The school was one of the first in the county to be rated standard, he added.

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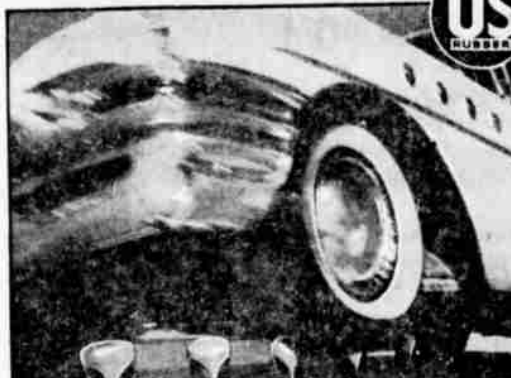
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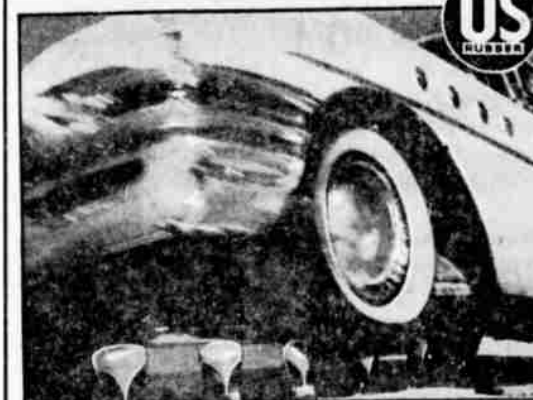

Education In Mental Health Topic Of Talk

The emphasis of education in the mental health of school children was stressed Thursday evening in a talk at Dr. Philip Carman before the Douglas County Schoolmasters Assn.

Dr. Carman, a psychologist at the Veterans' Hospital in Roseburg, said that teachers must understand the child and how he learns.

"All mental illness is due to intense feelings of hate, guilt, or fear," Dr. Carman stated. He added that treatment calls for more love, communication and understanding.

The schoolmasters met at a dinner meeting at which President Bert W. Kleiner presided.

Committee Rejects Junior College 'Pilot' Program

SALEM — THE House Education Committee Tuesday turned back an attempt by three Democratic members to put the committee on record favoring financing of a proposed junior college "pilot" program from the basic school support fund.

The committee last week voted to recommend that cost of the program, which would be administered by the Board of Education, be taken from the state general fund.

Reps. Keith Skelton, Eugene John Kerbow, Klamath Falls, failed to get the six other committee members to change their minds.

Rep. John Mosser (R), Portland, warned the committee that basic school support for elementary and secondary educational needs would be "diluted" by including higher education.

Kerbow replied he couldn't see enough money unless it came from basic support.

The committee amended the bill to provide for an appropriation of \$90,000 to help finance the program for the next biennium. It originally had suggested \$50,000, but committee members predicted four or five junior colleges might be in operation by 1959.

If the bill wins committee approval and passes the House, it will go to the Ways and Means Committee, eight of whose 16 members are co-sponsors.

The Bend school district now operates the only school in Oregon with the equivalent of 13th and 14th grades. Coos Bay, however, reportedly is ready to begin a two-year community college. Other districts have considered the plan but lacked funds.

The committee announced it would act on the bill at its Thursday meeting.

Whiz Kid Close To Top TV Prize

NEW YORK — A 10-year-old scientific whiz kid from the Bronx moved closer last night to being the biggest money-winner of any contestant on a single television quiz show.

Robert Strom won \$128,000 on CBS' The \$64,000 Question. By so doing, he made himself eligible to reach the triple — \$64,000 "plateau" of \$192,000 by answering two additional questions and ultimately go on for a maximum prize of \$256,000.

Charles Van Doren, marathon contestant on NBC's "21," made \$129,000 and holds the present record by a \$1,000 edge.

Young Strom last night named the discoverers of two laws governing the behavior of gases — Robert Boyle of England and Blaise Pascal of France — for question 1.

For question 2 he described the spectral characteristics of what the astronomers call "A," "G," and "M" stars.

For question 3, he went through involved mathematics to calculate the "impedance" in an electric circuit. Impedance is the total opposition to the flow of an alternating current.

Roseburg Woman Loses Finger In Mill Mishap

A Roseburg woman who cut her finger while working at Roseburg Lumber Co., was admitted to Douglas Community Hospital Monday.

A hospital spokesman stated that it was necessary to amputate the index finger of the left hand of Mrs. Charlie Eldersberger, 26, Roseburg, following an accident.

The spokesman added that a 13-year-old boy was admitted to the hospital with injuries resulting from a fall from his bicycle. The youth was identified as Lyle Brittain, Roseburg.

Bennett Indicated Tues. On Bribe-Giving Charge

PORTLAND — Clifford O. Bennett, Portland gambler named at a Senate subcommittee hearing last month as giving a \$500 bribe to Mayor Terry Schrunk when Schrunk was sheriff, was indicted Tuesday on the bribe-giving charge.

Earlier the county grand jury investigating allegations of vice and corruption here, had indicted Schrunk on a charge of taking the bribe and of lying when he said he hadn't. The grand jury also had indicted Bennett previously on a charge of perjury for saying he hadn't given a bribe to Schrunk.

Injured Roseburg Youth Transferred To Eugene

CORVALLIS — A 20-year-old Roseburg youth who was injured in the crash landing of a private plane March 28, was transferred Monday to a Eugene hospital.

Doctors said Jerry Long, a student at Oregon State College, was "coming along fine." The plane's pilot, Willis Allen Wood, 21, Salem, was released earlier from the hospital.

Sanford Lerner Fatally Shot

CHICAGO — A North Side department store owner, who reportedly had refused a telephone caller's demand for money three months ago and who maintained a bodyguard, was fatally shot in the vestibule of his home early Wednesday.

Sanford Lerner, 46, was shot four times as he entered the three-story apartment house. Police said he staggered to his second-floor apartment and collapsed on the floor after telling his wife, Lillian, 47, "I'm shot."

Mrs. Lerner, told police her husband had been beaten severely in front of their home about five years ago. She also said on Jan. 2 he received a threatening telephone call, demanding money, which he refused to pay.

Mrs. Lerner also told police her husband had a bodyguard at his store but recently had relaxed his protection. She did not say whether the bodyguard had been released.

Although the Central Douglas United Fund did not achieve its goal of slightly over \$72,000, the annual meeting at the Hotel Umpqua Tuesday night was acclaimed as a victory celebration.

Verbal plaudits came from retiring president Lewis J. Fullerton; Executive Director Don O'Neill and Reginald Vincent, assistant executive director of the Oregon Chest.

As of March 30, the annual report showed \$57,747.96 had been raised. All returns are not yet in. Vincent pointed out that only one
