UNMERITED CRITICISM

Since the slump began in the lumber industry a number of communications have come to the editorial desk expressing criticism because of an alleged lack of promotion of new industry.

Nearly all such letters have been unsigned. A few have had signatures but no mailing address was included and there was reason to suspect the signatures as being fictitious. We have had two or three letters apparently written in good faith and properly signed. However, they indicate such an utter lack of understanding that we did not care to expose the writers to ridicule.

There seems to be a belief on the part of some people that all that is required to attract new industry is to wave a magic wand and industry will appear.

One writer provides us with a sure fire formula:

1. Define the problem.
2. Gather all available data.
3. Analyze the problem and data.
4. Decide on a course of action.
5. Go ahead with action program.
6. Review results and revise methods where necessary.

If industry could be procured as easily as that we would be in a wonderful position.

Letter Requirements

Most of the writers have criticized, and even abused, the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce, these writers declare, should be doing something about diversifying industry.

How many of these critics, do you suppose, are members of the Chamber of Commerce? How many are helping the Chamber of Commerce with money, work and ideas? How many actually have inquired what the Chamber of Commerce is doing?

The Chamber of Commerce at all times should be a target for criticism, I believe. But before a person has the right to criticize, in my opinion, he should be active in the work of the Chamber of Commerce, should be co-operating as a paying member, and should be familiar with the program. If he, as a working, paying member, disagrees with the program then he has a right and a duty to carry criticism first to the board of directors and next to the public. Seldom, however, does a letter critical of the Chamber of Commerce come from a writer who is participating in the work.

It was mentioned earlier that some of the letters received were anonymous. I want to make it clear that we do not publish unsigned letters. In fact, we take little note of them. We withhold names from publication only in rare cases. If people want to speak out on local topics, it is our belief they should identify themselves. We also are requiring that writers give their mailing addresses so we can contact them if necessary. We ask that telephone numbers be given, although the numbers will not be published. The telephone listing, however, makes it possible for us to contact the writer quickly if some editing change is deemed necessary.

Industry Problems

We mention the anonymous letters received on this industrial problem only because there is much thinking on this subject. Most people in this area, I believe, are conscious of the need for industrial diversification. Recognizing a problem and solving it, however, are two different things.

For example, we have many men in this area engaged in woods work. Those men are thrown into idleness every winter because of bad weather. Does anyone know of any activity, other than fuel delivery, which uses more employees in winter than in summer? If some such industry could be devised, then we might have some chance of overcoming this seasonal aspect of woods work. Simply attracting new industry, which uses the same labor force throughout the year, will not solve seasonal unemployment for the woods worker.

Our Roseburg Chamber of Commerce has a strong and active industrial committee. It is constantly studying the problem of attracting new industry. It is composed of some of the top business and industrial brains in the community. The committee, I am sure, would welcome any ideas and any help for the promotion of new industry.

I know that virtually every person in the county is interested in enlarging our industrial capacity, attracting new industry and creating diversification. But in our anxiety to achieve improvement let's not be critical of what is being done until we have a thorough understanding of the problems involved and have given some help toward solution.

TODAYS TEXT

Psalm 42: 10, 11

"As with a deadly wound in my body, my adversaries taunt me, while they say to me continually, 'Where is thy God?' Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my help and my God."

Who can estimate how many people have recognized themselves as they have read the 42nd psalm? It has given expression to the anguish and struggle, hopes and longings of the innermost being of countless numbers through the years.

The psalmist says that when his enemies taunt him with the question, "Where is your God now?" it hurts, just as though they were injuring his body with blows. They have found a tender spot, and why? Was it not because his own troubled heart had asked the same question, "Where is my God now?" He was right in the middle of the battle of faith to cling confidently to God, even though God did not seem near at the time. And that was the struggle which caused his pain and anxiety.

There are many in our day who are in the same predicament. Often the question is asked, "Where is God to be found?" Some ask it sincerely and hopefully, others ask it sorrowfully and fearfully. It isn't always easy to know where God is in the complex lossiness of this world.

