

Ford Victor In Masters; Snead Trails

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 7.—Doug Ford learned to swing on a baseball diamond, cultivated a putting touch on a billiard table and turned fighter to become the new Masters Champion and currently golf's most successful money collector.

"I didn't think I was aggressive enough, so I changed my grip this year with the idea of getting closer to the pin," the 34-year-old touring pro from Mahopac, N.Y., said today, fingering the \$3,750 first prize check of the Masters.

The windfall raised Ford's golf winnings of the year to \$25,654, well ahead of his competition.

Ford's daredevil gambling instinct and his new-found aggressiveness carried him to the greatest finishing round in the Masters history—a 6-under-par 66—which left favorites gaping.

Snead Defeated

Doug's total of 283 for four rounds over Augusta National's exacting course was three shots better than that of Sam Snead, the front runner for two days. Jimmy Demaret followed at 287 and Harvie Ward Jr., the brilliant national amateur champion, was another stroke back at 288.

Demaret called one hole—the 11th—a "coward's hole," and Snead, Ward and defending champion Jack Burke Jr., who shot 291, all admitted that Augusta National wasn't a course which could be attacked. It had to be "habited."

The round-faced, bull-shouldered Ford proved all these theories false as he came from three strokes back in the final round to score a spectacular triumph.

Birdie Wins Match

Ford blasted out of a trap and into the cup to nail a birdie 3 on the final hole but he said later the tournament was won for him on the 520-yard, par-five 15th.

"My caddy told me I should play it safe but I told him, 'This is the ball game,'" Doug said afterwards. "So I took a spoon and flew it over the pond 40 feet from the flag. I got down in 2 for a birdie 4 and I felt I had it."

Demaret shot a final 70, Snead a 72 and Ward a 73. Australia's Peter Thomson took a 71 for 289 and lame-armed Ed Furgol a 74 for 290. Don Finckelwald and Arnold Palmer had 291.

Dupas Bid Tops Boxing Picture

Ralph Dupas makes his bid for welterweight honors as a slight underdog to hard-hitting Vince Martinez of Paterson, N.J., in an outdoor 10-round bout at New Orleans' Pelican Stadium Monday night.

Dupas, a 21-year-old New Orleans speed merchant, has been a ranking lightweight since his teenage days. In making his bow in the 147-pound division, the clever boxer has picked on a tough opponent. Martinez, 27, a fifth ranking contender, has flattened 28 of his 58 foes.

Is he a fighter or is he a freak? South Africa's Ewart Poigeter, 7-2, 335-pounder, will try and answer the question Tuesday night when he faces strapping Johnny Holman, 29, 6-2, 200-pounder from Chicago at Portland, Ore. Holman was a member of the heavyweight division's top 10 until recently and he can punch. If Johnny is in good shape, he shouldn't have much difficulty in chopping down the 24-year-old giant.

Featherweight Davey Moore, Springfield, Ohio, gets his big chance in a sub role for Elio Martinez in the Wednesday night radio-television feature at Miami's Biscayne Arena. Moore, a member of the fabulous 1932 Olympic boxing team, takes on Gil Cadillac, California contender, in the 10-round.

Ralph (Tiger) Jones, Yonkers, N.Y., and Chico Vejar, Stanford, Conn., a couple of aggressive, crowd-pleasing middleweights who have been featured on television almost as much as Lassie, collide in the Friday night radio-television headliner at the War Memorial Auditorium in Syracuse, N.Y. Vejar has swept six straight, but the stocky Tiger is the favorite.

Medford Shows Power

MEDFORD, Ore.—Medford established itself as a favorite to retain its Oregon high school track and field championship by winning the annual Rogue Valley relays here Saturday.

It registered 90 points, placing first in six events.

Grants Pass, which won the relays last year, were Marshallfield 47, Crater of Central Point 45, Klamath Falls 42 and Ashland 18.

Derby Farrell, the Cleveland Indians' rookie manager, was indeed caught in a cross-current today.

His club has won nine of its last 10 games including yesterday's 8-7 decision over the New York Giants in Dallas. His pitching staff has been coming around. And Rocky Colavito is shaping up fast.

Colavito already has hit seven homers this spring, three of them yesterday.

But the problem of finding a third baseman to replace the retired Al Rosen still is haunting Farrell.

He thought he had it about solved when he shifted Al Smith from the outfield to third base.

It turned out, though, that Smith wasn't happy there, not sure of himself.

Smith in Outfield

"So," sighed Farrell, "from now on he's the center fielder. I really don't know who is going to play third."

Manager Birdie Tebbetts of the Cincinnati Redlegs finds himself in his usual plight of trying to get yesterday the Redlegs beat the Washington Senators in Nashville on home runs by Don Hoak, Ed Bailey (2), Gus Bell and Frank Robinson. But starter Joe Nuxhall gave up five runs and eight hits before his mates found the fences.

Hard-luck Don Zimmer, the Brooklyn Dodgers' infielder and heir-apparent to Pee Wee Reese's shortstop job, who already has been benched twice, was hit on the leg by a batted ball while running the bases in the Brooks' 4-3 loss to the Milwaukee Braves at Fort Worth.

Braves Win Game

He'll be out at least a couple of days. The Braves won the ball game when Frank Torre singled home Bill Bruton in the ninth.

