

Ryegrass Vote Set Through Mid-April

SALEM — A grower referendum on the proposed Oregon Ryegrass Seed Commission will be held from April 8 through April 20, Director J. F. Short of the State Department of Agriculture announced.

Ballots will be mailed before April 8 to all known eligible growers. The marked ballots may be returned by mail to the department at Salem or they may be deposited in a ballot box in the county extension agent's office in Eugene, Albany, Corvallis, Salem, Dallas or McMinnville.

Rowell says those eligible to

vote are all present growers who sold \$500 or more worth of common or perennial ryegrass seed, or both, in at least one of the past three years.

Any qualified grower who does not receive a mailed ballot by April 8 may obtain one from the department in Salem or from any of the six county extension agent's offices.

The referendum follows public hearings held in February after ryegrass seed growers petitioned for a commission.

The commission will be created if two-thirds of the growers voting favor it and if the favorable voters represent one-third of the Oregon production.

If created, the commission would be authorized to collect a maximum tax of 1½ per cent on grower sales of ryegrass seed for research and promotion of this industry.

Clover, Alfalfa Prices To Hold

CORVALLIS — Oregon clover and alfalfa seed growers can expect prices to hold up fairly well in 1957 unless U.S. and Canadian fall seed harvests are very large.

Ray Teal, Oregon State College seed marketing specialist, says a short 1956 crops in Canada and a smaller alfalfa seed harvest in this country reduced carryover supplies and upped prices.

The grass seed picture is somewhat dimmer. Teal says ryegrass seed prices are becoming too low for even the most efficient producers to cover costs. Growers are trying to bring supply and use back into satisfactory balance. Very low prices for 1957 seem likely unless ryegrass seed harvest is reduced sharply.

Benigrass and fine fescue prices appear headed back down after last year's spurt resulting from short turf grass seed crops in both Canada and the Midwest. But Teal believes prices should stay above the low levels of two or three years ago for awhile at least.

Rapidly increased production of the new and popular Merion bluegrass has dropped early high prices \$2 a pound to around \$1.50. However, the specialist thinks there is still room for profitable expansion of this crop even though prices decline somewhat. Oregon yields have been good, averaging about 200 pounds per acre last year.

Sudan is an exception in the general grass seed trend. Supplies are smaller than last year and chances are good for prices to go above average next fall.

TV Winner Hands Over Big Chunk To Uncle Sam

NEW YORK — Theodore Nadler, the St. Louis clerk who has amassed \$152,000 in television quiz show winnings, started handing over a big chunk of it to Uncle Sam Monday.

He wrote a check for \$29,700 as a first payment on his federal income tax. He said he figures his 1957 state and federal income tax already stands at \$81,000.

Nadler boosted his total take to \$152,000 Sunday night on CBS-TV's "The \$64,000 Challenge." He may appear on the program again to try to win more if a qualified challenger shows up.

"I'd like to go home and rest up awhile," said Nadler. "I've been coming back and forth for about 25 weeks so I don't know whether I'm coming or going."

He said he had taken a year's leave of absence from his \$70-a-week job in an Army supply depot in St. Louis.

That if any person claiming or asserting under or by virtue of, any unpatented mining claim located prior to July 23, 1955, any right, title, or interest in the vegetative surface resources and other surface resources, under such mining claim, contrary to or in conflict with the limitations or restrictions specified in section 4 of said act, as to the above-described lands or any part thereof, shall fail to file in the Land Office of the Bureau of Land Management at 1001 N. E. Lloyd Boulevard, P. O. Box 3861, Portland 8, Oregon, and within 150 days from the below stated date of first publication of this notice, a verified statement which shall set forth as to such mining claim:

(1) The date of location;

(2) The book and page of recordation of the notice or certificate of location;

(3) The section or sections of the public land surveys which embrace such mining claim; or if such lands are unsurveyed either the section or sections which would probably embrace such mining claim when the public land surveys are extended to such lands or a tie by courses and distances to an approved United States mineral monument;

(4) Whether such claimant is a locator or purchaser under such location; and

(5) The name and address of such claimant and names and addresses of any persons known to the claimant of any other person or persons claiming any interest or interests in or under such unpatented mining claim; such failure shall be conclusively deemed (i) to constitute a waiver and relinquishment by such mining claimant of any right, title, or interest under such mining claim contrary to or in conflict with the limitations or restrictions specified in section 4 of the Act of July 23, 1955 (69 Stat. 367), as to unpatented claims located after that date, and (ii) to constitute a consent by such mining claimant that such unpatented mining claim shall be subject to said limitations and restrictions, and (iii) to preclude thereafter, prior to issuance of patent, any assertion by such mining claimant of any right, title, or interest in or under such mining claim contrary to or in conflict with said limitations or restrictions. Section 4 provides, generally, that unpatented mining claims located after July 23, 1955 shall not be used for purposes other than prospecting, mining, or processing operations, or uses reasonably incident thereto; that such claims will be subject to the right of the United States to manage and dispose of the vegetative surface resources thereof and to manage other surface resources thereof; and that, except for clearance for such purposes, any permitted severance or removal of timber must be in accordance with sound principles of forest management. Said section 4 also provides that any use of the surface of any such mining claim by the United States, its permittees or licensees, shall be such as not to endanger or materially interfere with the prospecting, mining, processing or reasonably incident uses by the mining claimant.

REPORT EXPLOSION

WASHINGTON — Both U.S. and British authorities have announced another nuclear explosion in the Soviet Union, the eighth in a series of tests which started last August.

The explosion, which took place last Saturday, was announced yesterday by the two Western powers.

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Wool Surplus Growing Lower

CORVALLIS — Increased use of wool by U.S. woolen mills is cutting down government-stored stocks and could wipe out the 38 million pounds surplus by the end of this year, says M. D. Thomas, Oregon State College agricultural economist.

U. S. mill consumption of apparel wool in 1956 ran about 5 per cent more than in 1954. At the same time, domestic production has not increased and imports of apparel wool have remained low.

Drought in the Southwest has reduced sheep numbers about as fast as they have increased in other parts of the country. To keep pace with increased demands for wool, the government surplus holdings have been siphoned off at the rate of about 6 million pounds a month.

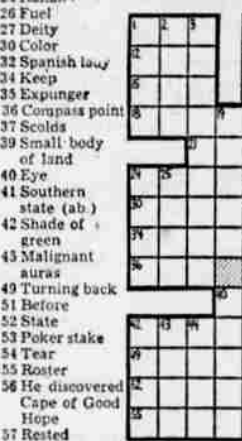
Thomas believes imports are likely to increase as government stocks disappear — world supply and demand will have more influence on U.S. prices than in recent years.

A detailed outlook for wool, meat animals, the poultry industry, and Oregon crops are reported in the current issue of OSC's "Agricultural Situation and Outlook" circular now available from county extension offices.
