The story of "Family Portrait," to be presented at the Roseburg Presbyterian Church Sunday, is told in its title.

It is the portrait of an everyday family whose problem is that one of their loved ones is set apart by ideas they cannot understand. It parallels the probable feeling of his brothers and relatives to Jesus.

It is based on the theme that a prophet is without honor in his own country. It gives an appealing portrait of the mother who loved and cherished a son whose birthright was distinction and revelation, yet was cruelly misunderstood.

It shows how brothers reacted when they saw their elder and most efficient partner in the carpenter shop leave the work to begin a career of teaching they could not understand nor respect. It begins in Nazareth, moves to Capernaum and finally to Jerusalem.

The play will be presented in Roseburg by the Bishop's Company, a group of 12 Hollywood actors who believe the return of great drama to the churches of America is long overdue.

The play is directed by James Wheaton and adapted to chancel staging by Phyllis Beardsley, founder of the company.
