Parent Teachers Will Elect Officers Today

PENDLETON — Mrs. Russell N. Case of Portland is expected to be elected president of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers Wednesday.

She was chosen for the post by a nominating committee and there have been no nominations from the floor, virtually assuring her the job.

Others nominated and unopposed are: First vice president, Mrs. Leight Guston, Medford; junior vice president, Mrs. Bruce L. Watt, Portland; Mrs. Carlos Easley, La Grande; and Mrs. John Elfering, Vale; recording secretary, Mrs. J. Carlyle Ross, Portland.

The organization scheduled for discussion on Wednesday the controversial "key district" plan for distributing basic school support funds. The PTA board has approved the plan providing that the basic school support money is raised from the present \$80 per child to \$120.

Investigation Into Dr. Adams Case Demanded

LONDON — An investigation of the Dr. John Bodkin Adams murder case was demanded Wednesday by a member of Parliament.

Laborite George Wigg called for an "independent inquiry into the preparation, organization and conduct" of the prosecution's case against the 58-year-old society physician.

Dr. Adams was acquitted by a jury Tuesday of a charge he drugged to death a rich widow in 1950 to gain a legacy. The prosecution afterward quashed a secret indictment accusing him of murdering another wealthy widow patient.

Wigg's call for a probe was in the form of a question put before the House of Commons to Atty. Gen. Sir Reginald Manningham-Buller, chief prosecutor at the trial. The question is scheduled for a reply next Monday.

The legislator did not elaborate on what prompted his demand for an investigation into the pretrial aspects of the case.

During the trial defense counsel criticized methods used by Scotland Yard's ace detective, Herbert (the Duke) Hannam.

Hannam arrested Dr. Adams last December for the murder of 81-year-old Mrs. Alice Edith Morrell after months of investigating scores of wills in Eastbourne, where Adams had a prosperous practice in that haven for wealthy retired folks. Eastbourne police called in Scotland Yard to squelch rumors rampant in that Victorian resort.

Dr. Adams went into hiding Wednesday for a rest — and to think about his future.

Farm Bureau Proposes \$6 Billion Budget Cut

CHICAGO — The American Farm Bureau Federation proposes cuts of \$6,200,000,000 in what it calls the "excessively large" 1955 federal budget of 72 billion dollars.

Starting the cuts at home, the federation yesterday recommended that the five billion dollars earmarked for agriculture be pruned by 300 millions.

Among other cuts recommended: Two billions from the Department of Defense, \$1,200,000,000 from military assistance in foreign aid and 800 million from economic assistance.

Meany Says AFL-CIO Will Purge Itself

ATLANTIC CITY — George Meany, AFL-CIO president, told the United Auto Workers' convention Tuesday that labor is determined to purge itself of corrupt elements.

Meany mentioned no names but to a question afterward whether he meant Dave Beck, president of the Teamsters Union, he said: "You read the papers. You can identify him."

Meany said in his address to the convention that although "taking the Fifth Amendment on the question of personal corruption in connection with the handling of trade union funds, the refusal to give an account of the stewardship of those funds . . . may not be against the law, it is against the trade union law and no one has the right to hold trade union office who takes that position."

Beck has been suspended as a vice president of the AFL-CIO.

SEAMAN DROWNS

PORTLAND — A 34-year-old Seattle seaman, Roy L. Davis, apparently drowned in Portland harbor early Wednesday when he tried to jump from a dock to his ship.

Top Educators In Conference At San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO — More than 400 educators and officials from the 11 Western states, Alaska and Hawaii gathered Wednesday for a conference on how to meet the growing area's higher education problems.

The two-day conference will deal with how to fit the increasing number of college-age students into the less-rapidly growing amount of space in classrooms and what to do about the teacher shortage.

A preview was provided Tuesday night in a televised program over the San Francisco educational television station.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie of Idaho suggested that higher institutions of learning operate 12 months a year and make every possible use of all teachers and space available before going to the taxpayers for more.

He said his state has increased its educational appropriations 47 per cent over two years ago, "yet our problem still is how to provide education facilities for those who want and need to be educated."

The program was moderated by Robert W. Lucas, editor of The Denver Post.

Gov. Stephen McNichols of Colorado said the federal government should provide money for teachers and schools if it can afford to finance highways.

Chancellor Raymond B. Allen of UCLA said local resources should be exhausted before Washington is asked for help.

Teamsters Slate Mass Meeting Next Sunday

PORTLAND — A mass meeting of Portland area Teamsters at the Portland Auditorium Sunday afternoon will discuss disclosures about union affairs made last month at hearings of the Senate rackets subcommittee.

And, said Robert Miller, spokesman for a rank-and-file group, it will advise the men what is being done and "find out from them what they want done" about union activities uncovered by the Senate subcommittee.

The meeting is not sanctioned by the Joint Council of Teamsters.

There are some 12,500 Teamsters in Oregon and Southwest Washington. The auditorium seats around 4,000.

Miller said the meeting will be open to the press.

