

Queen Elizabeth Appears Tired After Hard Day

PARIS (AP)—Looking a bit tired from her strenuous arrival day, Queen Elizabeth II was driven through crowded streets Tuesday to pay her respects to the 2,000-year-old city of Paris.

In Saint French, broadcast throughout the nation, the 30-year-old British monarch told an applauding audience at the Hotel de Ville (the city hall). "Your capital is a home away from home toward which at each new generation, the United Kingdom has sent its elite, attracted by the radiance of your science, spirit, art and good taste."

Elizabeth was visibly moved when she was presented flowers by a small French boy and girl, chosen because they were born on the same day as her two children, Prince Charles and Princess Anne.

The National Assembly recessed for its members to watch the Queen's 25-car procession pass its home, the Palais Bourbon.

An excited, cheering throng had jammed the vast Place de l'Opera until the early hours Tuesday to see the Queen.

Union Leaders Plead Guilty

NEW YORK (AP)—Two former union leaders, ex-mobster George Scalise and Sol Clento, have pleaded guilty to union warfare racket conspiracy charges.

Each faces a possible maximum sentence of three years in prison.

The two men made a surprise switch in their pleas from innocent to guilty Monday as they were about to go on trial in General Sessions Court.

Chief Asst. Dist. Atty. Alfred J. Scotti said: "This is the first conviction involving racketeering in union warfare funds in this state."

Scotti added that it also was the first time since a new state law took effect in September, 1953, that a union official—Clento—was convicted of conspiring to receive a bribe.

The prosecutor said various principals in the racket netted \$229,000 in two years.

Strong Jet Stream Stalls Satellite Tests

WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUND, N.M. (AP)—A jet stream of nearly 150 miles an hour robbed Project Vanguard scientists of the opportunity of studying earth satellite instruments early Tuesday.

An Aerobee H rocket, aimed at testing both the instrumental heart of the long planned earth satellite and a single stage world altitude record, was kept on the ground by winds.

Weather sources reported that the wind, a jet stream above 35,000 feet, might have caused erratic impact far from the area where the rocket was to land.

Cmdr. Thomas Buell, Navy executive officer for the project, said that a rescheduling of the firing was being studied. He said the rocket may be fired late Tuesday or early Wednesday.

Fire Claims Second Victim At Ontario

ONTARIO, Ore. (AP)—A fire which swept through a small home here claimed its second victim Tuesday. Mrs. Irene Shelton, 39, died in Holy Rosary Hospital of injuries sustained in the blaze.

Her 6-year-old son, Perry, suffocated in his bed when the fire gutted the small frame home Monday.

An older son, Leonard, 10, escaped unharmed and notified the fire department. Another child, 15-month-old Fayrene, is in the hospital and described as in fair condition.

An attending physician said Mrs. Shelton suffered burns over 75 per cent of her body.

Two Large Tankers Enter Suez Canal

CAIRO (AP)—The two biggest tankers to use the Suez Canal since it was reopened last November entered the waterway at Port Said today—the first day the cleared channel was opened to ships of up to 20,000 tons.

One was the 19,618-ton Belgian tanker Elizabeth, the other the 20,776-ton Italian Fina Canada. They were bound for Middle East ports to pick up oil. Four other smaller ships were in the south-bound convoy.

The first passenger vessel to use the canal since the British-French-Israeli invasion was due at Port Said later today to being the 103-mile trip south to Suez. The ship is the 12,839-ton Italian liner Oceania, headed for Australia with 809 passengers.

Eilat, Israel (AP)—The American oil tanker Kern Hills left its southern port today after discharging the first cargo of oil ever brought to the Jewish nation through the disputed Gulf of Aqaba.

The Ministry of Development said in Jerusalem that three tankers are scheduled to arrive at Eilat during May.

The 10,441-ton Kern Hills brought 16,500 tons of oil from Iran, arriving Saturday after an uneventful voyage through the narrow Persian Straits. U. N. troops now occupy the shore positions from which Egyptian guns had kept out Eilat-bound shipping until Israel's invasion of Egypt last fall.

President Will Talk Aid Plans With Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower plans to discuss details of the administration's \$4,400,000,000 foreign aid program with congressional leaders of both parties after the Eastern recess.