When anxiety grips the hearts of men they are prone to look around, seeking after something that can allay their disquietude. And so they throw themselves into activity, seeking to fill the inner void. But peace doesn't come that way.

The way to peace doesn't lead out but in. One can't rush himself into peace, but God gives peace to him who waits for the Lord. When anxiety threatens to get us, we ought to be like the psalmist, and again praise him, my help and my God. "Like the psalmist, search inwardly, with the knowledge that God is to be found in the inner depths, even when he is not to be found in the outward manifestations."

Engineer Sees Artificial Earth Satellites As Very Valuable For Weather Use

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chief engineer on Project Vanguard said Thursday thousands of lives and billions of dollars might be saved annually by using artificial earth satellites to improve weather prediction.

N. Elliott Felt Jr. said instruments in relatively small satellites could "detect cloud formations, areas of precipitation, water vapor content in the atmosphere and surface radiation . . . and even make a reasonably accurate estimate of surface temperature."

Felt has overall charge of the design and construction of the three-stage rocket which the Martin Co. of Baltimore is building to launch the earth satellite sometime next year. He foresees such uses for artificial satellites in a talk before a space sociology seminar of the American Rocket Society's spring convention.

"While it is possible that we could put men in space in less than 10 years, it is not likely to occur unless we are able to create a demand by a large number of people for such an undertaking," Felt said.

But he said unmanned satellites "are already within reach" and

although these instrumented satellites won't solve all of the weatherman's problems, he said, new patterns will take shape.

"Starting with short-range predictions of general trends," he said, "meteorologists undoubtedly will be able to sharpen their focus and develop more accurate forecasts for specific areas and to extend their predictions farther into the future."

At present, weather forecasters are hampered by the fact that their weather observations come from less than one-twentieth of the earth's surface while satellites whirling about the earth from pole to pole could take measurements over the entire land and sea area of the earth, he said.

He noted extensive losses in lives and property resulting from hurricanes, drought, snowstorms and other pranks of nature and said fuel producers, clothing manufacturers, farmers and resort owners all would benefit positively from better and longer range weather forecasting.

When will people begin to vote against heavy government spending?

I'll try to answer it:

People will begin to vote against excessive government spending whenever they begin to realize that the money taken out of their pockets by excessive taxation would have brought them MORE in the way of comforts and satisfactions. IF THE MONEY HAD BEEN LEFT IN THEIR POCKETS FOR THEM TO SPEND.

Look at it like this:

The federal budget for the next fiscal year totals just under 72 billion dollars. Let's assume that there are about 120 million people in the United States.

If you will get out a pencil and some paper and divide 72 billion dollars by 120 million people you will discover that the per capita share of next year's federal taxes (assuming that the budget remains in the neighborhood of 72 billion dollars) will be about \$450.

That is to say:

If you have no dependents, your per capita share of the cost of running the U.S. government during the next fiscal year will be about \$450. If you are the breadwinner for a family of four, your share will be about \$1800.

At this point, of course, you will say that you are just a LITTLE person — that it's the BIG people, the wicked corporations and such, that have to pay the bulk of taxes.

You may even go so far as to say that when government takes money IN GOBS away from the big guys and spends it for all the things the government spends money for — all the way down to helping to buy lunches for the school children — it's doing YOU a favor. It's taking money away from the filthy rich and giving some of it to you.

If I were you, I wouldn't be too sure of that.

Here's what happens:

Taxes are a part of the cost of doing business, and so have to be added onto the price of EVERYTHING THAT IS SOLD. It has to be that way. Otherwise, everybody would go broke.

So— Every time you buy anything, you pay a part of the cost of taxes. What it boils down to is that if government took less out of our pockets in the form of taxes we'd all have MORE LEFT to spend.

NEW YORK (AP) — You've heard a lot about private eyes. But Ed Haupt probably has America's swiftest public eyes. A sort of prose detective and big name hunter, he is perhaps the nation's fastest reader.

"I can scan up to 20,000 words a minute," admitted Haupt, who glances through the pages of scores of publications daily for the Luce Clipping Bureau.