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Senate Approves Shifts In Top Pentagon Posts

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved Tuesday a series of shifts in top Pentagon posts, including the nomination of Donald A. Quarles to be deputy secretary of defense.

Quarles, picked by President Eisenhower to be No. 2 man in the defense secretariat, has been secretary of the Air Force. His nomination to the new position was confirmed by voice vote, as were these others:

Gen. Nathan F. Twining, to be chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff succeeding Adm. Arthur W. Radford, effective in mid-August.

James H. Douglas of Illinois, to succeed Quarles as secretary of the Air Force.

Gen. Thomas D. White to succeed Gen. Twining as Air Force chief of staff.

Adm. Arleigh A. Burke, reappointed as chief of naval operations.

Fred A. Bantz of New York, to succeed Raymond Fogler as assistant secretary of the Navy.

LIFESAVERS' CHAIRMAN

PORTLAND — Oregon Highway Lifesavers Tuesday named Salem insurance man Paul Lippold as chairman of the state Teen-Age Traffic Safety Conference Committee.

Lippold said he hopes to organize a Willamette Valley Teen-Age Conference Committee for young people from Albany, Corvallis, Salem, and Eugene.

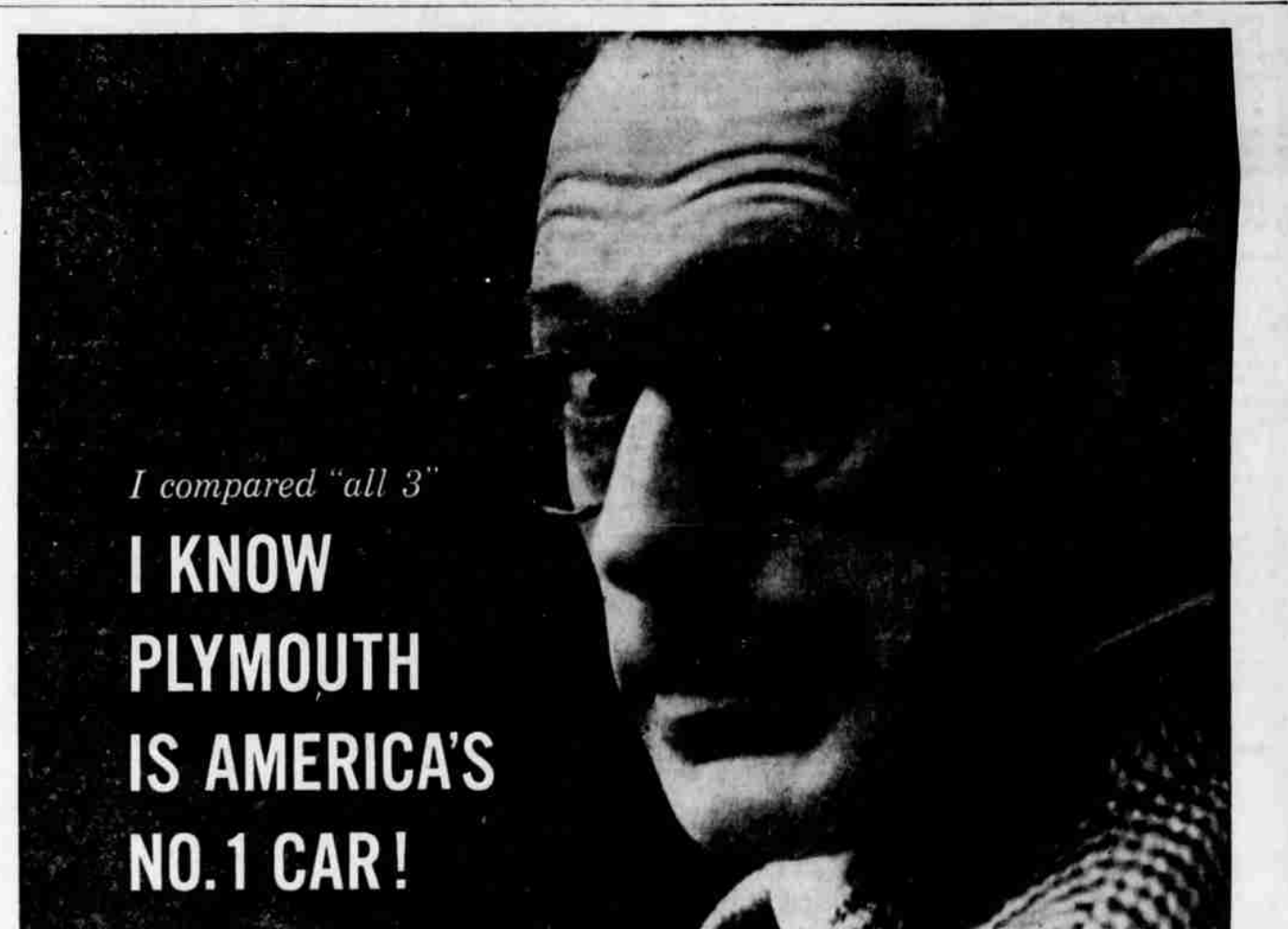


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