Elsewhere, the Detroit Tigers edged the Philadelphia Phillies at Lakeland 5-4; the New York Yankees turned back the Boston Red Sox at Sarasota 3-2; the Chicago Cubs topped the Baltimore Orioles at San Antonio 8-6; the Pittsburgh Pirates halted the Kansas City A's at Fort Myers 6-4, and the Chicago White Sox and St. Louis split a double-header. The Cardinals won the first 13-10, and the Pale Hose the nightcap called after four and a half innings, 2-0.

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Tigers Seen Major Competition To Yanks In AL

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankees, who spread-eagled the field by nine games last year, should win the American League pennant again in 1937, but not without a scare from the Detroit Tigers, most improved club in the junior circuit.

The race shapes up as a two-team struggle between the player-rich Yankees and the youthful Tigers, with Chicago and Cleveland battling for third and Boston's Red Sox leading the second division.

The Yankees are going into the race with the most important asset: The most good ball players. They also are the most versatile team, extremely confident after winning seven pennants in eight years.

The Yankees are a solid team with the possible exception of third base and left field, but habitually they come up with what it takes. Young hopefuls like Bobby Richardson and Tony Kubek could cement these loose ties.

This year they appear to have come up with tremendous pitching, with Johnny Kucks and Tom Sturdivant ready to challenge Whitey Ford for staff supremacy. Behind this trio there are Don

Larsen, Bob Turley, Art Ditmar, Bobby Shantz, Tommy Byrne, Bob Grim and rookies Ralph Terry and Al Cicotte. They would rank as a starting staff on other teams.

All that pitching and Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra too. Not to mention Hank Bauer, Gil McDougald, Billy Martin, Bill Skowron, et al.

The Tigers rate the No. 2 spot partially because of their strong finish in 1936. They were the best team in the league after mid-season, posting a 43-30 record as compared with 43-31 for the Yankees.

Detroit has more than mere won-loss statistics to back up its claim. There are three established pitchers in Frank Lary, Billy Hoelt and Paul Foytack, and three youngsters who have looked impressive this spring, Duke Maas, Jim Bunning and Don Lee.

Four regulars, Harvey Kuenn, Charlie Maxwell, Al Kaline and Ray Boone, hit over .300 last year and Maxwell, Kaline and Boone

pack the long-ball punch. They have added Eddie Robinson and Jim Finigan for bench strength.

The White Sox, because of their better speed, a more set lineup and a deeper bench, should edge the Indians for third place.

The Red Sox story is the same—they still have Ted Williams and are still looking for a shortstop. While Boston's biggest problem is the infield, the pitching, or lack of it, must rank next. Tom Brew-

er and Frank Sullivan are the only dependable starters.

The Baltimore Orioles must be respected for their potential pitching and defense, but for little else.

Washington appears a bit better off than last year. The addition of Ted Abernathy strengthens their mound staff.

Asked to name Kansas City's strongest point, Manager Lou Boudreau replied frankly: "Our fans." The team lacks speed, defense and pitching.

Basketball Dinner Scheduled Tonight

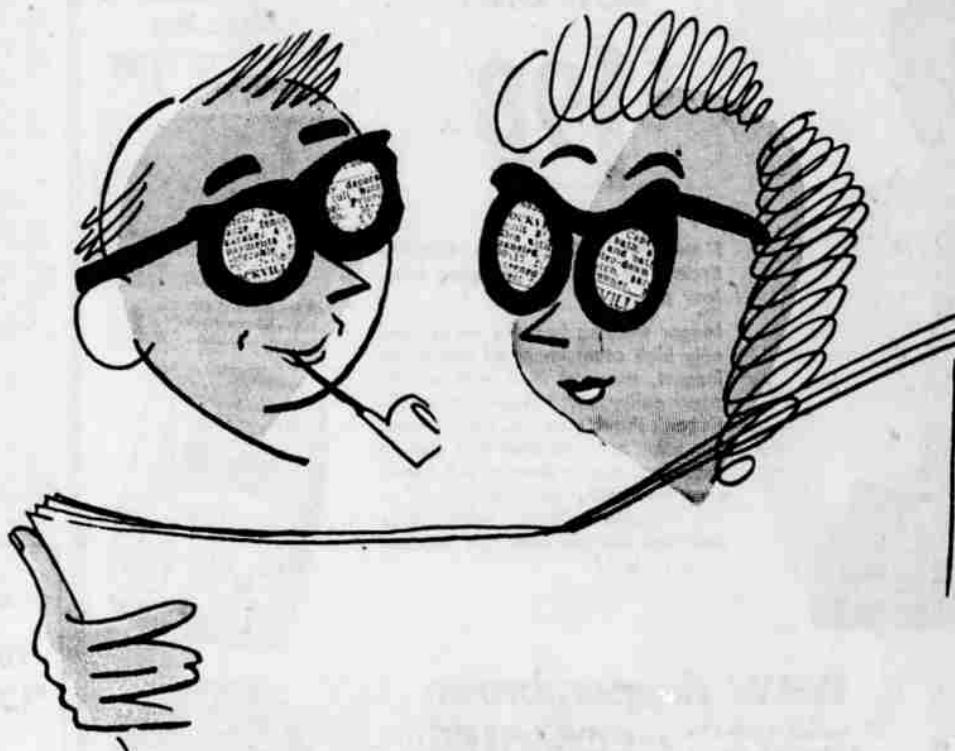