This was announced at the White House Tuesday by Republican congressional chiefs after their regular weekly meeting with Eisenhower.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Senate GOP leader, noted that Secretary of State Dulles gave a special Senate committee a broad outline of the administration's foreign aid plans Monday.

The President, Knowland said, wants to meet with the leaders of both parties to provide greater detail. Knowland added that such a conference will be held after the lawmakers return from an Easter recess scheduled to start April 18.

Dulles' presentation got a generally favorable reception from the lawmakers, but Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) said he would oppose any new program that might lead to "a perpetuity of spending abroad."

Two Men Are Arrested For Killing In Holdup

WALLA WALLA (AP)—A Montana police officer said Monday night two men held without charge in Missoula "matched perfectly" the descriptions of two gunmen wanted for a killing and an assault in an attempted holdup near here Saturday night.

Pictures of the men were expected to arrive here Tuesday, the sheriff's office said.

A reward of \$1,000 was posted by the county commissioners Monday for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the gunmen who killed Charles Buckley, 66, Milton Freewater, Ore., and wounded Robert Follett, 65.

The shootings occurred in Follett's rural home during a card game in which Follett, Buckley and five other persons were engaged. Follett and Buckley were shot when the gunmen entered the house on a rise and opened fire.

34 DIE IN CRASH

ALGIERS (AP)—Air France officials said today 34 persons died in the flaming crash of a DC3 transport last night at Biskra in northeast Algeria.

Board To Open Eastwood School Bids Wednesday

The primary item on the Roseburg School Board's agenda Wednesday night is the opening of bids for the Eastwood School.

According to Supt. M. C. Deller, seven firms have stated intentions to bid on the six-room school for East Roseburg. This number compares with five companies that bid in January.

The seven companies are Todd Building Co., William Pemberton & Son, Murphy Construction Co., S. Ferche, all of Roseburg; H. G. Carl, Construction Co., Salem; Industrial Building Co., Eugene; and Cummings Construction Co., Grants Pass.

The firms will bid on revised plans of the school drawn by architect Lyle Glenn. The school board, at an earlier bidding Jan. 31, rejected all bids as being in excess of bond issue funds available.

The board voted to have Glenn resubmit his plans with an idea to reduce some of the costs in the proposed school.

Supt. Deller added that some other old business might be covered at the meeting, but reaffirmed that the bid opening was the main business of the night.

The board will meet at Central Junior High School at 7:30 p.m.

Aged Corporal's Case Continues

DETROIT (AP)—Perry Hunt, 67-year-old Army corporal AWOL for seven years, will be transferred Thursday to Ft. Benjamin Harrison, near Indianapolis, for further action on his case.

Hunt, who said he had lived at Roseburg, Ore., the last four years, surrendered to the FBI in Charlotte, Mich., last Friday "to get this mess straightened out."

Hunt, who said he had been in the Army 18 years, including service in both World Wars, left his post at Ft. Lewis on Nov. 15, 1950. He had re-enlisted as a private in 1948.

Change In Coroner Setup May Go To Interim Group

SALEM (AP)—Legislation to give Oregon a new system of county coroners appears headed for a sidetrack in favor of an interim committee study of the problem.

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D), Milwaukie, told the House State and Federal Affairs Committee Monday night that the Senate Local Government Committee wants a two-year interim study.

The committee's hearing was on a bill to have county health officers act as coroners, under the direction of the state Board of Health.

The Senate committee is considering a bill to permit the present coroners, almost all of whom are undertakers, to keep their jobs.

The legislation is the result of the approval by the people last November of a constitutional amendment to permit the Legislature to fix qualifications for coroners.

Among those supporting the county health officer proposal were many undertakers, who said

they are at a big disadvantage in competing with undertakers who are coroners.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, supported the bill, saying "It would be a great improvement over the present setup."

Dr. Erickson said he knows of several suicides and homicides that haven't been reported to the coroners.

The coroners just as vigorously opposed the bill. They were supported by Dr. Warren Hunter, head of the pathology department of the University of Oregon Medical School.

