Mrs. Herbert Rose, who is completing her stenographic course at the Roseburg School of Business, is now working in a part-time capacity in the office at Western Auto.

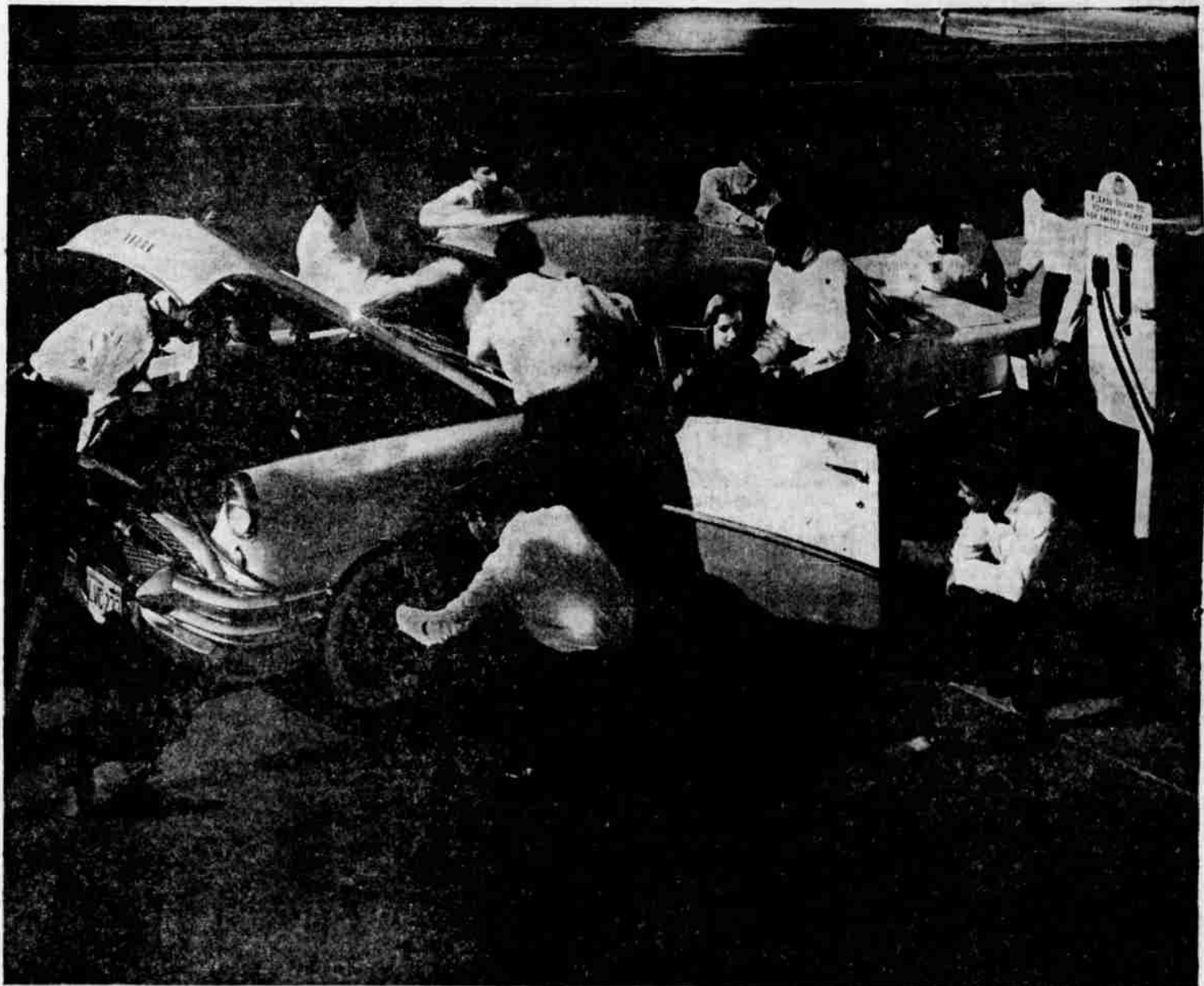

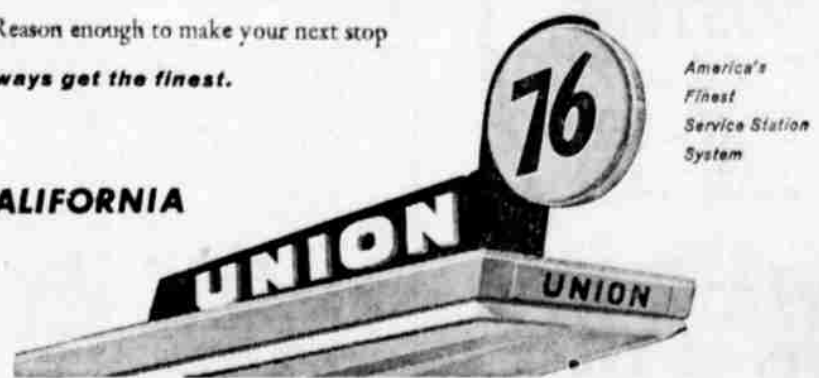