After 20 years in the business, Haupt, a mild-mannered, slow-talking family man who lives in Yonkers, is the acknowledged kingpin. Most of the 400 professional newspaper readers who work for the 30 U.S. press clipping services are women.

They regard Haupt with something akin to awe. Few can read at even half the pace set by his busy bee eyes.

As he reads Haupt, who has a file drawer mind, marks any mention of the names of some 8,000 people, products and companies. The list of clients, of course, has daily changes.

The idea seems general that only a vain lead people to subscribe to a clipping service," he said. "Actually, most of the subscribers are hard-hearted business men looking for information."

The clipping service, of course, gets many old requests. One client subscribed because he wanted to make a check to see if his name wasn't appearing in the newspapers.

Heart Specialist Gives New Views On Activities

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adolescents with known organic heart disease have too often been unduly restricted in their physical activities, a heart disease specialist reports.

Although stressing that some cases do require considerable restriction, Dr. Walter T. Goodale of Harvard Medical School said the rest need not be restricted beyond their "own natural limitations."

He told the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) at its spring meeting Tuesday that over-restriction where it is not required can cause patients to become nervous — an element "which will plague them in adult life unless corrected."

"Heart strain from physical exercise," he said, "is probably a misconception in this age group (12 to 21) since the body usually refuses to be pushed beyond the limits of cardiac (heart) reserve."

The only possible exceptions are cases where there is a severe blocking or narrowing of the pul-

monary vascular disease or primary myocardial (heart muscle) disease," Goodale said.

In such cases, he said, unconsciousness and even sudden death

Development Of Dam At John Day Is Urged

LONGVIEW, Wash. (AP) — The Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference voted Friday to petition Congress for early federal development of John Day lock and dam on the Columbia River.

The conference, a group of private and public officials, noted that funds for John Day construction have been removed from the federal budget and urged that eight million dollars be earmarked in the 1958 budget for first year construction.

The group approved a letter to be sent to congressional budget hearings urging addition of 15 million dollars to the present allocations for hydroelectric projects in the Northwest.

Burgess Claims Politics Issue In Budget Slash

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Treasury's No. 2 man said today the budget can be cut, but "the great problem is to distinguish between political pressures and genuine essentials."

W. Randolph Burgess, undersecretary of the Treasury, said the choice becomes necessary to budget-cutting because "we can't really cut the budget without cutting some government services."

He did not say where he thought reductions could or should be made.

But he added in a speech prepared for 1,500 delegates to the fifth annual Republican Women's National Conference:

"The 1958 budget can be cut enough, and the 1959 budget kept under control, so as to justify a sizable tax cut next year."

To achieve that, he said, "will take the vigorous and informed cooperation of all and doing a lot of things that are not popular."

Burgess said it is just as essential for "families and individuals to avoid overspending and over-borrowing as it is for the government."

"The wage policies of labor and business are an enormous influence," he added, "but government should lead the way."

with the FBI to see that the requests of clients behind the Iron Curtain are checked for security clearance.

Scanning at the rate of 20,000 words a minute (the average person doesn't read more than about 250), Haupt can get through the equivalent of a dozen or more long-winded novels in a single day.

He looks for key words, names or phrases, underlining them as he goes. The stories are clipped later by other workers.

The biggest occupational dangers for professional readers such as Haupt are daydreaming and getting too interested in a subject.

"You can't let that happen," he said. "But no matter how fast I skip over the pages, some of the information sticks in my mind. You get so you know a little bit about practically everything."

"The subject I like to read most about is track sports, because I used to do a little running myself. Unfortunately, there aren't many clients looking for track items."

Most professional men readers find it difficult to keep their mind on household articles; women readers often have the same difficulty in reading through the financial section.

"I have no trouble reading the women's pages," said Haupt. "I have a wife and teen-age daughter. I am interested in what they wear and what is cooked because I have to pay the bills and eat the food."

His terrific reading has had no effect on his eyes. He still wears the same lenses in his glasses he did 10 years ago.

His hobby?

"I like to read the newspaper go home from work," Haupt said, "not leisurely."