Dr. Hunter said the present coroners are "conscientious public servants who are doing their best."

He added that the Oregon Pathologists Assn. is not satisfied with the bill, and that an interim study could develop a better one.

He also said the turnover among county health officers is so great that they might not be able to act efficiently as coroners.

Court Cases Settled, Jurors Are Dismissed

Although 11 cases had been scheduled for trial in circuit court this week, a rash of out-of-court settlements wiped the docket clean and jurors were excused until next Monday morning.

Eleven cases were on the docket for trial and nine of them were settled. Two were continued and will be reset. Ten cases are scheduled for trial next week.

Jurors have been notified that they will not have to appear until Monday at 9:30 a.m. A total of 81 names were drawn for jury duty in this term of circuit court.

Man Made Snow Slide Kills Two

EMPIRE, Colo. (AP)—Deliberately started with cannon fire, a snowslide yesterday killed a cameraman filming the action and a highway worker warning motorists to stay away.

The photographer's helper, Roland Wyatt, 18, of Salt Lake City, was trapped in the fringe of the avalanche and clawed his way out from under two feet of snow.

John Hermann, 28, Salt Lake City movie cameraman, and Wayne S. Whitlock, 21, Empire, maintenance worker for the Colorado Highway Department, suffocated under tons of snow, rock and trees. Their bodies were later recovered.

The snowslide was set in motion on purpose as part of the Highway Department's avalanche control work along U.S. Highway 40 in the Blue Hill area of Berthoud Pass, about 46 miles west of Denver.

Seattle Metal Trades Workers End Strike

SEATTLE (AP)—A four-day strike of 8,000 Seattle metal trades workers ended early Tuesday when management and union negotiators agreed on the terms of a new, two-year contract calling for a 6 1/2 per cent pay raise.

The agreement is subject to ratification by rank and file members of the four unions involved: the Machinists, Boilermakers, Molders and Foundry Workers and Automotive Machinists.

A. F. O'Neill said the Seattle settlement probably would set the pattern for ending similar metal trades strikes in Tacoma, Everett and Portland.

Journemen in the four unions involved in the Seattle dispute now receive, on the average, about \$2.37 an hour.

in voting against the city paying for moving the poles.

In other business the City Council:

Accepted a petition signed by 137 property owners requesting annexation to the city. Property involved lies at the southeast city limits. Names on the petition are to be checked by the city recorder and an annexation ordinance drafted.

Gave first and second readings to a lengthy ordinance revising and modernizing the city's traffic code. The ordinance was read by title only and will come up for final reading and vote at the next council meeting.

Gave the mayor and city recorder authorization to execute a contract between Roseburg and Green Sanitary District in which the city will treat sewage for the district. Terms of the agreement call for Green to pay \$2,000 per year for service plus \$15 per million gallons of sewage treated.

Passed an ordinance calling for bids for the new sewage treatment plant and sewer mains. At the suggestion of the city manager, the council set the time for bids to be submitted as May 13 and for them to be opened at a special meeting May 20. Farrell explained that the time was needed for advertising and to allow bidders time to study the plans and specifications.

Passed an ordinance vacating a portion of Hawthorne Dr. and Azalea St. No opposition to the vacation was voiced at two hearings previously held.

Authorized the city manager to buy a quantity of iron bars and pipe from a firm going out of that line of business. Farrell explained that the material offered for \$1,577.04 would amount to a saving of about \$1,000.

Senate Rackets Committee Digs Into More Deals

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Rackets Committee dug deeper today into what Sen. Mundt (R-SD) called "crooked, under-the-table payoffs" to labor union officials and others in the New York City area.

Mundt, a committee member, told a reporter public hearings expected next month will show that "thousands of workmen" and the buyers of homes in two Long Island housing developments "all were sypped" by a sort of chain reaction in corruption.

Mundt's statements came on the heels of a vote by the committee ordering a start of contempt proceedings against Nunzio J. Squillante, a former garbage collection operator on Long Island.

Squillante, refusing to turn over subpoenaed financial records, declined Monday to tell the committee anything but his name and address. He invoked the Fifth Amendment on all other questions but refused to tell whether he honestly believed that answers might tend to incriminate him.
