

Indians Stop Douglas In Finlay Track Meet

Roseburg scored heavily in the shorter race and hurdle events Friday afternoon on a damp track at Finlay Field to win its first track meet of the season, a 74-48 decision over Douglas.

The Indians accounted for 10 first places to Douglas' four. Roseburg took all five points in the 880-yard relay while the Trojans took all nine points with a three-man sweep of the discus event.

Double event winners were common, but the day's outstanding performance was turned in by Roseburg's Marvin Fray who took three individual first places and ran a leg on the first place relay team.

A performance which cannot be much improved upon.

Fray took the high hurdles in 17.2, the low hurdles in 23.0 and the broad jump with a leap of 20-6 1/2. Tom Barrong, who also ran on the winning relay team, took first in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, while Fred Skeels ran on the relay team and took first in the high jump with a leap of 5-7.

Douglas' double winner was hard-running Cliff Thomson who negotiated the mile and 880-yard distances in the slow going without being pressed.

The Trojans' other two firsts came in the discus and pole vault.

Days Creek, getting first-place performances with regularity from its strong and veteran team, outscored Roseburg's Jayvee team 66-55 Friday afternoon over the wet Finlay Field cinders as part of the Roseburg-Douglas varsity meet.

The winners snare 10 first places in the 11-event meet and shared a third of another first place.

Junior George Williams led the Wolves point-making with first in all three weight events. Bob Lowry added firsts in the 100-yard dash and the low hurdles and Red McKenzie took the high jump and tied with two Roseburg boys in the pole vault for first. Lowry and Richardson also ran on the winning relay event which decided the outcome of the meet.

Roseburg came off with three clear-cut firsts, two by freshman Jerry Humphries in the 220-yard dash and the broad jump, and one by freshman Bill Sherwood in the 440-yard dash. Two Roseburg pole vaulters tied with McKenzie for that blue ribbon at a height of nine feet.

Both teams placed in every event but the 880-yard relay in what turned out to be a close meet all the way.

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — Powerful Idaho State College, with the team title already under its belt, sends eight men into the finals Saturday night in the National Collegiate Boxing Championships.

One — 165-pound Roger Rouse — is a defending champion. Rouse also is a member of the 1956 U.S. Olympic team.

The other defending titlist entered in the 80th annual championships — 132-pound Dick Rall of Washington State — also is in the finals, after outpointing Harvard Lanoue of Michigan State Friday night in the semifinals.

Five of the six ISC fighters in Friday night's semifinal bouts won decisions. Two others qualified in semifinal bouts during the first night of the championships Thursday. And 112-pound Bobby McCollum drew a bye into the finals, as did his opponent Eduardo Labastida, Los Mochis, Sonora, Mexico, a California Poly student.

ISC had 24 points after the semi-finals. Even if all its entrants lose Saturday night, San Jose (Calif.) State can not overtake the small Pocatello school, which became a four-year college only 10 years ago.

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Masters Pace Set By Snead; Hogan Out

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Sam Snead is the "man to beat" today as the 21st Masters Golf Tournament swings into the third round.

Sam's two long-time nemesis, Dr. Cary Middlecott and Ben Hogan were surprisingly eliminated yesterday in the "top forty" cut-off.

"If I play super and nobody else goes crazy I figure I got a good chance," Snead said after shooting a four-under-par 68 which at 140 gave him a two-stroke half-way lead toward his fourth Masters crown.

Demaret Cards 142

Two strokes back at 142 came another three-time winner, Jimmy Demaret, followed by defending champion Jack Burke Jr., still a threat to repeat at 143; Ed Furgol and National Amateur champion Harvie Ward Jr., tied at 144; Australia's Peter Thomson and Doug Ford, sharing 145, and a cluster of five pros, including Scotland's old-timer Byron Nelson and England's Henry Cotton, at 146. The others at 146 are Canada's Al Balding, Arnold Palmer and Jay Hebert.

Most experts figure for a two-man battle between Snead and Demaret.

"I feel great," said Demaret. "I am more eager than I've ever been."

Demaret shot a sub-par 70 yesterday with a fantastic putting exhibition ironically punctuated when he three-putted the 18th green from 18 feet.

Snead played spottily and spectacularly. He took a double-bogey five on the short third hole and got the strokes back with an eagle three on the par five 15th.

Hogan and Middlecott ran into putting miseries which caused them to be eliminated from the "40 and ties" list qualifying for the last two rounds under a new rule. Hogan shot a 75 for 151. Middlecott scrambled to a 73 for 152. The cutoff point was 150.

Anthony Kayoes Spieser In 3rd

DETROIT (AP) — Young Tony Anthony found punching power that surprised everyone — including himself — and used it quickly and effectively last night to smash his way into a light heavyweight title fight with Archie Moore.

"Man, I didn't know I could hit a fellow that hard," said the 22-year-old New Yorker after his dramatic third round knockout of Chuck Spieser, the top-ranked challenger to Moore's title.

The third-ranked Anthony will meet Moore June 7 in Detroit in a 15-round title match.

A 12-3 underdog, despite 22 previous knockouts, Anthony was masterful in victory. He outboxed the home town favorite in the first round with sharp jabs. Anthony never let his foe get set for the punishing in-fighting for which he is noted.

Spieser Dumped

Cracking Spieser's defense in the second, Anthony decked his opponent late in the round with a hard right to the cheek and two left hooks. The bell saved Spieser. Staggered early in the third round, Spieser rallied momentarily but Anthony floored Spieser for keeps at the 2:12 mark with a straight right and a left hook.

The 27-year-old Spieser, who was Anthony's teammate on the 1953 Olympic boxing team, knaid he picked up the count at right but lacked the strength to get to his feet.

It capped a tremendous comeback for Anthony, who less than two years ago was considered washed up when he was knocked out by middleweights Bobby Boyd and Willie Trow.

"I just grew up," said Anthony, who weighed 173 to Spieser's 174 1/2.

Fish Movements In Umpqua River Highest Recorded

Fish migration in the North Umpqua River during the last two weeks of March set new records in all departments.

The semi-monthly report from the regional office of the Oregon State Game Commission at Roseburg shows movement of winter steelheads, adult and jack chinook salmon to have made new marks for the period with but one exception.

Steelhead migration during the last two weeks of March tallied 1,739, a figure surpassed only in 1948. The season total of 7,582 is near the top but has been exceeded slightly in three past years.

Adult spring chinook salmon, are far out in front of all previous counts, with 271 fish for the past two weeks and 364 for the season. Chinooks, jacks, heretofore unlisted in March, have been tallied at 37 for the two-week period and 33 for the season to date.
