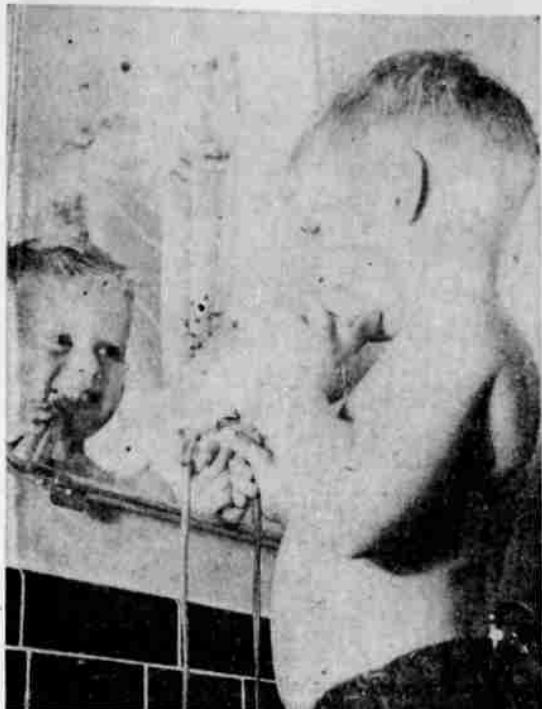


Wins National Award
