. G. Mennen Williams, surged to new heights in state political power with a sweep of all 10 offices at stake in Monday's spring election.

The big plums in a record turnout of voters were the offices of state highway commissioner and state superintendent of public instruction.

Their capture gave Democrats the last two Republican-held elective posts in the state government's executive branch. It marked the first time they controlled all eight since the setup was originated in 1921.

Boy's Mutilated Body Is Found On Country Road

OMAHA — The mutilated body of a teen-ager clad in a T-shirt and blue jeans was dumped on a country road near Omaha early Wednesday. One hand had been severed by burns.

Douglas County Chief Deputy Sheriff Jack Knudson said the youth may have been the victim of a teen-age revenge killing or he may have been electrocuted.

A physician reported the youth, Donald Marfisi, 17, of Omaha had died of physical—not electrical—shock.

Officers first reported they were considering the possibility that the youth had been climbing a power pole and had become entangled with "hot" wires.

There was a burn under the arm pit. The feet were also charred. But the shoes, which were still on the body, were less badly burned.

Detective Inspector Ernest Brown said Marfisi had been questioned in connection with Omaha burglaries. The youth had only a minor police record, however.

Book On Dulles Draws Demands For Explanation

WASHINGTON — Two Senate Democrats demanded today that Secretary of State Dulles explain whether he canceled Aswan Dam financing plans in a deliberate move toward an economic aid showdown with Russia in the Middle East.

Dulles also faces questioning at a news conference today on that and other matters covered in a new biography of Dulles which the State Department describes as not official.

Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.) backed up a proposal by Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) that Dulles be called before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee for fresh questioning about the decision.

Dulles announced last July 19 the withdrawal of an American offer to aid Egypt in building the proposed dam on the Nile River. A week later, Egypt nationalized the Suez Canal.

Sparkman said in an interview he also wants to know more about a secret letter reportedly written by President Eisenhower to Chiang Kai-Shek in 1953. The Dulles biography described it as "satisfying" the Nationalist China leader that the United States would help defend Quemoy and Matsu, the island approaches to Formosa.

"We were repeatedly told there were no secret agreements of this kind in these negotiations," Sparkman said.

The new book titled "John Foster Dulles: A Biography," was written by John Robinson (Jack) Beal, Time Magazine's diplomatic reporter.

The State Department disclaimed any official connection with the book, which was based partly on private interviews with the secretary.

SALEM — The House Judiciary Committee rejected Monday a bill that would have broadened the state's anti-gambling laws to include many forms of individual and home amusements.

Among amusements it would have outlawed were wheels of chance, pushcards, "and any banking or percentage game played with cards, dice or counters."

Opponents said it would have barred bridge, pinocle and similar games in the home.

Patterson might cause them to vote for a lieutenant governor. Corbett said "it would be an important function of a lieutenant governor to cast the deciding vote."

Rep. Richard E. Groener (D.), Milwaukie, introduced a bill to permit counties to provide medical, life and accident insurance for their employees.

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D), Milwaukie, let loose a blast against the tax plan suggested Monday by Speaker Pat Dooley, also a Democrat.

Sweetland, chairman of the Senate Education Committee and a member of the Senate Taxation Committee, called the Dooley plan "regressive."

It would increase income taxes on those earning between \$4,000 and \$10,000 a year, and reduce them for persons earning more than that.

"Fortunately speaker Pat Dooley is not on any tax committee," Sweetland said, "and his regressive tax notions are strictly his own. Oregon needs properly tax relief for farms and homes, and tax reductions for low-income taxpayers."

"My proposals of last month are far more equitable and are in line with sound democratic principles of taxation on the basis of ability to pay."

Norman Gould Named Ranger

Norman Gould is the new ranger of the North Umpqua District of the Umpqua National Forest.

He replaces Jack Rothacher, who has been transferred to the H. J. Andrews Experimental Forest at Blue River, where he will head projects in water management. Rothacher had been district ranger at Steamboat headquarters for 15 years.

Gould came from the McKenzie Bridge District of the Willamette National Forest, where he was general assistant to the district ranger. He had been there two years. He is married and has a daughter, aged 8 months.

Rothacher's assignment is with the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, of which the experimental forest is a part.

Myrtle Creek Woman Succumbs In Hospital

Ruth Annie Critchfield, 88, Myrtle Creek, died Monday in a Roseburg hospital. She was born Nov. 12, 1868, in Waitsburg, Wash., and came to Oregon 34 years ago, making her home in Douglas County for the past 13 years.

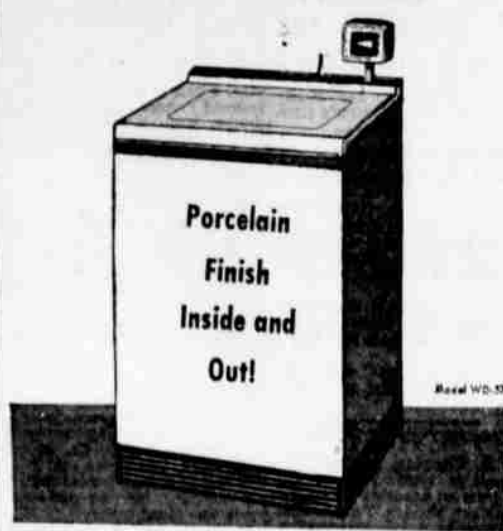
