

Holman Stops African Giant

PORTLAND, Ore. — Chicago's Johnny Holman found the wide open spaces of Ewart Potgieter's midsection a tempting target Tuesday night as he pounded out a unanimous decision over the lumbering South African giant.

Despite a 125-pound weight disadvantage, Holman rocked his 325-pound opponent into the ropes with a right to the head in the first round and then switched to a body attack that kept Potgieter hanging on for the remainder of the 10-round heavyweight scrap.

Potgieter, meeting his first big-name opponent in the once highly-ranked Holman, was unable to get in a damaging blow during the entire fight.

Holman had the South African completely befuddled by the eighth round and in the ninth and 10th rounds the Chicago boxer was banging away at will as Potgieter struggled to stick out the 10 rounds.
